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## Steers Reluctantly Give In To Eagles

Coach John Malone's Class 6-B Steers made the Eldorado Eagles put forth effort equal only to a championship football contest before they bowed to one of Texas's highest ranked class A teams 12 to 0 here Friday night.

Eldorado's first touchdown came in the closing moments of the first half of play when Donny Holden received a punt off the toe of Joe Roe on the Eagles' 43 yard line, and with the aid of 6 big Eldorado blockers, who opened a through highway downfield, Holden went all the way to the end zone.

On the attempt for extra points, the entire Robert Lee eleven swarmed into the visitors' backfield with such speed that Eldorado's kicker missed the uprights.

Eldorado's hard working quarterback, Jim Cheek, went around right end from the 1 yard line to make the final score for the evening in the 3rd quarter. The attempt for extra points failed.

One of the outstanding plays of

the evening occurred early in the first quarter when the Robert Lee squad assembled in running formation and Comie Hallmark quickly kicked from his own 41 yard line to Eldorado's 1 yard line.

Outstanding defensive plays were executed by Derwood Coalsen, John Kinsey, Comie Hallmark, Joe Roe, Curtis Higginbotham, Lynn White, Rusty Dodson and Jerry Craig.

The Steers were hampered Friday night with a small reserve strength, and in the 3rd period quarterback John Kinsey and halfback Curtis Higginbotham were sidelined due to injuries.

Other Steers that saw action Friday night were John Jacobs, Clark Godwin, Bill Roach, Jimmy Caraway, Charles Askins, Taylor Jones, Dwain Walker, Eddy Parker and Robert Holland.

During halftime activities Miss Jo Alice Evans of Robert Lee High School performed for the capacity crowd with a flaming baton routine.

The game Friday night was viewed with great interest from the hundreds of fans attending the contest. Both teams played heads-up football during the entire period of play.

## Man Found Dead North of Bronte In Locked Car

An Odessa man was found dead about 3 p. m. Tuesday in a locked car three miles north of Bronte. Law officers identified the man as James Wesley Phillips, 54, an oil field worker.

Conducting the investigation were Sheriff Melvin Childress and Deputy Jesse Parker. Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles ruled that the man died of suffocation, as the windows of the car were tightly shut and the vehicle was locked from the inside.

Joe Ed Scott, Bronte butane dealer, found the body.

The car was stuck in the mud, caused by Monday's rain. The car ignition was turned to locked position and the car keys were found in the dead man's pocket. Tracks around the car matched the shoes Phillips had on. Officers said there was no evidence of foul play. Papers in the car indicated that Phillips was born in Comanche County, but was living in Odessa.

The body was brought to Clift Funeral Home in Bronte and after relatives had been located, it was moved to Stevens Funeral Home in Coleman where funeral arrangements are pending.

Survivors include three sisters, Susie Talley of Lampasas, Lela Barrington of Jacksboro and Willie Eldridge of Coleman, and one brother, Fred Phillips of Grand Prairie.

## State Librarian To Be Here

Mrs. Rosalyn Hamblin, acting state librarian of the State of Texas Library Department, will appear at a meeting Wednesday, October 18, to discuss the possibilities of library services in Coke County.

Judge W. W. Thetford has called the meeting for 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, October 18, at the conference room in the courthouse.

"All clubs, Parent-Teachers Associations and civic organizations are urged to have their delegates present at this meeting for the purpose of organizing library facilities for Coke County," Judge Thetford said Tuesday.

Individuals who are also interested in this project are invited to attend this county wide meeting.

## Robert Lee Reservoir Is Included In Lake Study

The U. S. Study Commission for Three River Basins revealed that the Robert Lee Reservoir in Coke County, located on the Colorado River approximately 7 miles southeast of Robert Lee, will be included in the proposed lake projects that are to be completed by 1975.

Gov. Price Daniel was presented the study Monday for the State's comments before it goes to President Kennedy for transmittal to Congress.

Two categories are set up. The first is the reservoirs the Commission thinks will be needed by 1975, the second is those which will need to be built between 1975 and 2010.

Function of the reservoirs will be for drinking water, recreational purposes, irrigation, flood control and industrial usage.

The projects the commission hopes to accomplish in West Texas are:

1. The Robert Lee Reservoir in Coke County below the site on

which the Colorado River Municipal District plans a reservoir. A \$30,603,000 project, it will impound 356,000 acre feet of water, all for conservation purposes, and yield 47,000 acre feet a year for use.

