The four others are brand new. Wylie was appointed to succeed Will Percifull, who resigned, and Waldrop was named for another vacancy when J. F. McCabe Jr. resigned.

Elected new this year were Smith and Counts.

Census enumerators in Coke County are expected to complete their work this week. Mrs. Dale Brown advised The Observer Wednesday morning that she hoped to wind up the count in Robert Lee during the day. Only a few call backs remained for her.

Mrs. Marvin Corley completed her canvass last Friday in just two weeks of work. She covered the west half of the county outside the city limits of Robert Lee. Unofficial report is that she enumerated more than 1,000 persons in the area. Mrs. Corley drove her car more than 1,200 miles in her census work.

Early reports indicate that neither Robert Lee nor Bronte will show much gain in population over the 1950 census.

A. J. Kirkpatrick, Robert Lee newspaper publisher, has been chosen to direct the 1960 Cancer Crusade in Coke County for the fifty year.

Accepting the chairmanship of the annual educational and fundraising drive which continues through April, he urged "all public spirited citizens of our community to make this a full-scale offensive against cancer."

"Public enemy disease number two," the chairman called it, pointing out that cancer is second only to heart disease as a cause of death.

April has been designated Cancer Control Month by Presidential proclamation. During the next two weeks volunteers will distribute life-saving information to every home in the county, the American Cancer Society chairman said, and continued:

"Of course cancer control is a year-round program. But this is the time of year when we go all out to try and save more lives. And it's the time when we ring doorbells and collect funds to sustain the ever-increasing momentum of war against this ancient enemy of mankind. A war that most ultimately end in the defeat of cancer and the saving of countless lives in the generations to come. At the present rate, 265,000 lives every year!

"More than 85,000 of those could be saved right now. They are wasted, literally thrown away, simply because cancer isn't diagnosed and treated early enough. Either because people don't know the facts, or because they procrastinate."

Mr. Kirkpatrick said a quota of those wasted lives are to be found here in Coke County. "So our local drive must be a drive to save those lives," he added. "If our literature reaches every single household, and if a member of every household makes himself, or herself, responsible for safeguarding the rest of the family, we could eliminate this shocking loss of loved ones."

The ultimate defeat of cancer is the great objective of the Cancer Society's research program: It supports more than 1,000 topflight scientists in hundreds of laboratories in all parts of the country. Names of local workers in the Cancer Crusade will be announced within the next few days.

## H. S. Principal, Grade Teacher, Have Been Hired

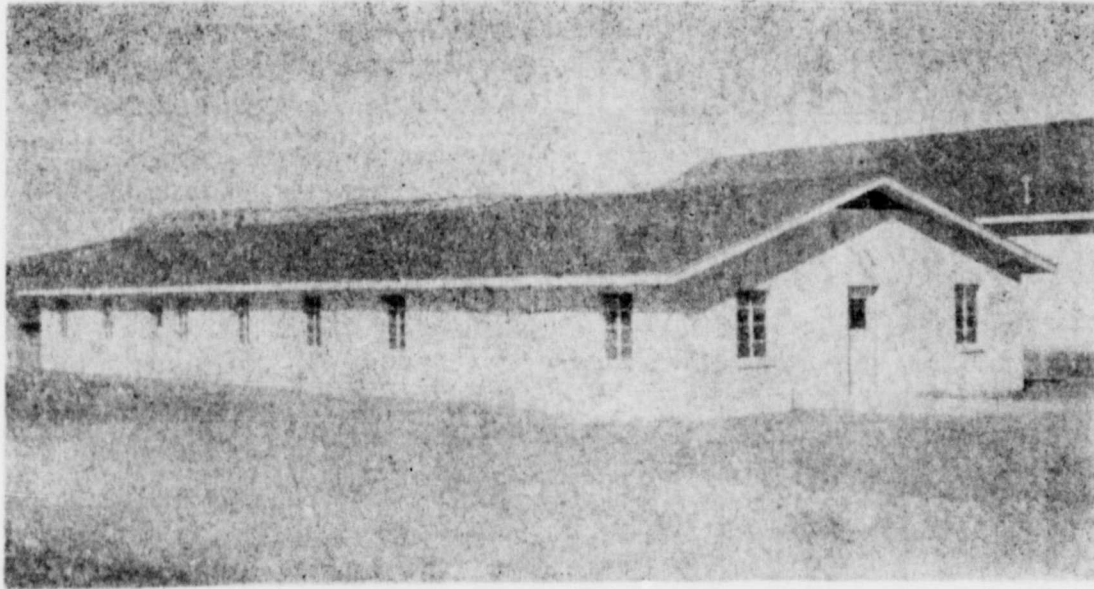

New Educational Building at Silver Baptist Church

## Silver Baptists Will Dedicate New Addition

Next Sunday, April 24, has been set for dedication of the new Educational Building of the Baptist Church at Silver. It also marks the beginning of an 8-day revival meeting.

