Waterflooding I. A. B. Menielle Field

Most Wells East of Highway 208 Are Still Flowing, Two Are Placed on Pump

West of Highway 208 is the I.A.B.-Menielle Field and east of the highway is the Northeast I.A.B. Field, both designated as Pennsylvania.

The Menielle ranch is cut in two, with the five most recent wells east of the road. A quick trip through this lease Sunday and a look at each well produced this information, which is not official.

L. B. Menielle A No. 1, seemed to be flowing at 250 pounds tubing pressure; A No. 2 at 75 pounds; A No. 3 at 440 pounds; A No. 4 at 350 pounds, and the easternmost

well, just over the hill from Sanco, at 350 pounds pressure. A No. 5, the northernmost Menielle well seemed to be shut in at the time.

Two rigs are stacked in the Northeast I.A.B. Field. The Ulmer Bird well has been put on the pump and is flowing 16 barrels per day. This is a Standard-Tucker jointly owned well. The Bible well just south of Sanco is reported pumping only a few barrels and not offering much promise as a producer.

Wells on the Marvin Simpson, Hays, and Dickey leases are reported flowing their allowables.

The most recent Humble well on the Ira A. Bird ranch, drilled just west of the highway, at first reported a good well, is still flowing, but wells in this area are said to be falling below their original production, hence the waterflooding recovery program.

School Calendar Sets Fall Term To Begin Aug. 30

At the regular meeting of the Robert Lee School Board Thursday night, the board adopted the school calendar for the 1962-1963 school year.

School will begin on Thursday, August 30, and will end on Friday, May 24, with the high school graduation.

Holidays taken will include Labor Day, September 3; Thanksgiving, November 22 and 23; Christmas, December 21 through January 1; Coke County Livestock Show, one day in January; March 8, 1963, District XI Teachers' meeting; and Friday and Monday, April 19 and 22, Easter.

This will give 176 actual teaching days not counting Thursday and Friday, May 23 and 24, which can be utilized in case school should have to be dismissed because of bad weather.

At Well Attended Meet, BCD Talks Scouts, Boys Track

With the largest attendance for some time, the Board of Community Development at their noon luncheon Tuesday heard a letter of invitation to a meeting in Abilene for a survey of recreational and tourist attractions in this area.

Several plan to represent Robert Lee at this meeting.

Cumbie Ivey, Jr., chairman of the Boy Scout Committee, said that Gene Hinnard, now scoutmaster, had a work before him worthy of support by the citizens of the town.

In another BCD-sponsored boys project, Garland Davis is to take the track team to the AAU meet in Abilene.

In the round-table, the idea of some kind of ranch-type annual event for Robert Lee and the ranch country adjacent was tentatively discussed.

A recent agreement to unitize the I. A. B. Menielle field and to begin water-flooding recovery of oil from the oil bearing formations is being put in effect, with some water wells now being drilled for that purpose.

By an arrangement between Humble and Sun, Humble is taking over the operation of this field. In the water flooding process, water from wells is pumped into one sand at a time, and under such pressure as to force oil into adjoining wells.

Operators have indicated they intend, in time, to water flood the

Northeast I.A.B. Field, which centers around Sanco. Production there is on an 80 acre spacing. Two rigs have been stacked in this field since the Boswell wells on the Scarborough Survey and the easternmost well in the L. B. Menielle Sun Lease was completed.

Men in position to know expressed the opinion that the Sanco area would likely be put on a 40 acre spacing if and when the water flooding was to be started there.

Landowners in the I.A.B. Menielle Field have signed a unitization agreement, but this has not yet been done throughout the

Northeast I.A.B. Field, which extends northeastward from Highway 208 through Sanco and to the first mountain on the east of Sanco.

Sun is drilling two wells, between Silver and Maryneal, and a location has been made by Standard of Texas just west of the Sanco townsite tracts.

Agreement Approved

The Oil and Gas Division of the Texas Railroad Commission has approved a unitization agreement for the I.A.B.-Menielle (Pennsylvanian) Field. The application was filed by Humble Oil and Refining Company, acting for itself and other parties having an interest.

The agreement is proposed to establish a unitized project for the purpose of effecting secondary recovery of oil and gas.

Operators propose to establish a water injection pressure maintenance program for the unitized areas, whereby an additional six millions barrels of oil may be obtained. The area will cover approximately 4,903 acres.

