



I received an interesting report the other day entitled "Why Are Lamb Prices So Low." That question has been on the minds of numerous people during the last stay. year and many reasons have been given to support the lower prices on lambs.

Like most economist reports no positive answer was given, but causative factors were pointed out. His answer to the problem was that a combination of a gradual increase in production, plus a reduction in per capita consumption, plus the increased competition from poultry and beef caused lamb prices to be lower.

What about the future? It was the Marketing Specialist's opinion that the market will be very near the average for 1961. But being a little optimistic he felt that the price would be more stable with a rising price until March or April, followed by a general decline from high spring






