## Last Rites Held For S. D. Hoots, Area Pioneer

Funeral services for S. D. Hoots 80, were held in Bronte Saturday at 11 a. m. from Kickapoo Baptist Church. Burial followed in the Robert Lee Cemetery under the direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mr. Hoots, 80, longtime Coke County resident, died Thursday about 6:30 p.m. in the home of his niece, Mrs. Albert Bragg, in DeSoto. He had made his home with her the past several months.

He was born Feb. 4, 1882 and was married to the former Mattie Millican Oct. 8, 1907, in Goldthwaite. When the couple celebrated their 52nd anniversary in 1959, Mr. Hoots recalled that they had started to the preacher's home and met him on the way. He performed the ceremony along the road as they sat in a buggy.

The couple moved to Coke County in 1913 and made their home here until after Mrs. Hoots' death in January, 1960, when he moved to DeSoto to live with his niece.

They farmed for many years in the Silver, Robert Lee and Bronte localities, then moved to a residence in the west edge of Bronte about 19 years ago. Mr. Hoots also worked several years as a Watkins salesman in this area.

Only survivors are nieces and nephews.

## School Ends Here Next Week

Next week is the final week of school for the 1961-1962 school year in Robert Lee.

## Nearly 1400 Votes Cast In Democratic Primary

Nearly 1400 voters went to the polls last Saturday to vote in the Democratic Primary held that day. This was considered a good turnout by election officials. The two largest boxes in the county, Robert Lee and Bronte, polled 447 and 443 votes, respectively. Heavy interest in local races, as well as those on the district and state level, brought out the big voting crowd.

In the county judge's race W. W. (Bud) Thetford was re-elected to a second term, defeating his opponent, Charlie Boecking, 853 to 506. Likewise, in the county clerk's voting, the incumbent, J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler was re-elected over Pauline Roe Holland. Count was 944 to 435.

A newcomer was elected to the office of county treasurer. Inez Burns received the greatest number of votes given any candidate when she defeated Gertrude Gray, the incumbent, 1003 to 371.

In the commissioners race for the two east side precincts, the present commissioner, Howard Brock, was re-elected in Precinct 2, defeating C. E. McGuire, 334 to 185. The only runoff in the county developed in Precinct 4, where a 4-way contest was being waged. Jack Corley came out as top man with 46 votes. He will run in the second primary against Robert I. Brown who received 27 votes. J. D. Huffaker received 19 votes and four votes were cast for E. J. (Gene) Halamiciek.

Roy P. Ross and J. T. Liles were unopposed in their bid for second terms of justice of the peace in Precincts 1 and 2. Liles received 509 votes and Ross, 590.

## Mountain Creek Lake to Open Next Month

Mayor Bob Vaughan announced this week that Larry Campbell of the Texas Game and Fish Department has stated that Robert Lee's Mountain Creek Lake will be open June 4 to fishermen for fishing for legal size fish.

In September of last year the biology department of the Texas Game and Fish Department killed all fish in the lake in order to eradicate the reservoir of all rough fish.

Mountain Creek Lake was restocked later in the fall last year with bass, crappie and cat fish.

## Baccalaureate Services Will Be Held Sunday

The baccalaureate services for the Robert Lee Senior Class of 1962 will be held in the school auditorium on Sunday night, May 13, at 8 o'clock.

Coke County didn't go along with the majority in the district in the race for state representative. The county gave David Read a top heavy majority of 934 to 266 over Ed J. Carpenter for this office. Read won a majority in every county in the district except heavily populated Howard County (Big Spring). Latest figure available on the count over the entire district gave Carpenter 4,829 and Read 4,493 votes.

In the senatorial race, Coke County went along with the rest of the district in giving the incumbent, Dorsey B. Hardeman, a majority. The count here was 815 for Hardeman and 439 for W. A. (Bill) Stroman. The district count Monday gave Hardeman 18,717 to Stroman's 13,057 votes.

## City Passes Building Permit Ordinance

The Robert Lee City Commission passed an emergency ordinance at its May meeting requiring all persons to obtain a building permit when they plan to construct, remodel or alter any construction in the city limits of Robert Lee.

This action was taken by the city fathers for the purpose of keeping accurate records of the amount of construction being done in Robert Lee.

Mayor Robert Vaughan said, "There shall be no fees paid to the city in order for residents to obtain building permits." He further stated that the permit ordinance is only for the purpose of keeping the records complete at the city hall.

Anyone or firm who violates this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$500.00.