Drilling of water wells to supply water has already begun.

Burial at Houston, Mrs. Patteson Was Of Pioneer Family

Mrs. J. R. Patteson, 90 at the time of her death in Austin Sunday, lived many years in Robert Lee. Her husband was county surveyor, from 1891 to 1896, and did abstract work here, according to those who knew them at the time.

Mrs. Patteson left here about 20 years ago, lived in San Angelo ten years. She had been suffering from the effects of a fall for about two months prior to her death.

Burial was in Houston following services there in the George Lewis Funeral Home.

Mr. Patteson preceded her in death.

Their home in Robert Lee was on the corner across the street directly west of the Methodist Church.

The Pattesons were among the early day residents of Robert Lee and Coke County.

Mrs. Patteson was Lena Averitt, the daughter of John C. Averitt, pioneer Baptist minister, and the sister of Dave (D.T.) Averitt, the fourth county judge to serve Coke County. Judge Averitt died in 1913.

Mr. and Mrs. Patteson had five children, four of whom are still living, according to friends here. Dudley, a son, is deceased. The others are Lucille and Doris, and twin sons, Truman and Truett.

McNeil Wylie, former County Judge of Coke County was in The Observer office Tuesday, and in Robert Lee for a short visit with relatives and friends. He has recovered from a severe illness and operation last winter.

Mr. Wylie moved from Robert Lee ten years ago.

Bronte Votes Saturday on Bonds for Fire Station, City Hall, Deputy Office

(Editor's Note: This story by Ben Oglesby is printed here by courtesy of the Bronte Enterprise, of which he is editor and publisher.)

Qualified voters of Bronte will go to the polls Saturday to vote on bonds to build a new fire station and city hall. Amount of the bonds is not to exceed \$18,000. If approved, the money derived from the sale of bonds will be used to construct a building 80 by 27 feet and containing about 2200 square feet of floor space. Location being considered is on lots owned by the city and north of the new post office.

City Secretary Mrs. Helen Kirkland said Tuesday that six absentee ballots have been issued. Four of them had been returned.

The city government of Bronte has been housed in the Cumbie Building next door to Bob Wilson's Barber Shop for some time, since the old city hall building was considered unsafe.

The proposed building will consist of two wings with a space for two fire trucks between them. The south wing will have office space for law enforcement officers, two holdover jail cells, a meeting room and a small kitchen. The north wing will contain a foyer for city customers, offices for the city secretary and justice of the peace and two rest rooms. Large accordion type doors will open from the meeting room into the fire station, making the entire space available for large gatherings.

City officials decided to call the bond vote after their investment counselor, Jack Brown of San Angelo, told them they could raise money for the building with bond or time warrants. He advised that the bond route for financing the structure would be cheaper than time warrants, as bonds can be sold at a cheaper rate of interest.

Coke County has agreed to reoffice space for a deputy sheriff and justice of the peace, as they are officials of Coke County. Presently the justice of the peace has an office on Main Street and the deputy sheriff has no office here.

Officials say that no tax levies will be necessary to retire the bonds, that the rental from the county, plus money now being paid for rent on the present city office will take care of the payments.

Noah Pruitt will be elected judge; Mrs. Olive Keeney, assistant judge; Mrs. Noah Pruitt as Mrs. O. H. Willoughby, clerks. The election will be held at the city hall.

