## Juries Called For Session of District Court

Both grand jurors and petit jurors have been ordered to report Monday, Aug. 17, for duty in 51st District Court for Coke County. Judge Joe L. Mays will preside over the session.

The grand jury will go into session at 10 a. m. to begin its secret investigation of criminal matters.

Set for trial before a jury is the civil suit brought by Garland Green and other members of his family for title to a quarter section of land southwest of Silver. ## To Meet Again This Week For Golf Discussion

A second meeting to further discuss a Coke County golf course will be held Thursday night of this week at the court house. Time is set for 7:30.

A good turnout was on hand for the preliminary meeting last Thursday night. Considered the most logical site is the city-owned 200 acres one mile east of Robert Lee.

Cumbie Ivey Jr. says Dick Turner, golf pro at the San Angelo Country Club, will come here prior to the Thursday night meeting and make a tour of the city property and give his opinion as to whether or not it would be suitable for a 9-

hole layout.

This property has two lakes and a good water well, a highly important factor if grass greens and good fairways are to be maintained.

A suggested membership of \$100 will likely be required to build the course. Everyone agreed that such memberships would be bought back by the club if a member moved from the community.

Another matter getting unanimous approval is to establish the golf club as a county-wide project. Since Coke County has a small population it will be necessary to obtain members from Bronte, Silver, Robert Lee and all other sections of the county.

Everyone interested in getting a golf course for the county is urged to attend and take part in the discussions Thursday night. If there is enough interest, steps will be taken to go ahead with an organization. Otherwise the matter will be dropped.

## TWISTERS SPLIT TWIN BILL WITH KIRBY TEAM

Robert Lee Rabbit Twisters split a double header with Kirby of San Angelo here Sunday afternoon. The visitors won the 7-inning nightcap 6-1, after losing the first game 16-8.

A big crowd was present to witness the double bill which required more than five hours of playing. The games had an important bearing on the Concho Basin League standing, with the final outcome very much in doubt.

The Twisters staged a big rally in the fourth inning of the opening game when they racked up 10 scores and sent 15 men to the plate. It broke the game wide open, both teams having made two runs up until that time. Four walks, an error and seven hits accounted for the bevy of tallies.

Kirby scored three times in the seventh and added three more in the final inning. Robert Lee got in a pair of scores in both the seventh and eighth frames.

Tommy Ford, crack Bobcat high school pitcher, was knocked out of the box early and was succeeded by Stevens and Turner. Emil Jost took the mound for Kirby in the final innings.

Richard Dumas went the distance for the Twisters, giving up 12 hits. He coasted after the big fourth inning. Robert Lee garnered a total of 16 hits. John Conley and Ronnie Baker each poled three for five, while Jerry Tinkler, Ed Poehls, Norman Roberts and Dumas had two hits apiece.

### SECOND GAME

By agreement the second game was limited to seven innings. The Twisters lone tally was made in the opening frame when Jerry Tinkler led off with a single to center and scored later on Conley's hit to right. Tinkler and Roberts hit safely to start the third but were left on base and Robert Lee failed to get another hit off Emil Jost.

Kirby got two runs off Lefty Paul Tinkler in their first time at bat. He walked the first two men in the second and was relieved on the mound by Conley. A single, a base on balls and a double accounted for four more Kirby tallies. Conley gave up only one other hit.

Jost was right and his side arm slants kept the Twister batters puzzled. He struck out four and didn't walk a man.

The positions of elementary principal and high school mathematics instructor are open. Hervey Latham, former grade principal, was elected high school principal. Former high school principal, M. E. Petross, who also taught math, resigned to become superintendent of schools at Bangs.

Mr. Coalson said school opens Monday, Aug. 31. The following Monday, Labor Day, will be observed as a holiday.

Mr. and Mrs. Dowell are graduates of West Texas State College at Canyon and are completing summer work there. They have one child. Dowell has three years of teaching experience, two of them in Lubbock junior high. He will teach 7th and 8th grade subjects in addition to his work as assistant coach.

Mrs. Dowell has taught five years, two of them in the first grade.

Named as home economics teacher is Miss Mary Halkias of Wichita Falls. She obtained her degree from North Texas State College and has four years of teaching experience.

Mrs. Chanda McBroom has been hired to teach the sixth grade to succeed Miss Eunice McLure, who retired this year. She is the former Chanda Brown and is a sister of Chism and John Brown. She has a degree from ACC and taught 12 years. Mrs. McBroom and her family returned to Robert Lee a year ago from Quemado, N. Mex., where they had ranch-ed. Mr. McBroom has had poor health. The McBrooms have four children.

