Some of the people of our community have been asking a few of the bill before the U. S. House and Senate concerning federal aid for sehools.
First, there is no official Catho-
ic attitude toward federal athoschools. Insofar as the mode or way of distributing tax money is a political question, there is no official Catholic attitude, becaus the Church officially has nothing to do with polities, only matter of Faith \& Morals. Therefore, let me repeat, there is no official attitude of the Church toward the present bill before the U. S. House \& Senate.
There is much confusion con cerning this bill. The confusion, in my mind, rests in the fact that there is a careless use of terms I have before me a monthly mag azine published in St. Louis, en titled "Fair Share News." It is put out by "Citizens for Educational Freedom," 3109 S. Grand Blvd., St. Louis 18, Mo. In it, too is this careless use of words. Thi magazine, which is supported by non-Catholics, Catholics and Jews, all types of professional men, has as its purpose: To obtain justic for all children
Every Child.'
But their carelessness in using or making the distinction between the school and the child is quite apparent. I think that is the same problem that some members of the Catholic Church have in pre senting this bill to the variou groups in the House \& Senate. The fair share plan asks that parents of the child. They are parents of the child. They are opposed to the present method of board. Only those who attend board. Only those who attend authority will receive the benefit
of the tax monies.
Those who attend a school which is not under the authority of this school board will not receive any
school board is discrimatory; given to parents, instead, all are treated alike.

So, those who are in favor of a Fair Share" for every child, desire that the tax money for education should go to the parents, not to the school board. The parents have the right, the freedom of choice, the liberty to choose any legitimate type of education hat they may desire for their children. Then the tax monies gathered for that purpose will be sent to the parents for the exlusive use of education. Then, every citizen would have equal rights and equal freedom of

This is a custom already invokd by the government. It cannot herefore, be against the constiution. The Federal Gov't. will now send money to any G.I. who fled certain regulations. The G.I an select his own school, his own ype of education. He has a free lom of choice. He selects the kind of education he wants, and where he wants it, as long as the type of education, or the school which he chooses comes up to the standard of education, he will reeive money to attend that school of HIS choice. That same privilege this group is asking for the rade school child.