I would slide right down the mountain, yelling like Buffalo Bill,

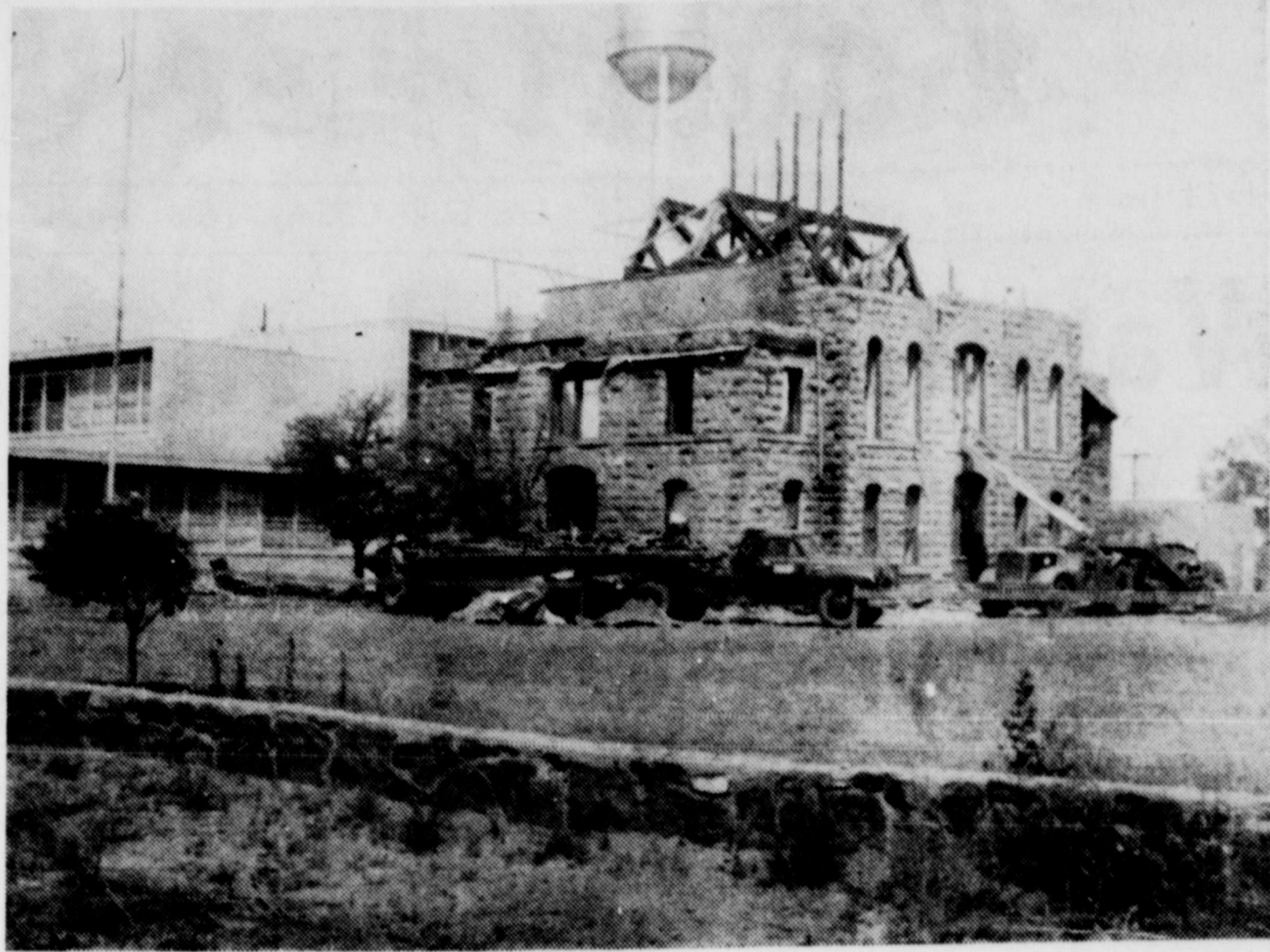
For I had to corral those Indians before they made a kill.