Silver placed three on the all-star team. They were Wayne Reed, Stewart and Whitaker.

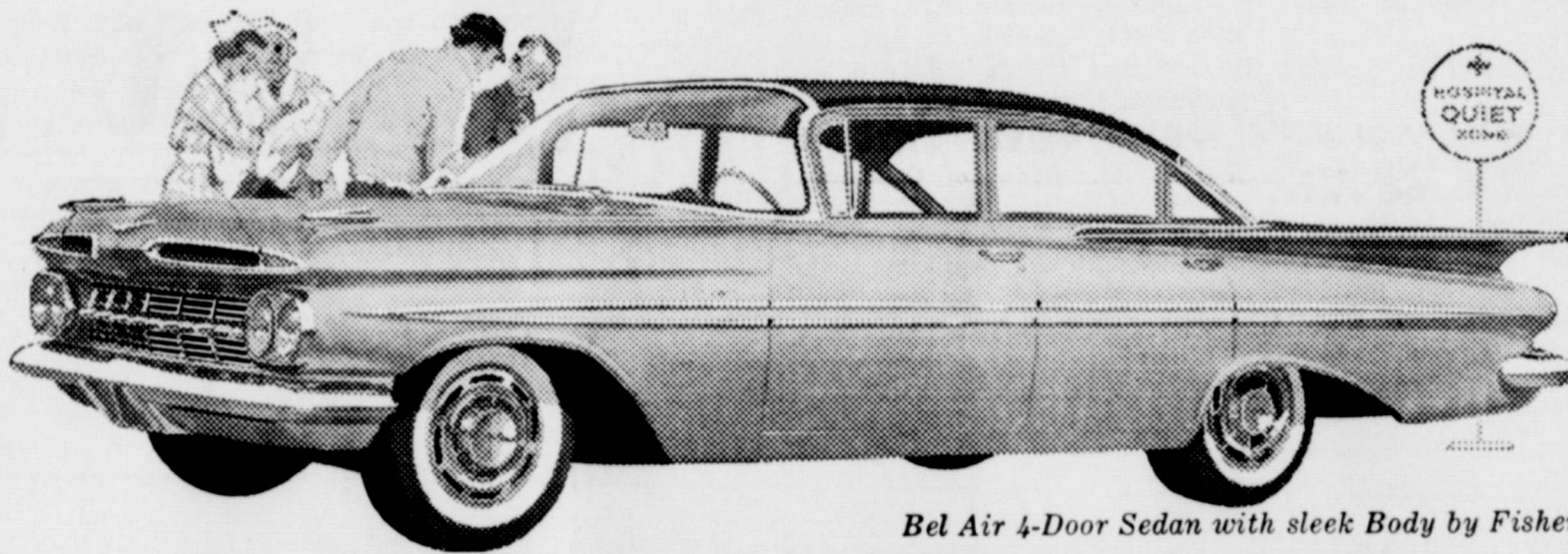

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## WORLD WAR II VETERANS HAVE 1 YEAR TO APPLY FOR GI LOANS

World War II veterans are reminded they have entered the final year in which application may be made for a GI home, farm or business loan.

P. J. Mims, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, said Congress has set July 25, 1960, as the cut-off date in the post-war program that has already seen nearly 5 million World War II veterans take ad-

vantage of the GI Bill loan provisions since June 22, 1944.

The law allows an additional year, until July 25, 1961, for processing and actual closing of loans, but applications must be made during the ensuing year under present legislation.

These dates do not pertain to Korean veterans who have until January 31, 1965, to make loan applications. World War II veterans who also served in Korea are considered Korean veterans for loan purposes.

In all, 35 percent of the eligible World War II veterans have taken advantage of the loan program, Mims said. He pointed out that an exceptionally low record of defaults has won the approval of the nation's financial leaders and that an extremely high percentage of the loans have already been repaid in advance of the final due dates.

Through May 31, 1959, a total of 4,955,300 World War II veterans have made GI loans for a total face value of \$39,220,608,200. Of this total, 4,657,100 loans were made for homes, 228,400 for business ventures and 69,800 for farms and equipment.

## Funeral Rites For Jim Robbins, 76, Held At Rankin

Funeral services for J. W. (Jim) Robbins, 76, of Rankin, former Coke Countian, were held at 10 a. m. Thursday in Rankin Methodist Church.

Graveside services and burial took place at 4 p. m. in Lawnhaven Memorial Gardens in San Angelo.

Mr. Robbins died at 11:55 p. m. Aug. 3 in St. John's Hospital after becoming seriously ill last week. He had been in poor health for several years. He was a brother of L. C. Robbins and Mrs. W. G. Cresap of Bronte.

