State Authorities To Kill Fish Saturday

It is necessary that all fish in Mountain Creek Reservoir near Robert Lee be killed by personnel of the Texas Game and Fish Commission here Saturday, for the eradication of rough or undesirable fish.

Although it is necessary to eliminate all fish in the Mountain Creek reservoir, any fish killed will be welcome to the public. The type of toxicant used simply paralyzes the gills of the fish, preventing them from breathing and therefore does not render the meat inedible. It is hoped that the sportsmen of the area will lend a hand while picking up good fish by also taking the rough fish from the lake. It is intended that a thorough clean-up of all fish be

made for sanitation purposes.

Mayor W. D. McAdams said this week that "we (the City Commission) have recommended that the Texas Game and Fish Biology Department make numerous tests at Mountain Creek Lake to determine the per cent of rough fish contained in the lake. The last test was made in September of 1960 and the test showed that approximately 9 out of every 10 fish was in the rough category."

Roy Linn, biologist of Texas Game and Fish Commission Biology Department, and other personnel of the department will effect the kill Saturday. The lake will be restocked shortly thereafter with largemouth bass and catfish raised by the State Fish Hatcheries.

No fishing will be allowed in the lake for a period ranging from 12 to 18 months. The fishery biologists will sample the lake periodically to determine exactly the best time to reopen the lake to fishing.

In the invitational class, blue

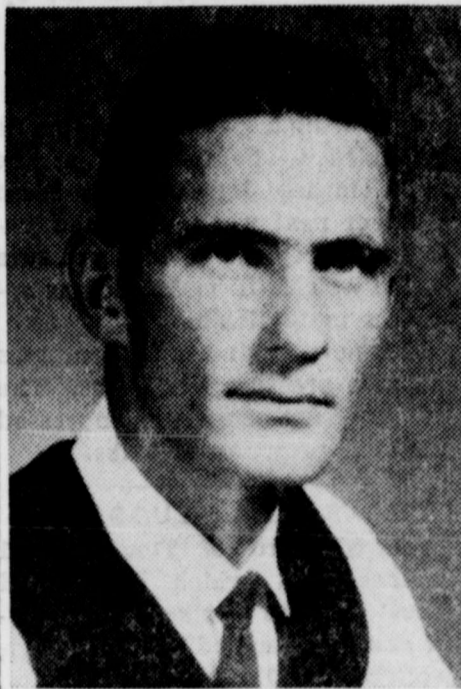
ribbon winner was Mrs. Bobbie Hatley.

Bank Deposits Show Increase

Bank deposits and resources of the Robert Lee State Bank showed an increase with the call made by the State Banking Authorities at the close of business on April 12 compared to the call on March 15, 1960.

The total increase in bank resources was \$23,430.66. Deposits showed an increase of \$19,141.64. Total resources at the close of business on March 15, 1960 were \$1,890,690.33 and on April 12 of this year were \$1,914,120.89.

Deposits at the close of business last year were \$1,753,072.98 and this year \$1,772,222.62.

The increase in deposits and resources in April of this year over March of last year reveals a healthy situation in the economy of Robert Lee. "Normally deposits in the month of April are below the month of March due to withdrawals for taxes and other items that come due in April" said Gerald Allen, president of Robert Lee State Bank.

Students Win At Regional Meet

Students from Robert Lee High School placed in many events held at the Regional Interscholastic League Meet held in Stephenville this past week-end. Three of these students will represent the school, district, and region in the State Meet to be held in Austin, Friday and Saturday, May 5 and 6.

In the literary division, Brenda Sue McDorman and Gayle Lewis carried the orange and black to a team victory in the journalism contest. First places were won by Brenda Sue in editorial writing, copy-reading, and feature writing, and second places were won in headline writing and news writing. Gayle won a first place in

headline writing. The high ranking team does not participate in the state meet, but the two high individuals do, and Brenda Sue will participate in the journalism contests in Austin. A student from Whitney will be the other journalism representative.

Vicki Wojtek, a senior student, won first place with her ready writing theme entitled "Who is an Educated Man?" She will participate in the state ready writing contest.

The one-act play, "Strange Road," placed third in the regional one-act play contest in a field of seven plays. Barbara Gray was chosen as a supporting actress. Other cast members were Glenda Blair, Brenda Cowley, and Tommy Allen.

In the track and field division, Robert Lee scored a total of 27 points, the most scored by any school in this area. Curtis Higginbotham ran in the finals of the 220 yd. dash and placed fifth with a time of 22.6. Bill Ledbetter tied for third place with a vault of 11'0". The winning vault was 11'6" by Green of Bangs, a co-champion of the Class B State Meet last year.