2. The Camp Colorado Reservoir, backing water up Hordes and Jim Ned Creeks in Coleman County. It will impound 293,000 acre feet of water of which 165,000 acre feet would be for flood control and 128,000 for conservation, yielding 24,500 acre feet a year for use. Cost would be \$15,886,000.

3. The Stacy Reservoir in Coleman, Runnels and Concho counties at the junction of the Concho and Colorado. It would have 652,000 acre feet capacity, all for conservation of water and would yield 93,800 feet a year.

Since there is no federal participation in purely conservation projects, it would have to be financed by someone needing the water. Its cost would be \$19,976,000.

4. The Seymour Reservoir in Haskell and Stonewall counties, with the dam at the junction of the Salt and Double Mountain Forks of the Brazos. It would impound 1,000,500 acre feet for conservation and 1,035,000 for flood control, yielding 98,500 acre feet for municipal and industrial usage. Costing \$50,745,000, it would be the second largest of the 18 reservoirs proposed in the Brazos Basin.

Projects to be built by 2010 include the Fox Crossing in Mills County west of Goldthwaite at the juncture of Pecan Bayou and the Colorado. It would have a capacity of 2,337,000 acre feet, of which 1,011,000 would be for conservation and 1,326,000 for flood control. Cost would be \$34,700,000 and it would yield 122,000 acre feet of water a year.

Austin P. Hancock of Abilene is a member of the study commission as the representative of the State Board of Water Engineers.

## IVEY TO SHOW NEW FORD FAIRLANE MODELS NOVEMBER 2

Ivey Motor Company, local Ford Dealership, is scheduled to display the new Ford Fairlane here on November 2.

Complete details and photographs of the new Ford Fairlane—the first all new car line to be introduced by Ford Division since the announcement of the Falcon in the fall of 1959—were released today.

Available in two- and four-door models, both in a Fairlane and a more luxuriously appointed Fairlane 500 series, the new car line is the fourth series of cars introduced by Ford Division this year. The 1962 Falcon, Galaxie and Thunderbird models are currently on sale at Ford dealerships.

Lee A. Iacocca, Ford Motor Company vice president and general manager of the Ford Division, said that "in addition to offering the parking ease of the Falcon and the turnpike performance and handling characteristics of the 1962 Ford Galaxie, the Fairlane has all of the 'twice-a-year maintenance features available on the more costly Galaxie."

The new Fairlane is a standard size car with a passenger compartment larger than the interior of the 1959 Ford and an over-all length almost equal to the 1949 Ford sedan.

As a power source, a new, optional lightweight 221-cubic-inch V-8 engine, the first economy V-8 ever produced, is being offered on the Fairlane.

With a wheel base of 115.5 inches, the Fairlane is right between the Falcon and the Galaxie. In its over-all dimensions, the Fairlane is 16 inches longer than the Falcon and 12 inches shorter than the Galaxie.

The new addition to the Ford family of cars will be introduced in Ford dealer showrooms on November 2.

### STYLING

The Fairlane's styling marks it as a member of the Ford car family. Its grille, Thunderbird roof line and slight fins that encompass round taillights, matched with its squared-off silhouette, show a distinct resemblance to earlier Ford Galaxie models.

Modest fins atop each rear fender drop gently in the center of the rear door to join a sweep spear molding which extends into the front fender.

The flatness of the hood and fenders creates an impression of added length in the front end.

The Fairlane roof, a modified

version of the Thunderbird roof style, features a thin line design providing for adequate entrance room and at the same time maintaining the low silhouette appearance. Squareness of the roof is emphasized by the flush back light treatment.

Tear drop shaped ornaments on the rear fenders, chrome window frames, and a grille-like rear panel distinguish the Fairlane 500.

More than 3650 square inches of window space provide excellent visibility in all directions.

Thirteen exterior colors with eight interior trim combinations are offered in the Fairlane 500 series. Twelve exterior colors with four interior trim combinations are offered in the Fairlane series.

The car is designed to provide maximum driving comfort and utility with a minimum of vehicle maintenance, and will offer all of the twice-a-year maintenance features introduced earlier this year on the more costly Ford Galaxie.

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

Austin, Tex.—Three members of the House of Representatives and two state senators were named by Sen. Bruce A. Reagan of Corpus Christi as a Subject Matter Committee to determine which of 25 suggested interim studies shall be made by the Texas Legislative Council.

