
Coke County Farmers and Ranchers Taking Welding Course This Week





It was generally agreed that Monday's rain was 1/2 inch over the entire county.


Farmers and ranchers are now optimistic about the agriculture prospects for the year in the county.

Senatorial Election To Be Held Sat.

Coke County voters along with the other Texas voters will elect a U. S. Senator Saturday that will serve the State of Texas for the next six years.

In the primary election of April 4 with approximately 70 candidates in the race, democrat capdidate William (Bill) Blakley led in the county with 182 votes; however, John Tower, Republican Candidate, led in the State over all the other candidates but not with enough majority to win the eleetion without a runoff.

Only about 50% of the qualified voters went to the polls in April. If the 4 absentee votes that have been cast are an indication of the percentage that will go to the polls Saturday, then the vote will be lighter than it was April 4. There has been little active electioneering for either candidate in the county this past month. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m. Saturday.






