#### Dr. Percifull Succumbs To Long Illness

Dr. To mPercifull, 77, former toke County resident, died Saturday at his home at 15 East 9th St. in San Angelo. He had been in ill health for a number of years. Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday at Massie Charel with Rev. Taylor Henley and the Rev. Arthur Alley officiating. Burial was in Lawnhaven Memo-

rial Gardens. He was a brother of Jess Percihil of Bronte and the late Frank Percifull, former Coke County sheriff.

Dr. Percifull was born July 10. 82 in Erath County. The famy moved to Bronte community nany years ago and Tom was a tock farmer before he became a chiropractor.

He had lived in San Angelo since 1951, moving there from Christoral where he operated a sanitarum for many years. He retired from active practice in 1955 because of failing health.

The child was rushed to Coke County Memorial Hospital where the doctor and nurses worked in vain for more than an hour in an effort to revive her.

"The last increase in rates at Robert Lee became effective Feb. 21, 1957, at the time dial service was established. This was the second of two increases in rates granted by the City Commission on April 21, 1955. The first rate increase became effective May 21, 1955, and was based on results of operations of the Robert Lee ex-

change as of June 30, 1954. "As a further matter of record the rates becoming effective in May 1955, were not the rates originally requested by the company, but were placed into effect as a matter of expediency in securing relief in earnings and in the interest of providing dial service as soon as possible. Both schedules were based on 1954 costs of operation.

"Since 1954 the company and the entire telephone industry has experienced increases in the costs of furnishing service. For example, employees have received six wage increases amounting to over Nov. 26 - Mrs. Curtis Walker 26%, the latest of which became Ronnie Sims, J. E. Quisenberry effective May 17, 1959. #### QUAIL SEASON OPENS

Open season on quail hunting in Coke County began Tuesday, Dec. 1, and will continue through Jan. 16. The bag limit is 12 birds daily. Game Warden Raymond Taylor says there are lots of quail in Coke County this year, both bobwhite and blue varieties. Hunters are advised to make a good search for birds after they have been shot down. Often they are hard to find, but true sportsmen will put forth every effort to retrieve the birds after they have been shot.