Reagan is President pro-tem of the Senate and presided at the first meeting of the new Legislative Council. He and Sen. James A. Turman, Speaker of the House of Representatives, are ex officio members of the Subject Matter Committee. Turman is chairman; Reagan vice chairman.

## CHEVY II GOES ON DISPLAY AT VAUGHAN MOTOR COMPANY

The new Chevy II is now on display at Vaughan Chevrolet Company in Robert Lee.

Due to labor strikes in the General Motors' Chevrolet plants, the new Chevy II did not arrive at the local Chevrolet dealer's showroom as scheduled on September 29.

Robert Vaughan, owner of the local Chevrolet dealership, stated that he invited everyone to come and view the new addition to the Chevrolet line this week.

Chevy II is larger than the Corvair but smaller than Chevrolet's regular car. Station wagons, a hardtop sport coupe and a convertible are included among nine models in the new line which emphasizes simplicity in styling and maximum functionalism in design.

Although the Chevy II design is basically conventional, it offers new front-mounted four- and six-cylinder engines, integral frame and body construction with bolt-on front end and an industry exclusive in tapered plate rear springs. Both three-speed manual and automatic transmissions will be available.

The new Chevy II, while being slightly larger on the outside than the Corvair, is designed to give passenger car and luggage space more nearly equal that of the standard Chevrolet. The car is 183 inches long and has a 110-inch wheelbase.

E. N. Cole, Chevrolet's general manager, said "the Chevy II is designed to provide good basic transportation for the average American family and at the most reasonable cost. This includes not only the original purchase price but also more economical operating and maintenance expenses."

The car has simple, yet refined styling. Finely sculptured lines flow the length and width of the car to give it a long and substantial appearance.

The nine Chevy II models are divided into three series, with stations wagons listed in each. In addition, two-door and four-door sedans are included in the 100 and 300 series. The Nova series also includes a sport coupe and convertible.

## County Agents News Column

Autumn, or as we usually say, the Fall, traditionally is the season of harvest, the period of transition from summer to winter and the time during which we gather to survey the year's accomplishments and make plans for the new year. Two local organizations of interest to many of you will hold their annual meetings in the near future. Jot the details down on your calendar and in your memory.

### Farm Bureau Meeting

Coke County Farm Bureau convenes at Bronte School lunch room next Monday night, Oct. 16, at 7 p. m. A good meal, meeting and program are in store. Ladies are requested to bring salads and desserts.

### Game Management Assn.

Coke County Game Management Association holds its annual meeting at the Bronte Park on Saturday, Oct. 28, at 5 p. m. Anyone interested in wildlife, its promotion and management will want to attend. Bronte Lions Club has agreed to prepare the meal. Wives are encouraged to participate in the organization.

If you have been contemplating basol spraying some mesquites using 2,4,5,T, the men in the know say hold off until three weeks after frost or until the trees are sure to be fully dormant. The trees are in a transitional period

now that could cause your results to be disappointing.

If you basol treat mesquites during the dormant season, they will perk out next spring, then die in the late spring or early summer. The operator who is pushed for time during the growing season, and who has mesquites to control, will find that basol spraying during the winter works nicely. Normally, when prospective growing conditions for trees looks as good as it does now, basol treatment gives very good controls.

Watch for rats and mice to begin their migration to better food supplies and shelter soon. They may have already started on some farms. As weather conditions become more severe and their food supply dwindles, self preservation puts them on the move. Unfortunately, your grain bin, barn or shed makes ideal winter quarters for them.

Begin now to clean up debris, loose grain where possible and unnecessary stacks of trash or materials. Also, patch up any points of entry that you can find. And then to add insurance, put out poison bait and check it occasionally to make sure you have it available in areas they frequent. Once they establish themselves, they are more difficult to control. They can be costly, destructive, and unsanitary.

