They stopped in Austin enroute to Robert Lee and sat in the gallery of the State Legislature.

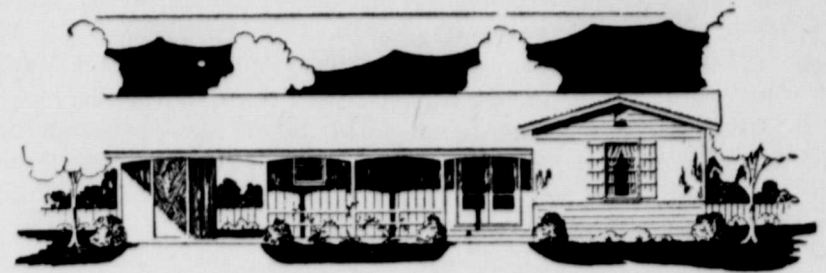

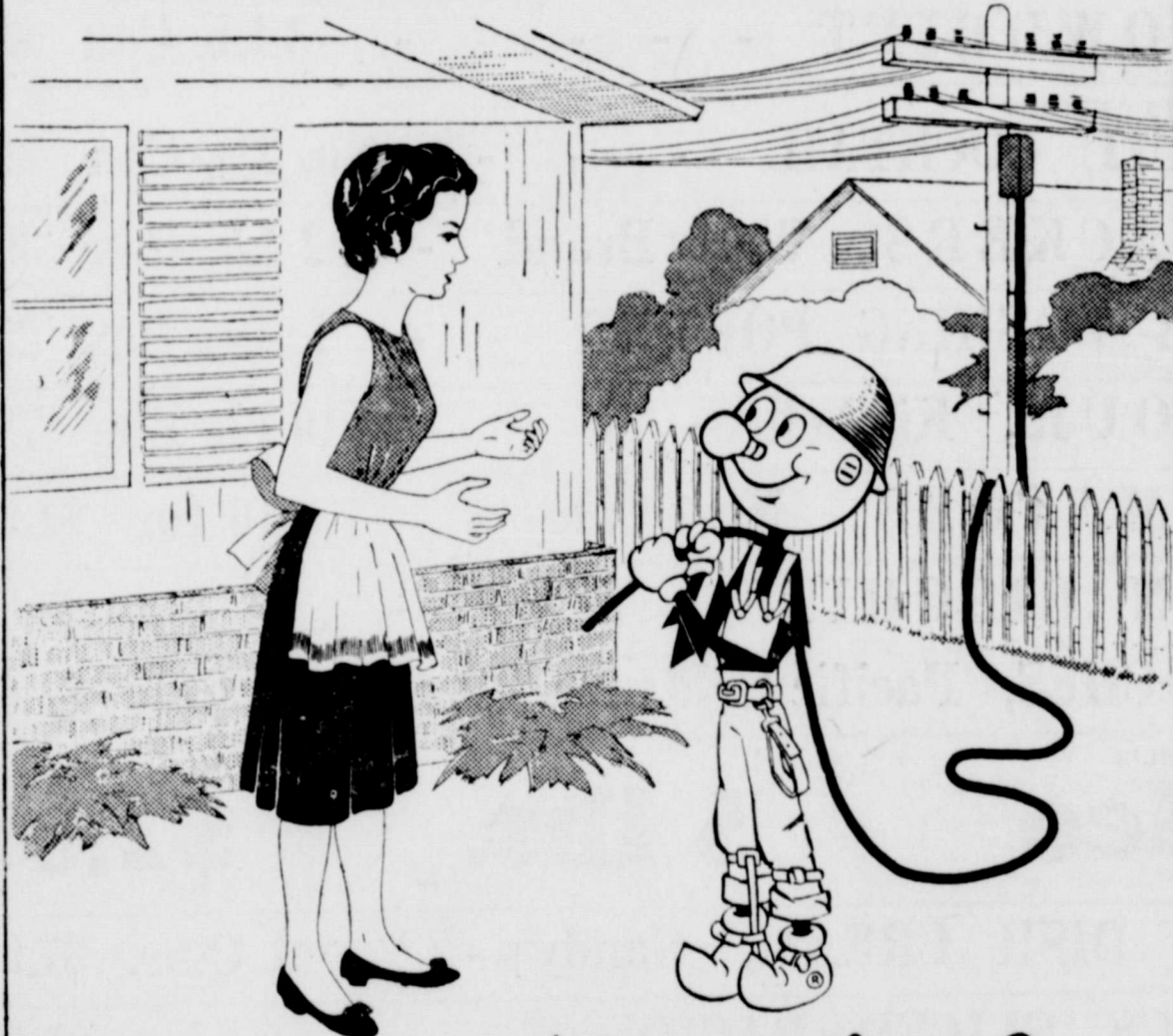
