Wildcat Test Staked On Wendland Ranch

Western Petroleum Co. will drill the No. 1 H. G. Wendland Estate as a 3,800-foot Swastika wildcat in Coke County, 12 miles southeast of Robert Lee and ¼-mile east-southeast of the Wendkirk (Cisco) field.

Location, on a 170-acre lease, is 3,030 feet from the southwest and 330 feet from the northwest lines of Frederick Merkel Survey No. 455.

Humble 1 Arledge is at approximately 4,000 feet in lime.

Tucker 2 Bird, 4,907 feet in sand and shale.

Oil well drilling has become more active in recent weeks after being almost dormant for the past year.

United States Smelting, Refining & Mining Co. and J. P. White, et al, Midland, will drill a 7,200-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Coke

County, 10 miles west-southwest of Robert Lee and five miles south of the I. A. B. multipay Pennsylvanian field. It is the No. 1 Burns.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 281-2-H&TC.

It is ¾-mile east-northeast of United States Smelting, Refining & Mining Co. No. 1 Schooler, a 7,090-foot Ellenburger failure, abandoned May 27, 1959. A drill-stem test in the Ellenburger between 7,020-90 feet recovery sulphur water.

Arctic Film Is Shown

Major Nathan Douthit, U. S. A. F., presented a documentary film Wednesday at 8:30 p. m. in the school auditorium on the Arctic Terrain which included the Greenland Ice Cap, Centram Lake and the Ellesmere Ice Shelf which is 360 nautical miles from the North Pole.

The colored film was shown by a 16mm projector which portrayed how the U. S. Air Force is dealing with the operations of aircraft on skis. One scene showed a Lockheed C130 aircraft making takeoffs and landings in an area where an airplane had never been before.

Deposits Increase As Loans Drop

The Robert Lee State Bank revealed a healthy increase of deposits on the June 30 call of statement of condition of the State Banking Authorities and the Federal Reserve Bank of this district over the same period of 1960.

Deposits in the local bank at the close of business on June 30 were \$1,810,824.52 as compared to \$1,767,968.89 on June 15, 1960, or a gain of \$42,855.63.

Loans were down at the call by \$5,532.89. At this period last year

loans were \$666,456.40 as compared to \$660,923.51 this year.

The call of April 12 for the statement of condition for the first quarter showed that the Robert Lee State Bank had total deposits of \$1,772,222.62. The second quarter call shows a gain of \$38,601.90. Loans were \$697,196.16 for the first quarter, \$4,272.65 more than the second quarter.

Gerald Allen, president of the Robert Lee State Bank accounted for the increase in deposits due to the fact that the general condition and immediate outlook for bigger crops and better range lands are much better at this time this year over last year.

The recent generous rains make crop and range prospects look better for this year than they have in many years past.
