


"Of course cancer control is a year-round program. But this is the time of year when we go all out to try and save more lives. And it's the time when we ring doorbells ant collect funds to sustain the ever-increasing momentum of war against this ancient enemy of mankind. A war that most ultimately end in the defeat of cancer and the saving of countless lives in the generations to come. At the present rate, 265,000 lives every

"More than 85,000 of those could be saved right now. They are wasted, literally thrown away, simply because cancer isn't diagnosed and treated early enough. Either because people don't know the facts, or because they procrastinate.

Mr. Kirkpatrick said a quota of those wasted lives are to be found here in Coke County. "So our local drive must be a drive to save those lives," he added. "If our literature reaches every single household, and if a member of every household makes himself, or herself, responsible for safeguarding the rest of the family, we could eliminate this shocking loss of lov-



The average person doesn't reae the vast forest resources withthe boundaries of Texas.

For instance: Texas' forest lands ver 22,033,900 acres, more than per cent forested. Commercial rests in the state reach the stagring total of 12,171,900 acres, th a saw-timber volume of 27, 9,300,000 board feet.

These Texas timberlands grow ood for some 1,000 mills and ctories that provide fulltime jobs r 43,000 persons. They earn in cess of \$138,000,000 per year and e goods they produce are valued over a half billion dollars.

These are values in cold dollars d cents. Trees are a renewable ource. They continue to grow d new forests can be brought ong to take the place of those nsumed by the industry.

An interesting feature of this emendous forest area is that Hars county has more than a million eres of forest land. Yet the largst city in the South-Houstonhe county seat of Harris County as more than a million popula-

The East Texas forest land once as a haven for wildlife. There ere plenty of deer, turkey, bear ind smaller game. The Indians idn't destroy it. The white man

There were game outlaws broughout the forest lands of East exas. They poached. They killd game out of season. They killed nore than the bag limit and were esponsible for many other outages against wildlife.

However, their's were not the nly sins.

Many of the land owners, lookng first to the dollar, with no eye on posterity, cut down hardwoods. raise more pine.

As a result the crop mast disappeared on thousands of acres of land. There was no food for the wildlife.

Unfortunately, some of these and owners were some of the maor ones. They could see no possibilities in anything but tall pines.

And they weren't too particular about polluting the streams either. They were responsible for the killing off of many fish.

It has been only within the last ew years that many land owners ave been sold on the idea that hardwood and pine can grow in the same area, without harming each other. Now there is a comeback in much of the hardwood area.

This is a result of work being carried on by the U. S. Forest Service, the State Forest Service and the Game & Fish Commission. None of it would have been possible, however, without the full cooperation of all the land owners. More than two-thirds of all the wildlife suffers most.

It is much easier to grow a tree than it is to reproduce wildlife.

We can go to other areas and buy a thousand seedlings and restore a piece of property. They will stay there and grow. But with wildlife it is entirely differ-

Abdu Salam Swathi was a guest of Coke Soil Conservation District last week. Swathi is a divisional forest officer from west Pakistan. He spent a day in our area studying range problems and some of our methods of range management and range improvement. Swathi said that some parts of Pakistan are similar in many ways to the country in Coke county and have many of the same problems.

Mrs. Annie Wilkins has recently completed a Great Plains Conservation Program plan on her farm south of Bronte. Practices for this year include rootplowing and seeding on 37 acres, a concrete reservoir for livestock water and 1,000 feet of net wire diversions. The rootplowed area is to be seeded to a mixture of Blue panicum, Switchgrass and Sideoats grama. The area will be deferred for a full growing season before grazing to allow grasses to become established. Mrs. Wilkins also plans to put some of her cropland back to a mixture of Blue panicum, Indiangrass and Sand lovegrass. The land is to be retired because it is sandy and difficult to manage under row crops.

Another Great Plains Conservation Program plan has been completed by H. C. Grafa on his place 3 miles southeast of Bronte. Grafa's plans include pitting and seeding 20 acres to a mixture of Sideoats grama, Buffalograss, Switchgrass and Blue panicum. The pitting is being done to add a seed source of better grasses on his pastures and will be rested at least one full growing season following seeding. In addition to this he plans to construct a concrete reservoir and a pond for stock water and to practice proper use and deferment on his rangeland.
