A Trent football fan witnessing the Trent-Loraine football contest at Loraine paid a fine for charging onto the playing field and making threats toward the officials of the game.

The fan could have been the cause of both Trent and Loraine being suspended from Interscholastic League Play for an indefinite period of time.

Other action that could have been taken by the Texas Interscholastic League would be that particular game forfeited and one or both teams eliminated in participating in the District 6-B title.

School officials are charged with the responsibility of the behaviour of both fans and players, and when one displays contempt for the officials or the players the schools are held liable for the actions of the individual or groups of persons.

Let us all practice the rules of good sportsmanship away and at home and not be guilty of marring the reputation of our players, school and town.

SECOND QUARTER




