little has been done in the matter of cleaning up taxes on city lots, especially where the owner is known.

Such action would also be the means of clearing titles on many small pieces of property throughout the city. It is impossible to buy a lot if the owner isn't known and taxes on it have not been paid for many years.

Court procedure would include filing a suit in district court and selling the property to the highest bidder after due notice was given. A claimant to ownership would have a redemption period of two years, after which a tax title would be good.

This thing has come up for discussion on previous occasions, but has never been followed through. Some of the lots in question are quite valuable, while others might not be worth more than the taxes.

By its action this week the Board of Community Development is asking again that county, school and city officials proceed with this business. Especially since a firm is already under contract to carry on this work.
