FFA Boys Will Receive State's Highest Award

Five Robert Lee FFA youths, Douglas Ashworth, Dennis Blair, Butch Service, David Waldrop and Kenneth Wink will be presented with the Lone Star Farmer Degree for outstanding FFA achievements during the State FFA Convention July 15-17 in Austin.

These five boys follow in the footsteps of such other outstanding Robert Lee Future Farmers as Jerry Carwile, Milburn Wink, Jerry Harmon, Joe Harmon, Bub Harmon and Douglas Robertson, all being Lone Star Farmers.

For the Robert Lee Chapter this is the highest total of State Farmers ever produced in one year. To be eligible a boy must be in the top 2% of all FFA members in Texas. The Robert Lee Chapter qualified more State Farmers this year than any other school in Area 1 and West Texas, including both large and small schools. This definitely is an outstanding achievement for the Chapter and School.

5,000 Future Farmers are expected to be at the convention, to be held in the new air-conditioned Municipal Auditorium in Austin.

In addition to business sessions, the young conventioners will be taken on a tour of Austin, swim in the famous Barton Springs pool, attend a "Fun Night" featuring FFA talent and professional acts, and attend the huge Lone Star Farmer Banquet that grants honors, scholarships and awards to deserving Future Farmers and adults.

Highlights of the convention are expected to include the election of a 1959-60 State FFA President and Sweetheart, music by the Lone Star Farmer Orchestra, awarding of Lone Star Farmer Degrees and an address by Rex Kimbro, President of the National Future Farmers of America.

Bill McDowell, State FFA President, will confer the Lone Star Farmer Degree upon the Robert Lee Youths.

Other Robert Lee FFA members going to the Convention include Jerry Quisenberry, Donny Robertson and Clint Austin. The Robert Lee group will reside in the Sheraton Terrace Hotel while in Austin.

The group will be accompanied to Austin by Hulan Harris, local FFA Advisor.

Jack Snead Named to Honor Roll

Stillwater—Jack Carson Snead, Robert Lee, junior in the College of Engineering at Oklahoma State University is among the 1,793 who have been named to the Dean's Honor Roll for the 1959 spring semester.

This honor is given only those OSU students who achieve at least a B average, with no grade lower than C, while carrying at least 15 college hours, said Registrar Raymond Girod.

OSU students from 316 Oklahoma towns, 218 towns in 39 other states including Alaska and Hawaii and 19 other countries and territories were listed, Girod said.

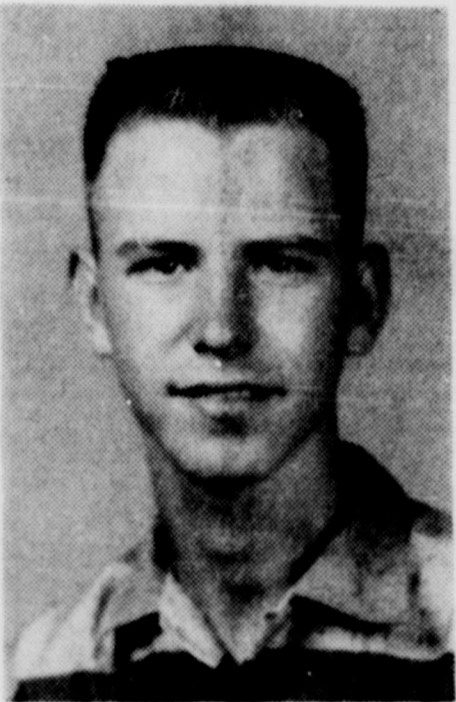

Local Soil Conservation Service personnel are now in the process of gathering information concerning land treatment to be used by the watershed planning party on the Kickapoo watershed.

A Great Plains Conservation plan has been completed on the Foster S. Price ranch near Silver. The plan for the approximately 6,000 acre ranch calls for the following practices: brush control, pear control, concrete storage tanks, deferment, and proper use of grasses.

Any land owner or operator interested in the Great Plains Conservation Program is urged to contact the local Soil Conservation Service Office in the Court House in Robert Lee for more information.