He was born in March, 1883 in Taylor County, moving later to the Hayrick community near here. He left home in 1904 to work for the late Lafayette Tankersley on a ranch where Barnhart is now located.

In 1908 he worked in the present Big Lake vicinity, returning to Hayrick in 1909 where he was married to Jerusha Stephens on July 15.

Mr. Robbins began in the ranching business when he was allowed to run his own flock of sheep while serving as foreman of the John Scott ranch, about 20 miles west of Mertzon. In 1911 Mr. and Mrs. Robbins pastured their sheep along the middle Concho.

In 1912 Mr. Robbins leased his first ranch near the present town of McCamey. He increased his operations over the next 50 years and acquired ranching property in Upton and Pecos counties and other properties in Upton and Terry counties.

Mr. and Mrs. Robbins moved into Rankin in 1923 and built a new home on the same site in 1951.

At the time of his death he was still actively engaged in ranching and oil interests.

His survivors include his wife of Rankin; a son, J. Phillip Robbins of Fort Stockton; a daughter, Mrs. Randy Moore of McCamey; two brothers, Frank of McCamey and L. C. of Bronte; four sisters, Mrs. L. B. Bonner of Eureka, Mrs. Jim Perry of LaMarque, Mrs. J.

W. Labenske of Snyder and Cresap; and five grandchildren.

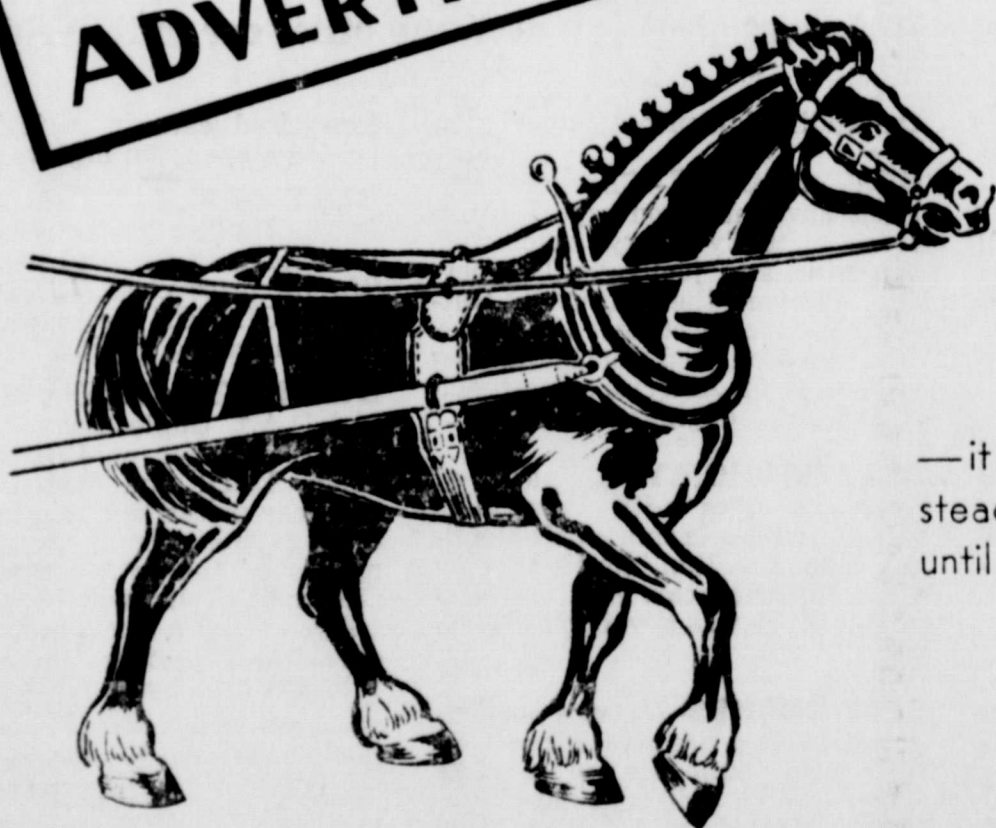

### Two Producers For Humble

Location is 3,451 feet from the most northerly north line and 660 feet from the most easterly west line of 2-Henry Franks Survey. Ground elevation is 1,996 feet.

The prospector is three miles west-northwest of the one-well Weaver Ranch (Strawn) field. It is also 3 1/2 miles southwest of Davis 1-A Tucker, a 6,540 feet failure, plugged and abandoned July 17. The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 1,849 feet: Palo Pinto, 5,000 feet; lower Canyon, 5,300 feet; Strawn, 5,450 feet; and Ellenburger, 6,330 feet.
