



The art of ceramics is one of the oldest, perhapts the oldest art of mankind, and one of the most useful. It dates back to the time man first learned to use heat to put a glazed surface on the vessels they made for cooking and table use

These vessels appear in the ruins of the oldest civilizations and are one of the chief means of identifying races, tribes, and their living habits when they have no written history.

There has been a great revival of this art among American women. Using a clay and moulds bought commercially and a skill acquired through study and practice, some beautiful things of new and old design are being made for decorative purposes and for utility as well.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legisand which shall empower the Legis-lature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows: "Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local govern-mental operations in periods of emer-gency resulting from disasters caused by eremy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, im-

paired, suspended, repealed or sus-pended hereby." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: e following: "FOR the Constitutional Amend-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall

have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political sub-divisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the adminis-tration of such insurance in the counties or molitical subdivisions of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Com-pensation Insurance for all em-ployees of all political sub-divisions": and "AGAINST the Constitutional AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political sub-divisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amend-

ment. Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the provide suitable laws for the adminis-tration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of
