Swinging Right and Left

(An Observer Editorial by the Publisher)

A young woman of whom we know—not one who lives anywhere in this vicinity—a college graduate and teacher, got curious about what was being done with such a high percentage of her salary that was being taken for income tax.

She decided to go to some of the foreign countries where aid is being given, among them India. There she found by talking to the people that the food being sent for aid was being sold in the stores by the Indian government and that many of the people are too poor to buy it.

For those who do buy it, the money goes to the government of India, not too friendly to us.

We wouldn't brand this young woman a radical right winger because she didn't like that any more than we would brand Senator Ralph Yarborough a radical right winger because he didn't like what the United Nations was doing to Katanga, and he said so with great force in the United States Senate.

Neither would we call Senator Fulbright, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee of the United States Senate, a right winger because he wrote an article for a widely circulated magazine questioning whether the United Nations could any longer be supported by the United States.

No one would list Adlai Stevenson as a radical rightist because he made before the United Nations the strongest speech we have ever read from left or right against the admission of Communist China, and against the program and actions of the communists in China. All three of these men have been classified widely as liberals.

Tourist Potential, Need For More Pump Capacity BCD Subjects Tuesday

How Robert Lee and Coke County might benefit by the formation of the new Tourist Association of West Texas, holding its first meeting in Abilene today, Thursday, August 9, was the subject of notes taken by O. T. Colvin at a recent meeting in Abilene and presented to the Board of Community Development at their noon meeting by Ulmer Bird in the absence of Mr. Colvin, who is on vacation.

Facts presented by Tom H. Taylor, Director of Texas Highway Department Travel and Information Division, were read. Among these was that Texas gets about 1½ per cent of the total tourist money spent in the United States.

In a community, eight tourist vehicles daily per year would equal a hundred thousand dollar industry in that community, Taylor told the set-up meeting at Abilene attended by Mr. Colvin and Commissioner Fern Havins recently.

Each individual will spend on the average of \$25 per day during their stay in the community. But tourism is a perishable product. You have to slow him down to a stop or lose him to the community.

Any local events of interest to tourists should be set about a year ahead and advertised nationally through a state tourist bureau, Taylor advised.

Mr. Bird added the comment that the value of such a program to Robert Lee would depend on

Three Hundred Years Horse Loving Comanches Camped Along Our Creeks

Boy Scout's working toward advancement in scouting, and others interested in the past of the country in which they live have from time to time asked this writer about the Indians who once ranged here as well as some of the first white men who came to what is now Coke County.

To give whatever answer we can to these questions, this summary is written. It is not by any means the work of an expert. It is based, however, on some research as well as putting together what the earliest settlers have said, along with examination of

the old camp sites of the Indians who for many centuries used the stones for stoves and the water from Yellow Wolf, Mess Box, Rough Creek, and others for as much as a thousand years, and no one knows how much longer.

When Captain R. B. Marcy with a detail of U.S. soldiers under orders to explore West Texas, map out roads and locate sites for forts, came through here in 1849, soon after Texas became a part of the union, he found the Comanches in possession.

Highway Work To Include Widening Small Structures

In addition to the larger structures being widened under contracts, the Highway Department with its regular crews on a maintenance basis is widening culverts on Highway 208, beginning with one inside the city limits.

The project is expected to include about ten small bridges between Robert Lee and Edith on 158 and the smaller bridges south of Robert Lee on Highway 208 for about 7 miles.

What are the trends in back-to-school clothes for this fall?

News in little girls' clothes, both dresses and sportswear, is that many will carry names of famous fashion designers of adult wear. This means that they will reflect a definite awareness of current grown-up couture, according to Mrs. Fay Roe, County Home Demonstration agent.

One designer will feature a little jacket outfit which may be done in a variety of fabrics. The skirts may be swirl, flared or done with unpressed pleats while the jackets may be cut-away or squared off. Blouses may feature floppy or tailored bows, and if belts are used they will be wider than last season.

Another important trend will be the "spare" look. Slim A-line shapes, less collars, pleats and bows are features of this simple trend. And look for set-in sleeves and princess curves in both dress and sportswear lines.

After sudsing and rinsing a drip-dry jacket, stuff the sleeves with cotton hand towels. This helps them to dry into shape and also shortens drying time.