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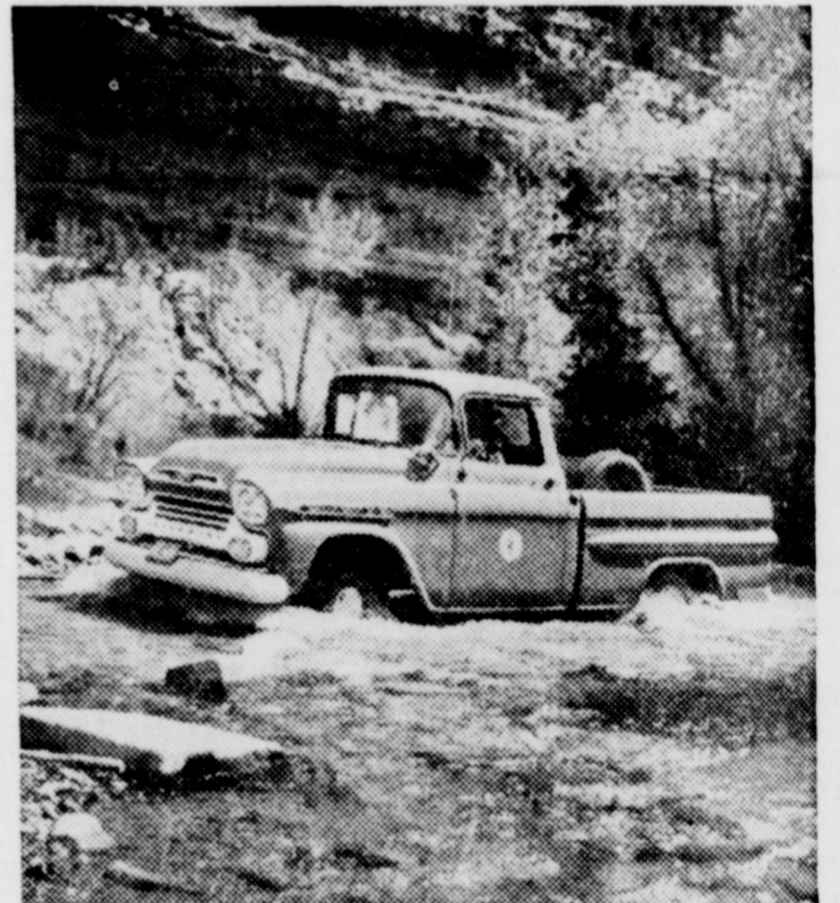

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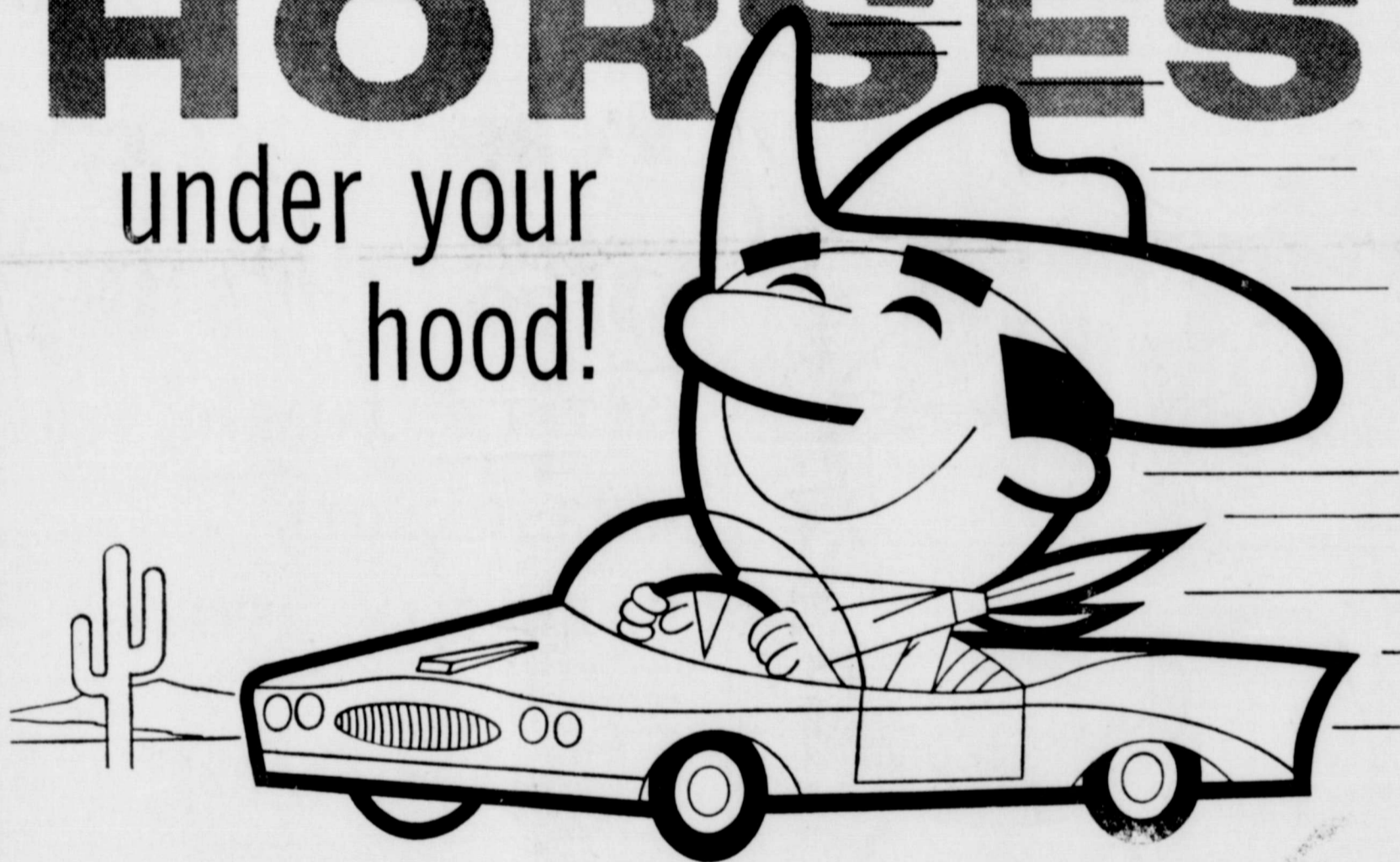
