



A recent letter from the Southwest Research Foundation compels me to write a few more lines on the proposed screw worm control program. Since we have experienced a severe cold spell that pretty well blanketed the State, the Foundation plans to go all out to begin seeding operations this

The following is a quotation from a letter I received concerning the matter:

"The recent extremely cold weather, in the estimation of authorities, has reduced the overwintering area of the screwworm fly to such an extent that they feel this would be an ideal year to initiate the control program. It is, therefore, of the utmost importance that producers' contributions be collected as quickly as possible. The amount of money collected locally will be an indication to the various state and federa appropriating bodies of the producer interest in this program. Many authorities feel that it likely will be many years before we will have such an ideal year in which to start the program.'

I believe the paragraph graphically presents the situation. I hope that we of Coke County will see fit to help initiate the pro-

As of Monday morning 122 Coke County operators had made contributions totaling \$6462.80.

Since 1962 will be a favorable year to launch the program, we sincerely hope that all operators will help the program off to a good start. It will cost much, much less to initiate this year than it will if the starting is to follow a mild winter.



Ratio studies from records on file in the courthouse show an inequality in the tax structure." These major tax payers have stressed they are not complaining Contribute Money about their tax burden, and have told the school board they will go as far as possible to aid the operation of the school, if taxes within the school district are equalized. They have also studied their daughter and sister because the budget of the school system and have agreed there seems to be no excessive and/or unnecessary expenditures.

A lengthy discussion was held concerning the possibility of a re-evaluation study for the school district as a means of securing the additional funds necessary to meet these new standards. It was brought out that the latest study available (1959) shows the Robert Lee Schools operated on an expenditure of \$227 per child, which is the sixth lowest in the state in our average daily attendance bracket. Expenditures of other schools in our area include Bronte \$393, Blackwell \$659, Silver \$616, Mertzon \$499, Sterling City \$510. San Angelo \$311, Miles \$350, and Water Valley \$537. These amounts do not include the retirement of bonds and interest on those bonds, but include operation expenditures only.

It was agreed by the group present that it would be cheaper to increase the tax structure within the school district than to transfer students to another district where an accredited school is located. It was also agreed that it would be better to raise the valuations and leave the tax rate at \$1.50 rather than raising the tax rate to \$2.00 as other schools have had to do.

Latham said that a public meeting of all tax payers within the school district will be held during the latter part of February for the purpose of discussing the needs and problems of the schools. Every tax payer and in-
