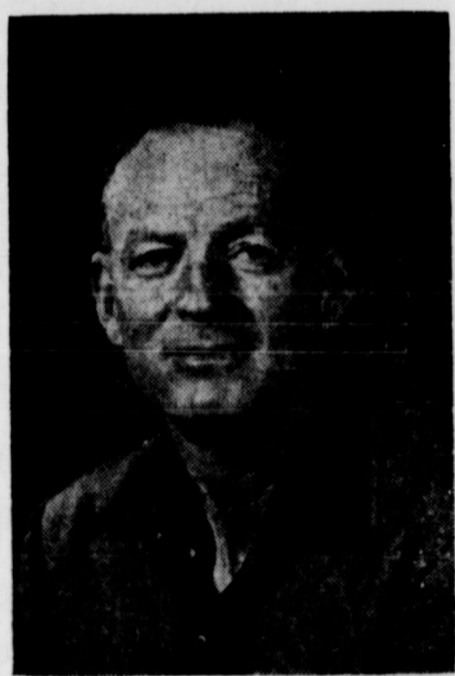

graduated from high school at Big Lake, Texas. He holds a B. S. degree in animal husbandry from Texas A & M. After five years as a pilot in the US Air Force, Mr. Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas State hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

"The short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled," said Barton, but also he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operation in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.

"Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M College," stated E. V. Walton, head of the Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A & M, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M College.

Beneficial Rains Cover Entire Area

Beginning in the early morning hours Friday rain fell over the parched pastures and farm land of Coke County. The rain Friday measured from 2 to 3 inches, and another ½ inch fell Monday that brought the year's total to 7.11 inches.

Due to rains on the watersheds of the Colorado River above Sil-

ver, the river had a rise of 21.11 feet at the Texas Gauging Station 5 miles southwest of Silver. In some places the Colorado River went out of its banks near Robert Lee.

Among those reporting Friday's rainfall was Melvin Krall 3 inches, J. O. Rudd 1.8 and 2.8 inches, Gene Baker 3 inches, Fred McCabe 3 inches and F. C. Clark 1.88.

It was generally agreed that Monday's rain was ½ inch over the entire county.

Farmers and ranchers are now optimistic about the agriculture prospects for the year in the county.

Senatorial Election To Be Held Sat.

Coke County voters along with the other Texas voters will elect a U. S. Senator Saturday that will serve the State of Texas for the next six years.

In the primary election of April 4 with approximately 70 candidates in the race, democrat candidate William (Bill) Blakley led in the county with 182 votes; however, John Tower, Republican Candidate, led in the State over all the other candidates but not with enough majority to win the election without a runoff.

Only about 50% of the qualified voters went to the polls in April. If the 4 absentee votes that have been cast are an indication of the percentage that will go to the polls Saturday, then the vote will be lighter than it was April 4.

There has been little active electioneering for either candidate in the county this past month.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m. Saturday.

Most Businesses Will Close Tuesday

Memorial Day, Tuesday, May 30, is one of the 7 holidays of the year observed by the city, county, and most business establishments in Robert Lee.

The Robert Lee State Bank, the U. S. Post Office, city and county offices, and most of the business establishments will be closed here Tuesday in observance of Memorial Day.

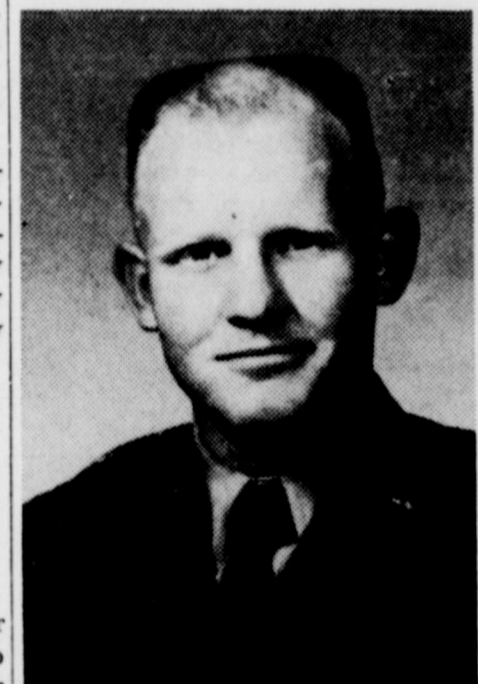
In March of 1960 representatives of the county, city and business establishments agreed that Memorial Day would be one of the 7 legal holidays to be observed in Robert Lee.

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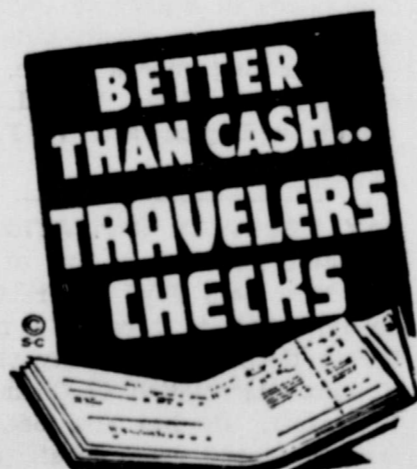

County Agents News Column

"When should I spray my pecan trees?" I've heard that question several times in the last two weeks. Everyone wants to keep the deadly nut case bearer from taking their pecan crop.

The question is one that is well taken at this season of the year, but is one that is difficult to give a concrete, one specific day answer to. The casebearer hatch over a period of several days. The ideal time to spray is when the first eggs are hatching and

have the spray on the tree when the maximum hatch occurs. And the spray must be in the vicinity of the cluster or your work will be in vain. The casebearer never moves further than the second bud away from a cluster of nuts unless he is forced to, to find food.