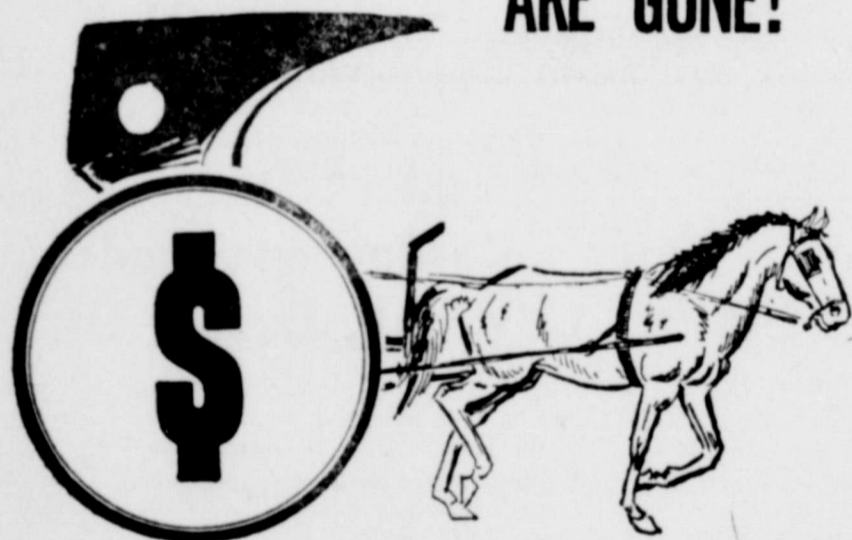

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HELPING US PRODUCE AGAIN, THAT FISHING UNPRODUCTIVE

The family and I had a very fine vacation visiting, loafing and unproductive fishing. But it is always nice to get back and in the swing of things again.

I saw a cow a few days ago that was poisoned by acid in Johnson grass, Sudan grass and sorghums also can contain the acid. Usually drouth, stunted, or frosted feeds cause most of the trouble from acid, also young plants or the new top or terminal growth contains more acid than the older growth. One research report showed young, small feed always contains more acid than older feed.

Fill Before Turning In

If you plan to turn in on a grass or sorghum field, it is usually a good practice to fill your animals prior to putting them in the field. Also, I have known operators who have left their animals in the field for only periods up to a half day for the first two or three days.

Acid poisoning can be treated if the animal is found soon enough, but in most cases the animals are dead when found. Veterinarians have an anti-acid ingredient that they can inject into the blood stream to counteract the acid.

Gasoline Tax Refund

We received a supply of forms for claiming refunds on Federal taxes on gasoline used on farms or ranches. If you need a form or need help in filling out your claim, give us a ring.

The reporting period is from July 1, 1961, through June 30, 1962. All Federal taxes paid on gasoline used on the farm or ranch through the above period can be reclaimed. You have until October 1 to file your claim.

Oak Creek Reservoir Restocked with Fry

SAN ANGELO, — Texas Game and Fish Commission hatchery trucks are now in the process of transporting 80,000 baby catfish, 80,000 bass fry and 300,000 forage minnows to restock recently renovated Oak Creek Reservoir, according to Henry B. Burkett, Region I Director.

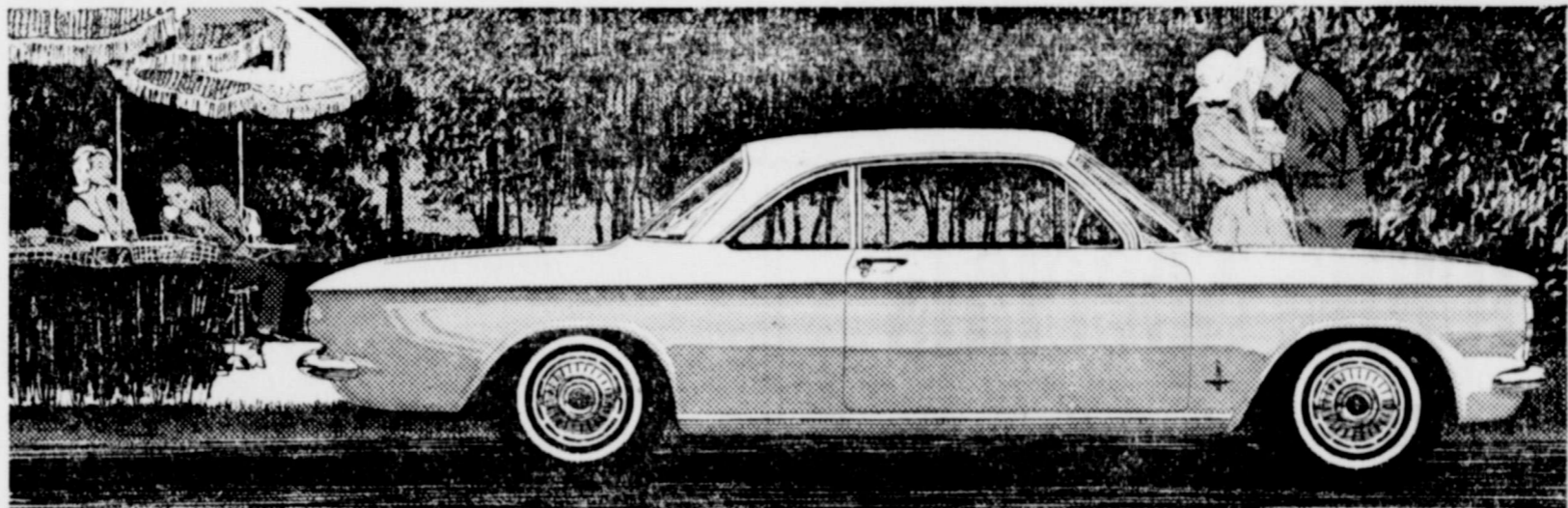
Fishery biologists report that rough fish in Oak Creek Reservoir were reduced 90 per cent through rotenone poisoning June 16, and the lake is now in excellent condition to receive game fish fingerlings.

