

Miss Theresa Mason began her new duties at mid-term as home economics instructor in Robert Lee high school. The position was accepted immediately upon her graduation from Abilene Christian College.

A little 4-months-old dog owned by the J. W. Service Jr. family died last week of rabies. Mr. and Mrs. Service and their four childdren immediately began taking anti-rabies shots and six other persons who had been exposed are also being treated.

The puppy was a family pet and played with the children after it became sick. Tuesday of last week Mr. Service took the dog to Dr. Jack Taylor, a San Angelo veterinarian. It died a couple of days later and the head was sent to the State Health Dept laboratory in Austin. The test resulted in a positive finding of rabies.

Others who had handled the dog and are taking shots are Hershall Hall and son, Randy, and twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lendy Devoll. Dr. Taylor and his assistant are also being treated with vaccine.

The anti-rabies vaccine is furnished free by the State Health Department and is being administered by Dr. J. D. McDaniel. The shots are taken daily for a period of 14 days.

The four children in the Service home include Cathy, 9, John, 7, Jay Lyn, 4, and Konny, 2 years old.

Last fall a fox believed to have been rabid was discovered inside the yard at the Service home The animal was dispatched with a shotgun blast, and a female dog was killed after she had been bitten by the fox.

Most Essential Resources, Soil It takes a long time to make Eureaka Springs, Arkansas, was rocks by air, rain, sun, and wind.

Soil is an essential resource which we must have to live, and, due to growing population, we must conserve our soil.

Where severe soil erosion exists, we lose much of our needed soil. Some causes of soil erosion are plowing straight rows where the water runs down-hill carrying soil with it, leaving soil bare of plants, forests and grass fires, wind blowing fine top soil away, and cuttng away of forests.

There are many ways of preventing soil erosion. Some common ones is our area are the practice of contour plowing, or running the rows on a level plane with the lay of the land; strip cropping, which is alternating several rows of a tall crop with several rows of a low crop; planting a cover net wire fences to hold debris that washes across the land, thus slow-

ing down the flow of water and permitting grass and weeds to get to hold the water on a particular

area; and irrigation by supplying fires not only destroy trees, water from a source other than they kill these organisms, h rainfall.

We must not only keep our soil on bare ground can heat it to from eroding, but we must keep degrees, thus killing organis our soil rich. One way to do this is to leave stubble behind to plow under as fertilizer. Another way is crop rotation. That is planting one crop one year and another the next, so as to avoid depleting soil with one crop.


