COKE COUNTY'S NEW MARCH OF DIMES CAMPAIGN IS LAUNCHED

Coke County's New March of Dimes Campaign has begun according to Coke County Chairman John H. King.

The change containers have been placed at practically all business establishments and other places where the most people congregate during the normal activity of doing business.

Victor Wojtek, owner and operator of the Alamo Theater in Robert Lee and The Texas Theater in Bronte, will show movies on Friday and Saturday, January 27 and 28 in both towns for the benefit of the March of Dimes. The movies are rated as top movies with well known actors and actresses and they will be entertaining for the entire family.

Froggy's Cafe will have coffee day, Saturday, January 21, in Robert Lee with the proceeds going to the local chapter. Varnadore's coffee day will be Saturday, January 27.

Mrs. W. W. Thetford is chairman of the Mother's March in Robert Lee which will be announced at a later date. Mrs. W. W. Paul is chairman for the campaign for the Silver area. No chairman has been secured for the east side of the county.

Four Robert Lee boy scouts, Glenn Roach, Gary Parker, Drexel Skipworth and Gary Williams, canvassed the spectators of the Fat Stock Show Monday for a total of \$20.00.

Bill Allen, Coke County Financial chairman, said that the county funds are not only exhausted, but the county owes debts that amount to nearly \$6,000.

James M. Eubanks, Coke Native, Killed In Airplane Crash

Funeral services for James M. Eubanks, 44, of Hondo were pending at Clift Funeral Home in Bronte at press time Wednesday. Major Eubanks was killed Sunday night in an Air Force C119 cargo plane crash near Fort Campbell, Kentucky.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Eubanks of Bronte, he was a rancher near Hondo and a member of the active reserve unit at Kelly Field, San Antonio. According to information received here, Major Eubanks was flying as copilot of one of three planes bringing Texas reservists to a jump school at the paratroop center. The other two planes landed safely.

He was born in Bronte October 23, 1916 and graduated from the Bronte High School in 1932. He attended the University of Oklahoma and was an Air Force pilot for five years during World War II. He served in the European theater.

He was married to Tad Charlene Copeland in 1944 in Breckenridge. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Shalor Copeland of Strawn and the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tad Richards of Bronte.

Funeral services are scheduled to be held in First Baptist Church in Bronte, with burial in Fairview cemetery. The Reverend L. L. Vinson is to conduct the services with Clift Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include the wife; one son, Bryan, 13, of Hondo; the parents; two brothers, W. O. Jr., of Odessa and Ivey of Robert Lee; and one sister, Mrs. Walter Gillis of Del Rio.

Bronte Man to Lead Coke Vets Of World War I

Veterans of World War I held an enthusiastic meeting at the court house in Robert Lee Thursday night, Jan. 12, and organized a Coke County Barracks.

H. O. Whitt of Bronte was elected commander and A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee is the quartermaster (treasurer). Other officers, including vice-commanders and an adjutant will be chosen later.

Roger Q. Evans of Baird, state commander of the World War I Veterans of the U. S. A., addressed the group and explained the aims of the organization whose membership is limited to veterans of 1917-18.

Commander Evans will go to Washington, D. C., this weekend where he will assist in framing a legislative program to be submitted to Congress. A pension of \$100 per month is sought for all World War I Veterans, along with medical care and treatment in Veterans Hospitals and welfare measures for veterans' widows.

A highly interesting film was shown of anti-American congressional committee hearings last May in San Francisco. Riots were staged by hundreds of young people under direction of Communist leaders.

Coke County barracks started off with 11 members and charter memberships will be accepted at least until the next meeting which has been set for Thursday, Feb. 2, at the County Park community building in Robert Lee. Meetings during the year will be alternated between Robert Lee and Bronte.

Annual dues were set at \$5.00. Of this \$1.00 goes to the national organization, \$1.25 to the state and 50c to the district. It includes subscriptions to the national and state monthly publications.
