Homecoming At Sanco to Be Held Sunday

Sanco Community, just off Highway 208 between Robert Lee and Silver, next Sunday, June 4, celebrates its continued existence as a rural ranch community since 1887, with the annual Homecoming.

Started originally as a Memorial Day observance, the annual gathering still observes a memorial for all those Sanco people, their neighbors, or relatives, including all who once lived in the community, who have passed on during the past twelve months.

The oldest post office now in operation in the county, the site of many camp meetings during the first forty years of this century, the locality was historically named for two Comanche chiefs, Saneco and Yellow Wolf, the community maintains one of the oldest cemeteries in the county, a large tabernacle for annual gatherings and a young people's camp, as well as a community center in the former school building.

Each year some five hundred letters are mailed out to former residents and their families, and interested friends. It is not an invitation meet, however, and everyone who cares to come is welcome.

A program is held beginning at 10:30 in the morning, basket dinner is spread under the tabernacle at noon. The meet is attended by people widely scattered over Texas and other states; one man reared in the community flying from California last year to meet his boyhood playmates, others coming from as far east as Mississippi.

Rev. Lewis To Go To Boerne Church

The Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church convened in San Antonio from May 22-27, and in addition to its many other decisions, made several changes in pastoral appointments. Robert Lee was one of the churches which had a pastoral change.

The Rev. Mr. Lewis, who has been serving the Methodist Church here since early in January of this year, was assigned to Boerne, Texas, a little town with 2200 population and situated in the hill country 30 miles west of San Antonio. The Boerne church

serves 425 members and was established in 1885. The Rev. Mr. Lewis will also be giving part time ministry to Kendalia, a small rural community 22 miles from Boerne. The present parsonage family will be moving to Boerne on Thursday, June 1.

Robert Lee's new pastor is the Rev. Mr. D. G. Salter. Mr. Salter is a graduate of Trinity University of San Antonio and Perkins School of Theology, SMU, of Dallas. He entered the Naval Chaplaincy in 1953 and has been serving in that capacity since that time. His service in the Navy has taken him to England, Spain, Italy, Greece, Lebanon and he has traveled extensively in the United States. He is now stationed at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station where he will complete his tour of duty on June 30 and will begin his ministry here the first Sunday in July. Dr. Lawrence Brown, district superintendent of the San Angelo District, will make provision for pastoral leadership at the Robert Lee Church during the interim.

Mrs. Salter was born in Sulphur Springs, Texas, and is a graduate of East Texas State Teachers College, where she received her degree in 1951. Their two children are Cary Ann, 6, and Michael Gene, 4.