I checked trees in six locations in Robert Lee and in three locations at or near Bronte the first of the week. I found no eggs on the nut clusters on the trees checked at Bronte. The first generation—in the stem—had been completed so egg laying probably has started by now. If they do build up in any numbers in the Bronte area I believe the peak will hatch early next week. I will do further checking in the area. From our present observations I would spray on Monday or Tuesday, the 29 or 30. If you wish to spray twice, then I would spray on Saturday, the 27, and again on Thursday, June 1.

The six locations checked in Robert Lee produced eggs and/or casebearers at each stop checked. The eggs hatched, we believe, are eggs deposited by our "early bird." I believe the maximum build up is yet to come. No heavy deposits were found on any of the trees checked.

As for spraying in the Robert Lee area, spraying done from Thursday, the 25th, to Monday, the 29th, should give good protection. If you desire to spray

twice, I would spray on Thursday or Friday then again on Tuesday or Wednesday of next week.

Several chemicals have given good control of casebearers when properly applied. DDT, Malathion, Taxaphene and Nicotine sulfate have all proven capable. Be sure to use ample pressure—400 pounds on large trees—to part the leaves and allow the chemical to reach the cluster of nuts. Also, be sure to add zinc sulfate to your mix to help control rosette. Most trees in the area will respond to a zinc treatment, even though they are not rosetted.

The casebearer build up is light so far. We hope it does not increase. If it does, spraying at the proper time will give you protection against the costly insect.

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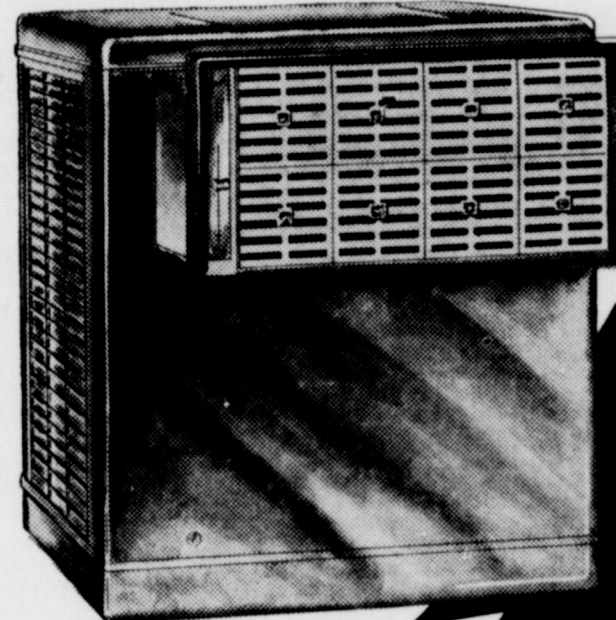


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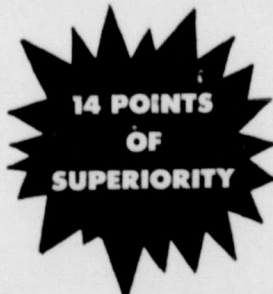
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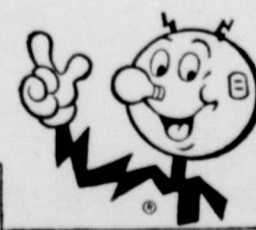
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Silver News

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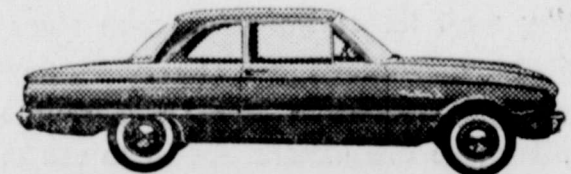

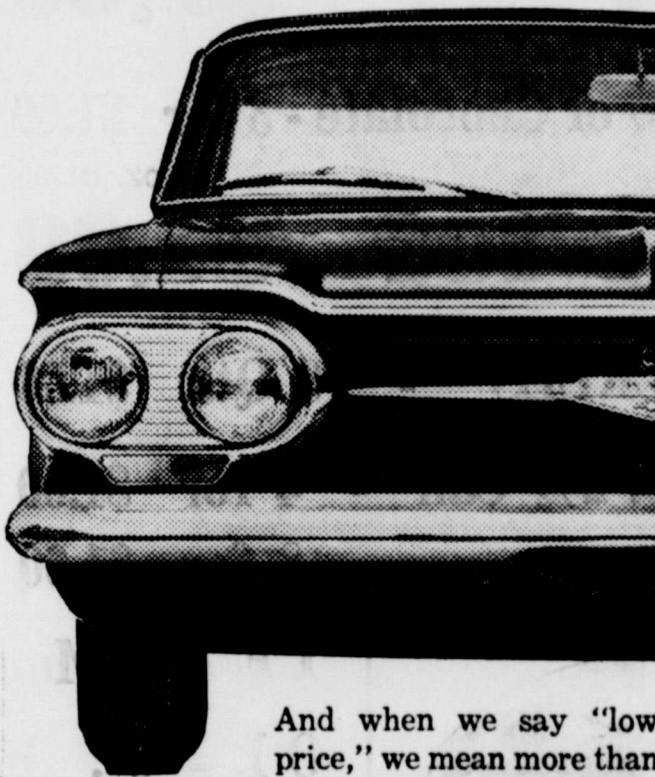