Richard Sims, the Steer hurdler, carried away all the honors in the hurdles by winning the 120 yd. high hurdles in a time of 15.6 (Sims had a time of 15.3 in the preliminaries), and he ran the 180 yd. low hurdles with a time of 20.2. He was on the way to running his best time of the year in the low hurdles when he stumbled as he came off the last hurdle and threw himself off stride. Sims tied for 3rd high individual of the track and field meet.

Other students representing Robert Lee at the regional meet were Clark Gowin in number sense, and John Kinsey, Mike Hollis, and James Blankenship in the track and field events.

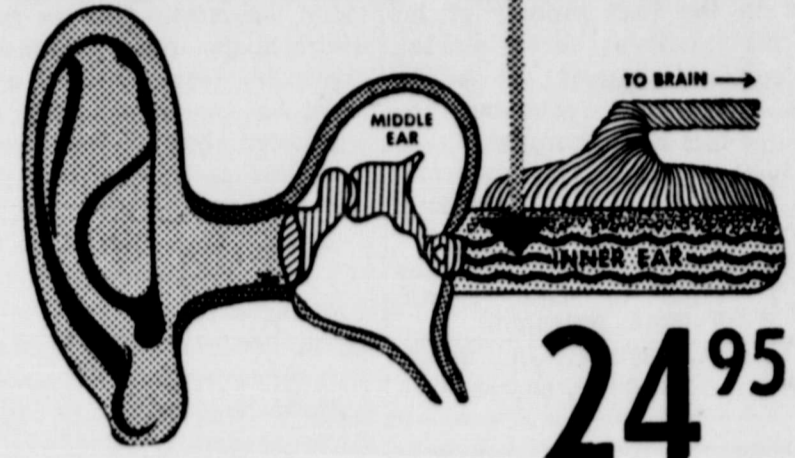

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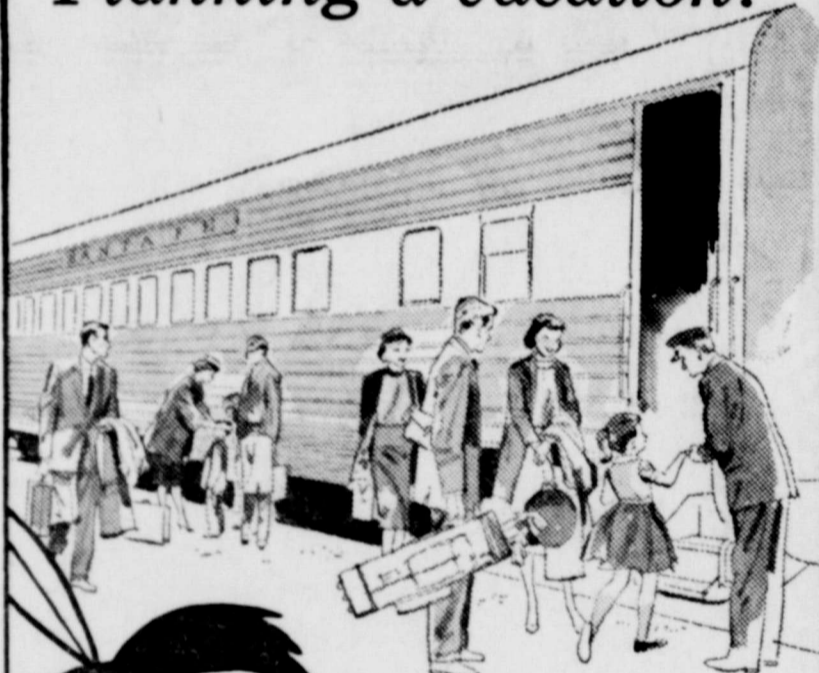

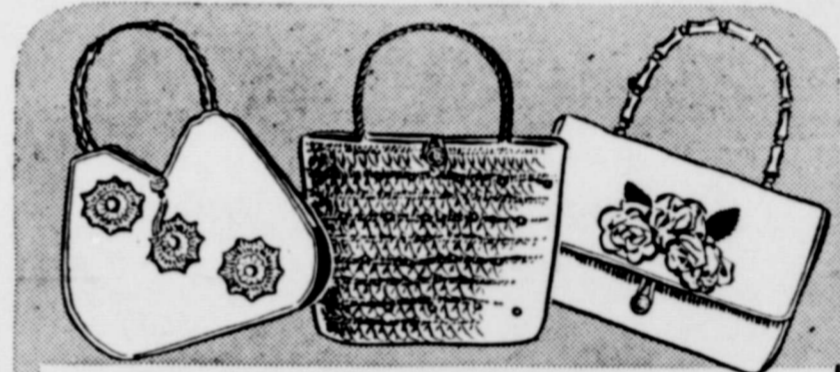