The ordinance became effective May 1. A complete description of this ordinance is being published on another page in this paper.

state board of education was close with Mrs. David Kothman holding a slight edge in this county over Penrose B. Metcalfe. Mrs. Kothman received 664 votes to Metcalfe's 570. Over the entire 21st Congressional District, however, Metcalfe, early this week, led with 23,935 votes to Mrs. Kothmann's 19,606.

Coke County followed the lead of the whole state in giving its highest vote to John Connally for governor. He received 308 votes. Second was Will Wilson with 284; third, Marshall Formby with 237; fourth, Edwin Walker, 202; fifth, the present governor, Price Daniel, 141; and last on the Coke County ticket was Don Yarborough, who was second high in the state, with 137. Connally and Yarborough will have a runoff in the June second primary.

This county gave Preston Smith of Lubbock a clear majority over his four opponents for Lieutenant-Governor with a big 650 votes. James A. Turman, who led in the state, was second with 220. Crawford Martin received 137; Jarrard Secrest, 85, and Robert Baker, 83.

Coke Countians, likewise, stuck with their fellow West Texan, as well as with the rest of Texas when they gave a big vote to Waggoner Carr for attorney general. Carr, receiving more than all his opponents, got 645 votes. Tom Reavley received 195, Tom James 134, Les Proctor 110, W. T. McDonald 69, and Bob Looney 18.

For Congressman - at Large: Woodrow Wilson Bean, the man who hasn't filed an income tax return in many years, evidently had sympathy or admiration of Coke Countians, as he led the ticket with 374. Joe Pool had 166, Warren G. Moore 148, Charles H. Stevenson 137, Manley Head 115, Phil Willis 48 and Russell T. Van Keuren 41.

On the propositions submitted to the voters, Coke County voted against all three. No. 1 on the constitutional amendment to legalize parimutuel betting, the vote was 399 for to 620 against. On proposition 2, for the legislature to enact a law legalizing paramutuel wagering, Coke Countians voted 391 for and 610 against. Proposition 3 for the legislature to submit a constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax was defeated with 406 for and 694 against.

## Your County Agents Report

### Agriculture News

Have you found any of the containers in which male sterile flies are being distributed? According to Dr. Zirkle, an Animal Health Commission field representative, stationed in San Angelo, Coke County is within the area that is presently being seeded.

Screwworm outbreaks north of the previous buffer zone caused a drastic revision of their buffer zone area. We are near the bottom, on the map I was shown, of a new zone extending from the Gulf Coast to El Paso.

It is gratifying to know that we are receiving this assistance, but at the same time, it is regrettable that production limitations seriously limit the extent to which the buffer zone can be saturated. The Kerrville plant is now producing 25 million male sterile flies a week. This is a lot of flies, but divided by the number of square miles within the buffer zone, the amount being produced loses its significance. Until the Mission plant opens in July, the saturation will be short of that desired. And just what action will be taken when the greater production is available has not been revealed to us at the present time.

The worm case samples are still needed to help guide those directing the program plan their seeding operations.

The only concrete way they have of knowing about the concentrations of screwworms within a given area is by the number of cases, they have reported via samples sent in. We are protecting our local interests when we submit cases for diagnosis.

If you would like a mailing container, come by the office and pick up one; or if you prefer, when and if you have a possible screwworm case, bring the maggots in and we will forward them.

A number of people have presented questions lately regarding spraying pecan trees at the present time to control the pecan nut casebearer.

It is still too early to begin casebearer control measures. The exact time for optimum control can be determined by inspection only. Normally, the ideal time in this area is somewhere between May 20 and June 5. And it possibly will vary as much as one week from spot to spot within Coke County.

The casebearer is here now, but, at the present time, is living within the tender limbs on the pecan tree. Insecticide applied now will lose its strength before he emerges and lays eggs for the second generation hatch that causes the damage to small nuts.

I will spot check trees as time allows as the danger period approaches. However, it would be better if you could identify them yourself. Look for a tiny, pearly white egg on the blossom end of the nuts or on side of the nuts. As these eggs near maturity they become brownish in color. When some of the eggs begin to hatch, it is time to apply control measures. If you spray too early or too late, the chemical you put on will be of little value. Your timing must be accurate or you must keep the tree treated for two or three week period, if the desired results are to be obtained.