Rev. Ray N. Sparks of San Angelo, former pastor, will preach at the morning worship. A covered dish dinner will be served at noon in the new Fellowship Hall and the dedication service will be

at 2 p. m.

"Early Days in the Church" will be told by Horace Bloodworth, followed by his son, Raymond, chairman of the building committee, who will present his report.

Rev. Allen R. Cartrite, pastor, will lead the congregation in the dedication ceremony and the sermon will be given by Rev. Walter Walter Mitchel. There will be special music and hymns.

The L-shaped addition contains 5,184 feet of floor space and cost \$30,000. All has been paid except \$12,000.

The contract was let July 28, 1959, to J. D. Burk Construction Co. of San Angelo and the building has been in use for several

weeks.

Walls are of light weight blocks and a concrete floor has been covered with asbestos tile. There is a central heating and cooling system.

The addition provides a number of classrooms, also a nursery, rest rooms, fellowship hall and kitchen.

Members of the congregation helped materially with the building project and did the wiring, plumbing, put on the sheetrock and the painting.

The Silver Baptist Church has 175 resident members. Rev. Cartrite accepted the pastorate in January, 1959, coming to Silver from Clairemont.

We look to the advent of spring as something beautiful. But it's more than that.

Trees that bloom in the spring also produce food and shelter.

Much of Texas is rolling plains with some desert and mountainous areas. Fortunately for the outdoorsman, we still have millions of acres of trees throughout the state. And this timberland is as important to wildlife as are our mountains and our plains.

The average person doesn't realize the vast forest resources within the boundaries of Texas.

For instance: Texas' forest lands cover 22,033,900 acres, more than 55 per cent forested. Commercial forests in the state reach the staggering total of 12,171,900 acres, with a saw-timber volume of 27,239,300,000 board feet.

These Texas timberlands grow wood for some 1,000 mills and factories that provide fulltime jobs for 43,000 persons. They earn in excess of \$138,000,000 per year and the goods they produce are valued at over a half billion dollars.

These are values in cold dollars and cents. Trees are a renewable resource. They continue to grow and new forests can be brought along to take the place of those consumed by the industry.

An interesting feature of this tremendous forest area is that Harris county has more than a million acres of forest land. Yet the largest city in the South—Houston—the county seat of Harris County, has more than a million population.

Houston County, in East Texas, is second in forest area with 88,400 acres.

Thus we have the picture that forests unfold in the economy of Texas. Too few, however, realize the great benefits to our wildlife, which also is a renewable resource.

The East Texas forest land once was a haven for wildlife. There were plenty of deer, turkey, bear and smaller game. The Indians didn't destroy it. The white man did.

There were game outlaws throughout the forest lands of East Texas. They poached. They killed game out of season. They killed more than the bag limit and were responsible for many other outrages against wildlife.

However, their's were not the only sins.

Many of the land owners, looking first to the dollar, with no eye on posterity, cut down hardwoods, to raise more pine.

As a result the crop mast disappeared on thousands of acres of land. There was no food for the wildlife.

Unfortunately, some of these land owners were some of the major ones. They could see no possibilities in anything but tall pines.

And they weren't too particular about polluting the streams either. They were responsible for the killing off of many fish.

It has been only within the last few years that many land owners have been sold on the idea that hardwood and pine can grow in the same area, without harming each other. Now there is a comeback in much of the hardwood area.

This is a result of work being carried on by the U. S. Forest Service, the State Forest Service and the Game & Fish Commission. None of it would have been possible, however, without the full cooperation of all the land owners.

More than two-thirds of all the

forest land in Texas is held in tracts of less than 5,000 acres.

Farmers own some 21 per cent of all the forest land in Texas. The governments, state and federal, own only about 7 per cent. Forest industries own another 27 per cent. All of which means that some 45 per cent of the forest area is held by other private owners.

Another tremendous hazard to wildlife of Texas forests is fire.

Experts estimate that more than 99 per cent of all forest fires are man-made. Man will burn off thousands of acres of timber each year and in turn destroy a great deal of wildlife.

Unfortunately many of these fires are caused by carelessness. Others have been set by responsible persons, for one reason or another. Whatever the cause —

wildlife suffers most.

It is much easier to grow a tree than it is to reproduce wildlife.

We can go to other areas and buy a thousand seedlings and restore a piece of property. They will stay there and grow. But with wildlife it is entirely different.

He was born in Coke County in 1900. Mr. Henderson, a retired farmer, was a veteran of World War II.

ral homes. This was followed by a demonstration on good Citizenship by Blanco County and Tom Green county reminded the ladies of the importance of Civil Defense.

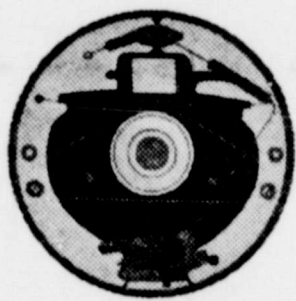