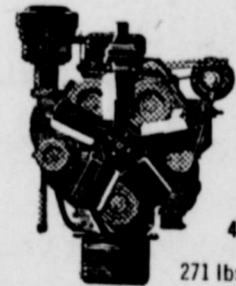

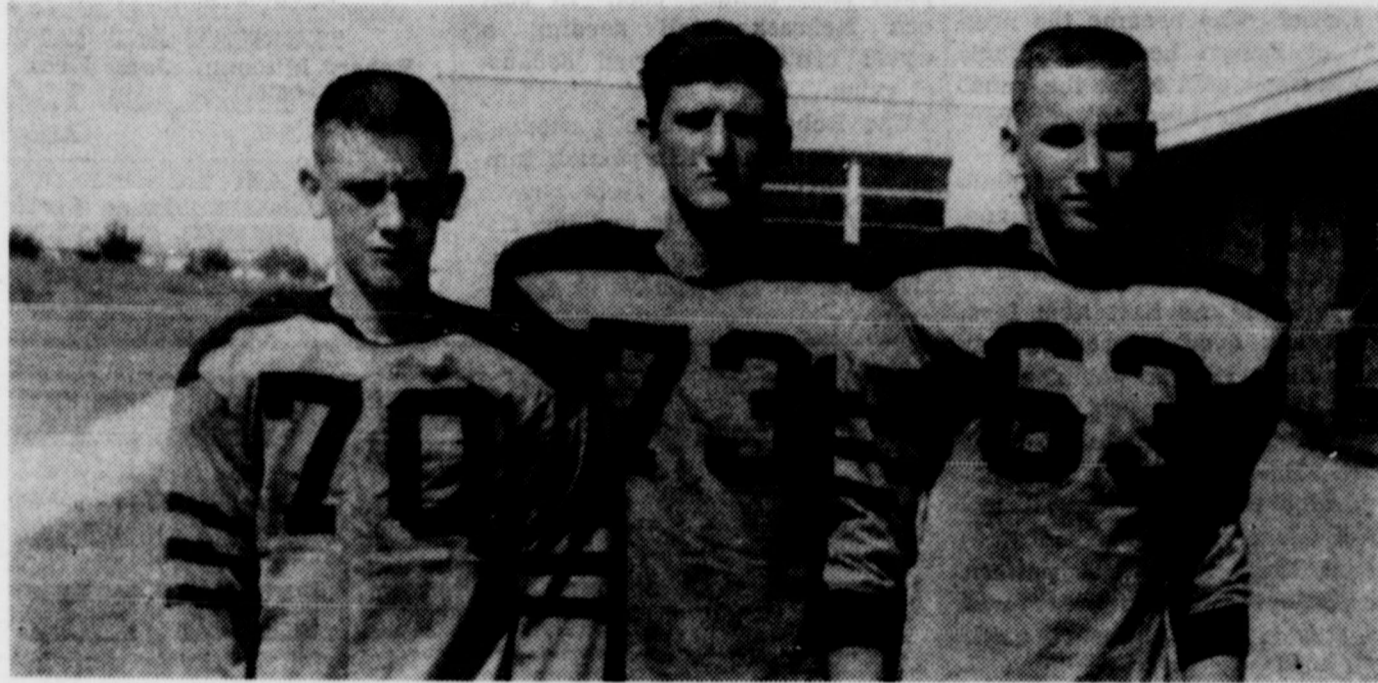

## Mrs. Cortez Russell's Biblical Quilt Is Winner of Two Awards at State Fair

Robert Lee residents are proud, and justly so, of one of the town's leading citizens, Mrs. R. Cortez (Lena) Russell, winning first place and blue ribbon (two awards) on the Biblical character quilt which she entered in the State Fair of Texas at Dallas.

The quilt will be on display in the Women's Building through October 22nd. It consists of 12 brightly colored squares, each illustrating a well-loved old Testament story, with bits of humor injected.

Adam, Jonah, Jacob, David, Goliath, Solomon, Sheba, Noah, Joseph, Daniel, Samson, the baby Moses and Belshazzar are all depicted along with assorted animals and angels.

Two squares at the bottom of the quilt inform the viewer that

it was made for Marvin Cortez Simpson, by his great aunt. The lad, not quite five years of age, was named for the late Mr. Cortez Russell.

Born in Parker County, "Miss Lena" moved to Robert Lee when she was ten years of age. About that same time she took on a job she still holds, playing the organ in the First Methodist Church, of which her father was pastor. She studied music at Kidd-Key College in Sherman and later married businessman-rancher, R. Cortez Russell, who became the president of Robert Lee State Bank. Mrs. Russell still owns the ranch but resides in town in her very attractive stone home.

Her hobbies are many, including playing the organ and piano, doing needlework, gardening, and gourmet type cooking.

The quilt is the first item Mrs. Russell has ever entered in any competition. It took her approximately two and one-half years of tedious labor to complete the work of art. A pattern from Ladies Home Journal was inspiration for the unusual quilt, but Mrs. Russell's ingenuity was incorporated along with the pattern.