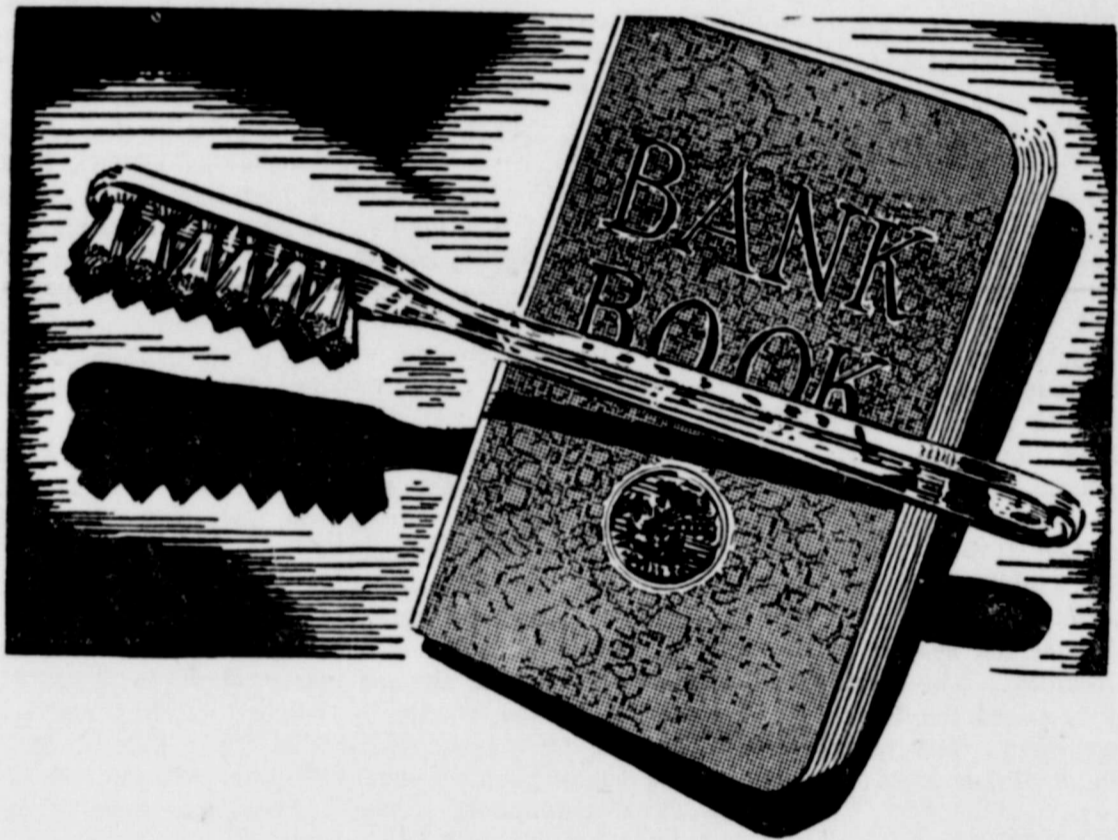

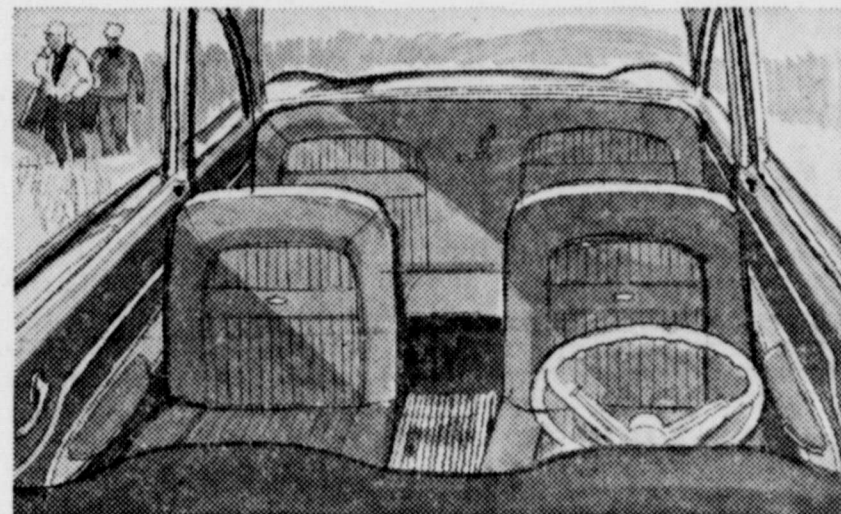

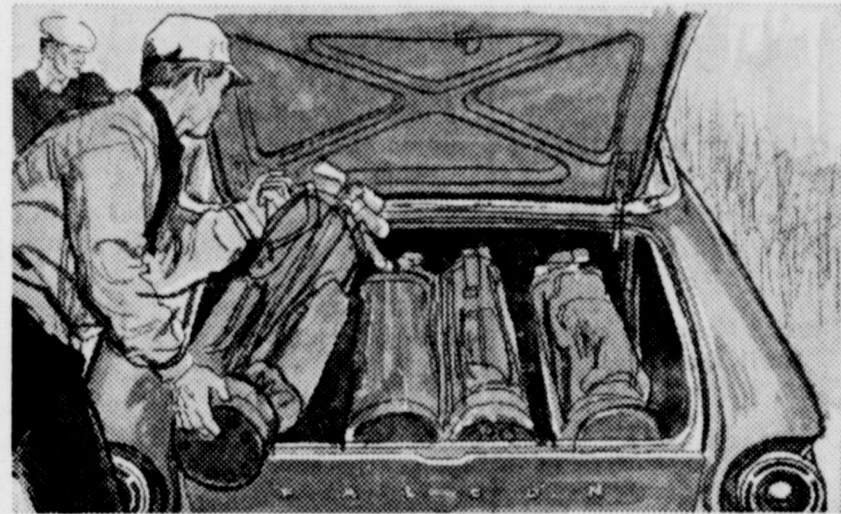