We must know the head size of each woman in order for Mrs. Mears to know the size of frames to bring. Any person, club or non-club, who desires to attend can do so as long as there are not too many attending. Ladies and high school girls will be accepted as long as it takes to fill the class. From one to four hats can be made for only the cost of supplies plus the tuition. Some of the things to be taught during the two day school are:

1. To block and make buckram frames.

2. Pattern making.
  3. Hat designing and hat theory.
  4. Making fabric hats.
  5. French draping and brim covering and finishing.
  6. Linings—putting in head size bands.
  7. Trims—veiling, whimsey.
  8. Flowered hats.
  9. Making French net—Chicken wire frames.
  10. Veiling and maline hats.
  11. Straw braid.
  12. Blocking hoods, bodies, etc.
- Classes will begin on Monday, May 21, at 8 a.m.

Anyone desiring to know more about the training school can get information by calling my office. Wilma Dean can accept your money and get your head size any time you come by the office.

Here is a low calorie cheese cake recipe. Mrs. Bert Blaylock says it is very good. Some others who have eaten it say "ditto" to what Mrs. Blaylock says about it. I have had a number of requests for the recipe so felt all the readers might enjoy it.

**Low Calorie Cheese Cake**  
Mix two envelopes of unflavored gelatine,  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup sugar and  $\frac{1}{4}$  tea-

spoon salt together thoroughly in the top of a double boiler.

Beat together 2 egg yolks and 1 cup liquefied non fat dry milk (as directed on milk package), or skim milk. Add to gelatine mixture and cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until gelatine is thoroughly dissolved in about 8 minutes.

Remove from heat; add 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind; cool.

Stir in 3 cups creamed cottage cheese (24 oz.) sieved, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Chill, stirring occasionally until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon.

Fold in 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.

Beat  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup ice-cold water and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup nonfat dry milk solids together with a rotary beater until stiff and mixture stands in peaks. (This takes about 10 minutes with hand beater). Fold into gelatine mixture.

Turn into an 8" spring form pan and sprinkle top with a mixture of  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup graham cracker crumbs (4 crackers),  $\frac{1}{8}$  teaspoon cinnamon and  $\frac{1}{8}$  teaspoon nutmeg.

Chill until firm.  
Makes 12 servings. 155 calories per serving.

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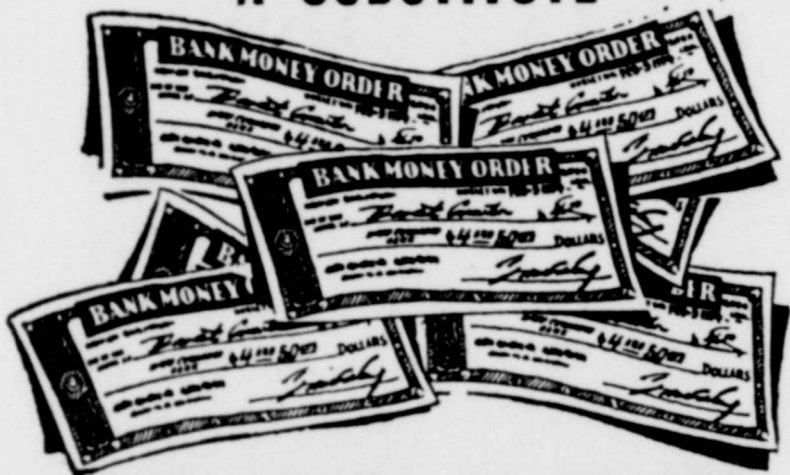

