Skyhawks Upset By Robert Lee In League Game

Richard Dumas held Goodfellow Air Force Base to four hits Saturday night as the Robert Lee Rabbit Twisters scored all their runs in the first two frames to upset the Concho Basin League leaders, 6-4. The contest was played under the lights on the base field. A large number of Twisters fans accompanied the club and enjoyed the victory.

The weekly game, usually played Sunday afternoons, was moved up to Saturday night to beat the heat.

Goodfellow's John Crispino gave up all six Robert Lee runs, but it wasn't entirely his fault. The Twisters got two unearned runs in the opening inning when Jerry Tinkler led off with a single.

Four tallies in the second resulted from hits by third sacker Rogers and Jerry Tinkler, Paul Tinkler's double, a single by Benjie Corley and two Goodfellow misplays.

John Ross succeeded Crispino on the mound and held the Twisters in check. He gave up a single to Corley in the seventh and Tom Allen led off the ninth inning with a base hit.

The airmen got an unearned tally in the fourth when Dumas issued three walks but an error permitted the score.

Blondin, Goodfellow catcher, opened the eighth inning with a homerun and the score was 6-2 going into the bottom of the ninth. Two Robert Lee errors and two walks issued by Dumas permitted two more runs before he struck out the last man to end the game.

Robert Lee got seven hits, two each by J. Tinkler and Corley. Paul Tinkler socked a double in the second into the left field corner and Corley's second hit was a two-bagger. Dumas struck out 11. Ross fanned 7 during the seven innings he hurled.

He graduated from high school at Keisterville and attended college one year before enlisting in the Air Force. During his absence his wife will reside with her parents in Robert Lee.

Rudds Attend Houston Rites For Relative

Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Rudd returned Saturday from Houston where they attended funeral services for their brother-in-law, Major Sidney L. Davis, 41. He was killed July 10 in an army airplane crash in the Panama Canal Zone.

Mrs. Davis is the former Cuter Rudd of Goldthwaite. Besides the widow he is survived by a daughter, Linda, 10, whom they adopted in Hungary during World War II. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Davis of Houston.

Major Davis was assigned to the Army Intelligence Service and had been on duty in Panama since February. Five other men killed in the crash were officers in the same branch of service.

They were making preparations for an inspection and had crossed the isthmus and were on the Atlantic side when the small plane developed engine trouble and crashed into the sea.

Families of the deceased and the bodies were returned to the United States by air. Major Davis was buried Friday in the National Cemetery at Ft. Sam Houston.

He had been in the army 20 years and had served six assignments overseas.

Mrs. Davis and her daughter expect to establish their home in San Antonio.

City Secretary Case Scheduled For Early Trial

The case of Mrs. Virginia Jay, former Robert Lee city secretary, is scheduled to come up in 51st District Court here soon.

The Observer learns that tentative date is Monday, Aug. 15, when a trial jury is expected to be called for duty.

Judge Joe L. Mays has ordered a grand jury for next Monday at 10 a. m. and it is usual court procedure for a trial jury panel to be summoned two weeks later.

Drawn for grand jury duty are A. R. Bagwell, Roy Braswell, T. E. Pitcock, Charlie Davis, R. H. Godwin, Glenn Waldrop, Roy Walker, Walter King, Bob Odom, B. J. Clark, W. W. Ivey, Royce Fancher, Jack Corley, Mrs. Lillian Caraway, Mrs. Otis Smith and Alton Roberts.

Mrs. Jay resigned in April of last year after serving in the city office a number of years. She was succeeded by Jimmy M. Mathis. Later in the summer city officials alleged a shortage in city funds after records were examined by a Ballinger accountant.

She was requested to make a restitution of \$1,002.48 which she did. Later the matter was investigated by a district court grand jury which returned two indictments. She has been under \$1,000 bond on each of the indictments.

Mrs. Jay advises The Observer that she has engaged Royal Hart of San Angelo as her legal counsel, having previously been represented by Glenn Lewis. The latter had also been retained by the City of Robert Lee as legal advisor on occasions during recent years.

Contract Let For New Road Project Here

F. A. Seidel & Sons of Ballinger have been awarded a contract for constructing the new stretch of paved highway leading west out of Robert Lee from the down town section.

The contract let by the State Highway Department in Austin provides for grading, base work and surfacing of 1.27 miles of new Farm to Market Road on a bid of \$31,378. It was higher than the engineer's previous estimate of \$29,000.

Entire cost of the project will be paid from state funds, except additional right of way which was bought with county road money.

The new paved road leads west from the northwest corner of the court house square and joins Highway 158 near the J. E. Roane ranch house.

Work on the project is to start within 15 days.

Additional land for right of way, 100 feet wide, cost \$4,727.00. Land was figured at about \$100 per acre, but most of the cost was for damages to the property owners affected.

