

New Automatic Laundry Opens Here This Week

A new business enterprise opening in Robert Lee this week is the automatic self-serve laundry owned by Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Gardner. It will be known as E-CON-O-WASH. a trade name adopted by the manufacturers of Speed Queen laundry equipment.

The business is located in the west end of the Texaco service station, a large room that was formerly occupied by a cafe.

Twelve coin operated washers have been installed in addition to four large dryers. Washers are operated at a cost of 20c, while persons who do not own real estate 25c is charged for the drying operation. A coin changer has been installed for the convenience of

Air conditioning will make the laundry room comfortable during hot weather and there is plenty of room for parking. The place will be opened 24 hous a day every day in the week, Mr. Gardner says.

Friday, May 1, has been designated as free wash day when everybody is invited to come in and turn out a wash free of charge.

Precinct 1 voters favored a \$150,000 bond issue in Saturday's special election by a majority of 237 to 125. But returns lacked 14 votes of carrying the bonds which require a 2 to 1 majority.

The vote was lighter than expected with only 362 ballots being cast, while 471 poll taxes had been paid in the three boxes. However, only qualified voters who render property for taxation were eligible to take part in the election. Many are not assessed on their personal property holdings.

Robert Lee's vote was an even 4 to 1. Naturally the issue should have been favored here, since the bonds were to have been used mainly in paving city streets.

The Sanco vote was about as expected, while most Silver residents kept hands off. Silver has 126 paid poll taxes this year.

Indications are that petitions will be circulated again to call another election in the near future. A checkup early this week showed that at least 25 and possibly 50 qualified voters in the Robert Lee voting precinct failed to cast a ballot although they were for the bonds.

Young Knife Slayer Draws Life Sentence

Willie McDade, 17, of Odessa was sentenced to life imprisonment in Robert Lee Wednesday afternoon of last week after pleading guilty of murdering Louis (Shorty) Canada, a San Angelo milk route salesman, Oct. 24.

His companion, Roosevelt Wiley 26, also an Odessa Negro, was sentenced to death by a jury in 72nd District Court at Lubbock March 11 in the same killing. A ruling will be handed down within 10 days on his motion for a new

According to testimony, the pair flagged down the milk truck driver on Highway 87 between Water Valley and Broome after their stolen truck ran out of gas. They then stabbed the driver numerous times, took about \$1,000 from his pockets and threw his body in heavy brush.

They were arrested at Big Spring shortly after police found the abandoned milk truck near there. Wiley was tried at Lubbock on a change of venue.

The jury began deliberations about 5 p. m. and returned with their verdict 25 minutes later. McDade waived appeal and requested immediate sentencing. Judge Joe L. Mays presided.





Quail Available For Stocking At 50c Per Bird

AUSTIN - Land owners are beginning to send in their applications for quail for stocking purposes, according to the assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

"Our state game farm at Tyler already is in spring operation," he said. "We are beginning to receive applications now from land owners who want to stock their places with birds again this spring. Before these applications are processed it is necessary that the release areas be inspected by a game warden. In this manner we will be certain there is plenty of food and cover available."

Quail are sold to the land owner at 50 cents each, which is about half the cost of production. In some areas clubs buy the birds for the land owners. In this way habitat improvement continues.

Reports from wardens throughout the state indicate there also was a good carry-over of native birds from last season, despite the scourge of rats in some parts of the State. The bird now are able to get new green food to eat and emacited birds are showing signs of improvement.

Additional releases of coturnix quail also will be made this year, according to the secretary. He said when brood birds were taken from laying pens and placed in holding pens during the winter months they continued to lay.

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