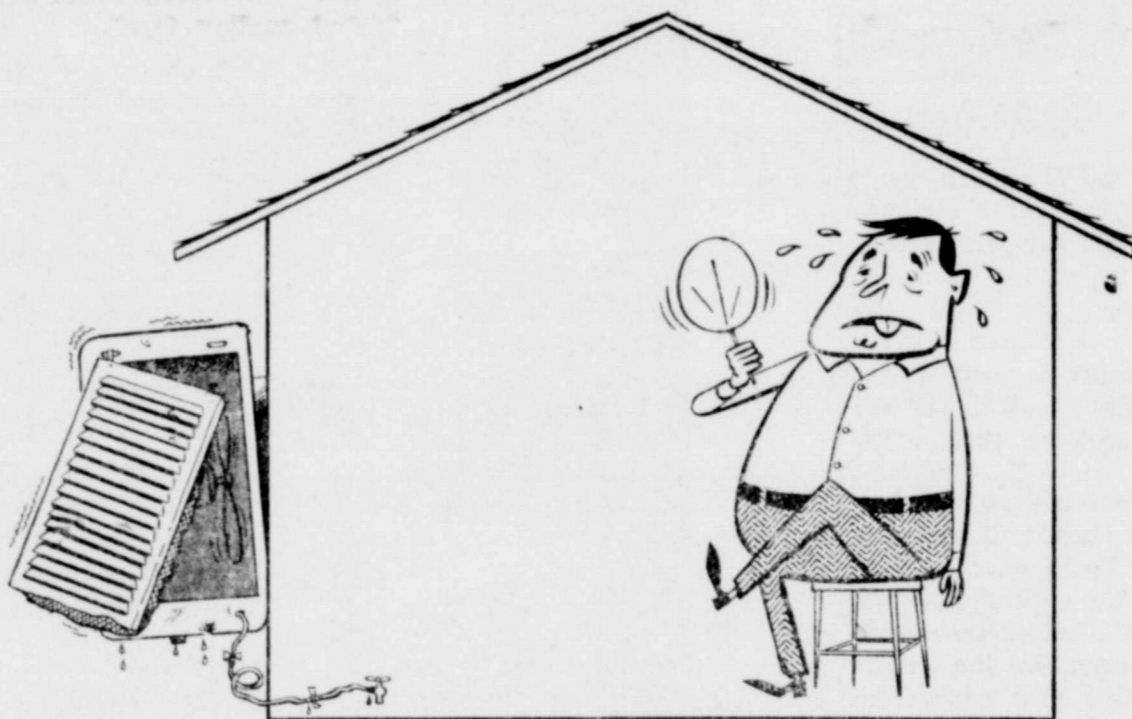

**BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE**

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Robert Lee, Texas, as follows:

SECTION I: No structure, building or part thereof, shall be hereafter built, enlarged or altered, without first obtaining from the

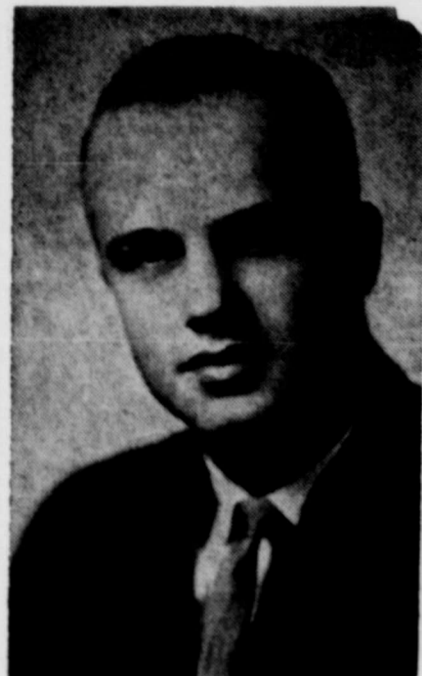
City Hall a building Permit. The permit shall be issued in duplicate, a copy of which shall be kept on file with the City Secretary. In obtaining the permit it shall be necessary to give an estimated cost of the proposed building or alteration and the location.  
SECTION II: FEES: There shall be no fees to obtain a permit; as the permit is only for the purpose of keeping the records complete at the City Hall, however, the City Commission holds an option to amend this section at a later date, should they deem it advisable.  
SECTION III: PENALTIES: Any person, persons or firm violating this Ordinance shall be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).  
SECTION IV: WHEREAS, this ordinance is deemed an emergency, therefore demands a suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read on three several days, said rule being suspended, and this ordinance is placed on its first reading and final passage, and shall be effective and in full force from and after its passage and approval.

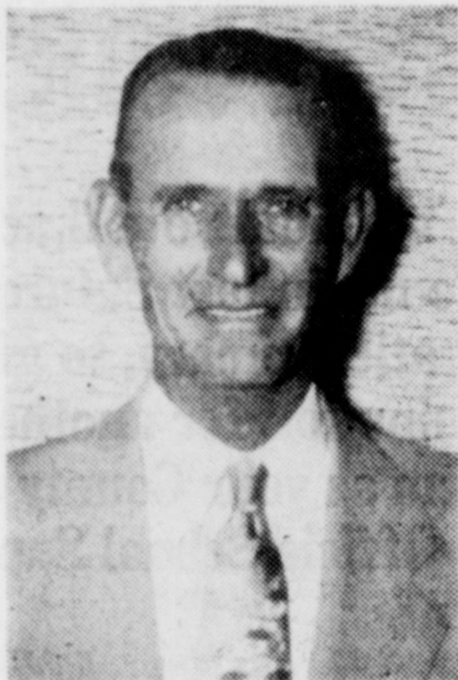