Negotiations for the right of way were in charge of Commissioner Fern Havins and an outside appraiser was called in to estimate damages. Payments were made to the following: Dr. J. D. McDaniel \$1,500, Victor Wojtek \$1,300, Della Brandon \$750, J. S. Walker \$450, Lee Roe, executrix for J. A. Roe Estate \$650, Mrs. J. E. Roane \$77.

Three more teachers resigned the past week to create a total of four vacancies in the Robert Lee teaching staff.

Submitting resignations were Mr. and Mrs. Chester Dowell and Robert Lewis Jay. Mrs. Mary Kouvells had previously quit her position as home making instructor.

The Dowells were here one year. Mrs. Dowell taught the first grade and her husband was assistant football coach and had charge of girls basketball.

They have accepted positions in the school at Cal Farley's Boys Town, northwest of Amarillo. They will be furnished a nice home at nearby Channing and their combined salaries will be \$700 more than they received at Robert Lee.

The Dowells came to Robert Lee Saturday and moved their household articles. They had lived in one of the A. B. Sheppard rent houses.

Jay served two years as high school science instructor and band director. He will go to Eldorado at an increased salary and teach high school math and science.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Jay, Robert Lewis obtained his degree from Sul Ross where he was a science major. They have leased their home to the A. K. McInturff family.

Supt. Hervey Latham is expected to return the last of the week from the Army Hospital in Dallas where he underwent surgery for a hearing defect.

Many Features Included In School Repairs

Considerable improvements are being made this summer at the Robert Lee school grounds and buildings. Custodian Sam Fowler is hired on a full year basis and he has had extra help with some of the work.

A badly needed improvement is a new floor in the gym which will get a cover of vinyl asbestos tile. There will be inlaid tile to mark off the basket ball and volley ball courts. A San Angelo firm will have charge of laying the new floor.

One section of the old building will be used for a new shower and dressing room for boys. In the past they have had to use the shower room in the football field house.

Additional shower stalls and other improvements are also slated for the girls dressing rooms near the gym. Roy Taylor and Linsey McDorman are assisting with the projects.

The football field has been improved this year by an underground water sprinkling system and a new turf of bermuda grass has made a fine growth. Football drill is scheduled to start Aug. 15. Some bleacher repairs have also been made.

Decorating and repairs are under way in the lunch room and evaporation coolers are being installed. The lunch room staff has been re-hired, including Mrs. Lena Roe, supervisor, Mrs. Lucille Carwile, Mrs. Velma Mauldin and Mrs. Vernie Smith.

The congregation of Robert Lee's North Side Church of Christ is now enjoying new and more comfortable pews. Bro. Deibert Smith, minister, says the seats are not entirely new, but they are in good condition. They were purchased from a church at Big Spring.

SMALL TALK

This newspaper features several weddings with pictures of the new brides. Aren't they lovely?

In his speech Tuesday night Ike advised that it would be a blessing to the country if the Republicans were kept in office. And that reminded me of the night during the campaign of 1932 when I heard Hoover tell an audience in Des Moines, Iowa, that there would be grass growing up the streets of that that fine city if he wasn't re-elected. A lot of us remember that year and what a blessing it was that FDR went in and pulled us out of the depression.

None of us believe the United States has degenerated into a second rate nation, but we have some spots that need attention. We don't have as many friends around the world as we did 7½ years ago, although we have given away billions of dollars. More people are employed, of course, but the population increases 3 million a year and there are 20 million more people in our country than when Ike went into office.

The auto industry is worried, steel mills are running at little more than half capacity, and all that. Wouldn't it be a greater blessing to let others try their hand at running the government for a while?

After dangling for a year it seems proper that the charges against the former city secretary be either proven or dismissed. A court indictment isn't a conviction and an accused person is considered innocent until proven otherwise. The former city official has not had the opportunity to defend herself of the charges filed against her. In fairness to the accused, the city officials and the community the matter should be disposed of in the proper manner. Nothing is to be gained in a further postponement.

I still feel Robert Lee school trustees are faced with the problem of raising more tax money. We can't keep teachers unless we pay wages comparable to other districts. This week we loose three teachers because they can get better salaries elsewhere. Don't you suppose the people in those districts have to pay school taxes, too? I imagine they have to dig up more than property owners of Robert Lee.

The next Legislature is sure to raise teachers wages and some of the increase will have to be paid by the district. We don't get as much state aid as in previous years and oil production is down.

A majority of our citizens want good schools and are willing to pay for them. A small increase in taxes would be sufficient. We can't downgrade our school!

I've often thought about another angle concerning school teachers. They sign a contract at a certain salary and then up and resign whenever they please. The school district can't fire a teacher. If it does the teacher can collect wages for the term of the contract. Looks pretty one-sided.
