Income, Payroll, and Sales Tax Battle

Some people think there is no justice. If you make out your income tax correctly, you go to the poorhouse. If you don't, you go to jail. Actually, this is not so.

An argument used in favor of the income tax is that the largest taxies are levied on those most able to pay. The small wage-earner may have little or no income tax to pay under a progressive tax law. The wealthy taxpayer may be taxed a large part of his income, but he will still have enough money left to be able to live comfortably.

A disadvantage of the income tax is that it is harder to collect than property or excise taxes. People sometimes conceal part of their income from the government. This situation is unfair to honest persons who pay the proper amount of

Everything is so high anyway, what harm will a few more cents do in the form of a sales tax?

When I go to work, I would surely hate to see more "blasted" deductions from my check or an increased income tax. I would rather see the sales tax on ridiculously exhorbitant articles that I generally couldn't afford to buy anyway.
