Mixed emotions greeted the rainfor the pasture and stock water ton farmers, particularly those with cotton defoliated preparatory clear weather.

The pasture situation is critical in most areas of the county. In the hills to the north and west where rainfall was received earlier, the pastures are in better shape for the cool season ahead. The county as a whole needs more rain soon to avoid a large feed bill this winter. Stock tanks are low on water and, in some cases, out of water. Pastures are in poor shape for the dormant period a-

The showers should be a starter for much of the countly, but will need more rain soon to be of any appreciable value. Many operators, hoping to improve their pastures, dry planted small grains, primarily oats. Except for the areas receiving the light showers, the dusted in oats should start growth on the rainfall received. If additional moisture comes soon, the oat fields should relieve the situation