Although the lake will not be closed to fishing, biologists estimate that fingerlings will require at least a year's growth before fishing will be good. In addition to stocking 160,000 bass and catfish fingerlings, hatcheries at San Angelo may restock some large redear sunfish by late fall. If lake conditions continue to be favorable, fishing should be very good by the fall of 1963 and continue to improve through 1964.

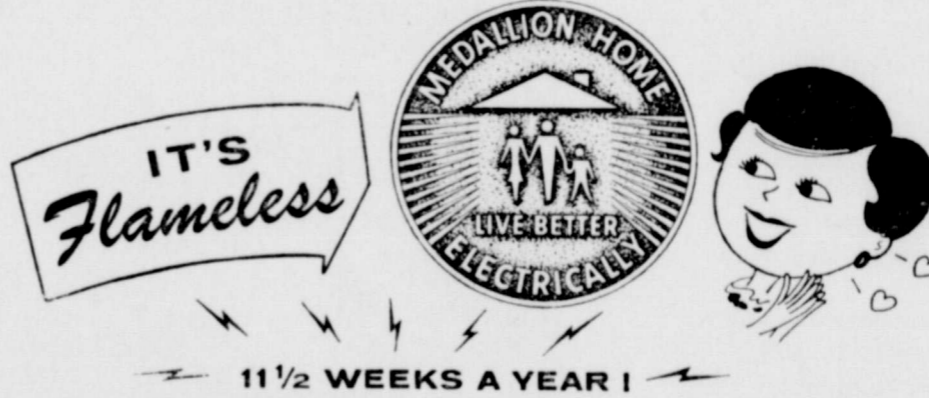

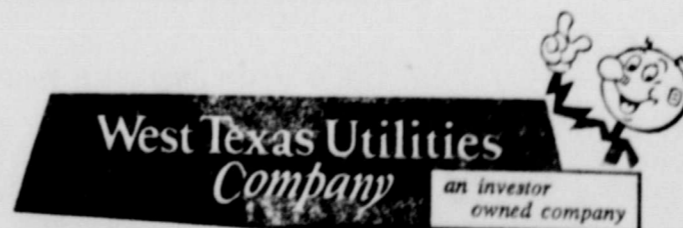

Constitutional Amendment Needed to Offset Prayer Decision, Fisher Says

By Congressman O. C. FISHER

The Supreme Court decision barring a simple nondenominational prayer is difficult to understand. The prayer, written by a New York state board, espouses no particular religious belief. It states: "Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence on Thee, and we beg thy Blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country."

Art. 1 of the Constitution prohibits any law establishing a religion, or the free exercise thereof.

Since the school children where the prayer was used were free to either attend or not attend the gatherings where the prayer was recited, it is most difficult to see how anything in that prayer could possibly be said to interfere in one iota with the free exercise of religious beliefs.

After all the prayer was nothing more than the recognition of a Supreme Being and a humble request for His blessings.

Has it come to pass that the simple recognition of a Creator and the imploring of the blessings of the deity is in contravention of the U. S. Constitution? If so, then is the daily prayer which opens the House of Representatives unconstitutional? It is government business just as much as a school session. And the Supreme Court is opened each day by the crier who yells out: "God save the United States and this honorable Court!"

Is that not the recognition of the existence of a Supreme Being?

And what about the National Anthem, long ago officially recognized by a law of Congress? Is the "In God We Trust" inscription on our coins unconstitutional?

I have joined with others in supporting a resolution to amend the Constitution to correct this most recent Supreme Court blooper. The recognition of a Supreme Being is interwoven with our history and our national heritage. And it should be encouraged in every school house in America. Our spiritual life is involved.
