Best summer rains in many years, and possibly since this country was settled up, is the situation in Coke and a number of West Texas counties.

From the middle of June to the past week moisture of from 4 to 8 inches has fallen in this area, resulting in the most perfect crop pasture conditions ever known.

Rain showers have been spotted during the period but all sections have had good moisture. There has been no damage and little runoff, although most surface tanks are full.

The past week heaviest showers descended over the east half of the county, with the Valley View and Lometa sections and Ft. Chadbourne getting 2 inches or more. Previously the Wildcat community, southwest of Robert Lee, the Harris Ranch south of town and the Hayrick section had big rains.

Gauges vary but it is safe to report that most every part of Coke County has had at least 4 inches of rain the past month, and in some spots the amount runs up to 8 inches or more. Official gauges in Robert Lee indicate about 5 inches for June and July.

Old timers say they have never seen as much summer rain. Otthers recall that it was very wet in the summer of 1919. The San Angelo weather station announces. the biggest summer rains since 1882. Tom Green has had heavier rains than Coke.

Rainfall has kept this area green with a heavy growth of crops and vegetation, in contrast to the recent drouth years when hot summer sun seared the farm land and pastures.

Cotton crops are in a wonderful position, and feed crops are also assured. Most every rancher has more grazing than he needs.

Supplemented with an important oil industry, the excellent agricultural outlook boosts Coke County's economic position to a new high.