Soaking in a tub of warm soap suds is the best "household remedy" for relieving tension. To make this most effective, use the time to gently massage the tension spots in your shoulders and neck. Be sure to "work" these muscles gently so you won't break the spell of relaxation induced by the warm suds.

'Tis said that new pajamas are more comfortable if laundered before they are worn. According to Dr. Michael A. Petti, sudsing frees the fabric of chemicals which might cause skin irritation.

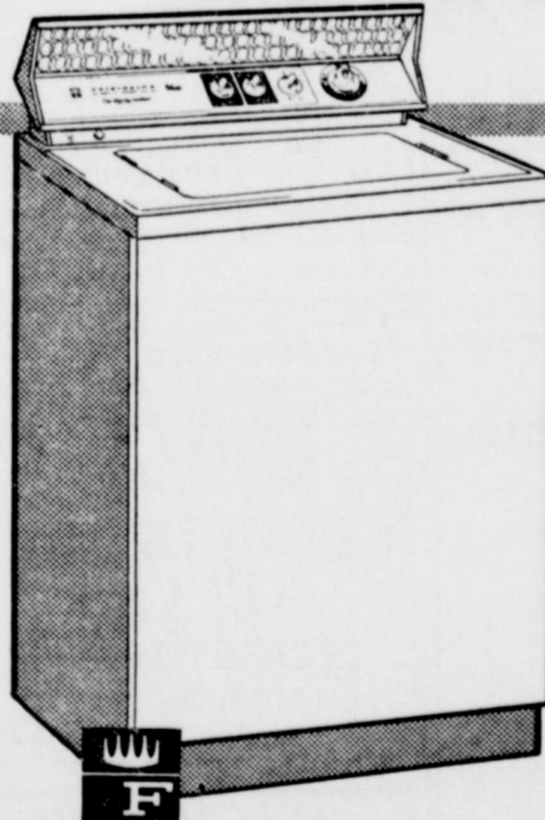

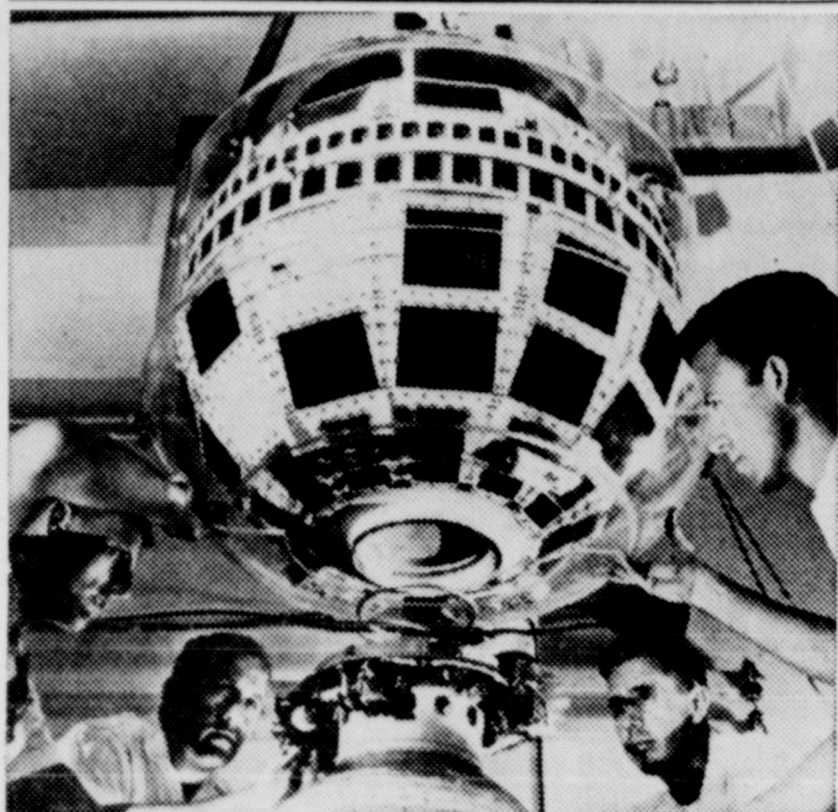

The bride wore a pink linen sheath dress with brown accessories and a corsage of brown cymbidians.

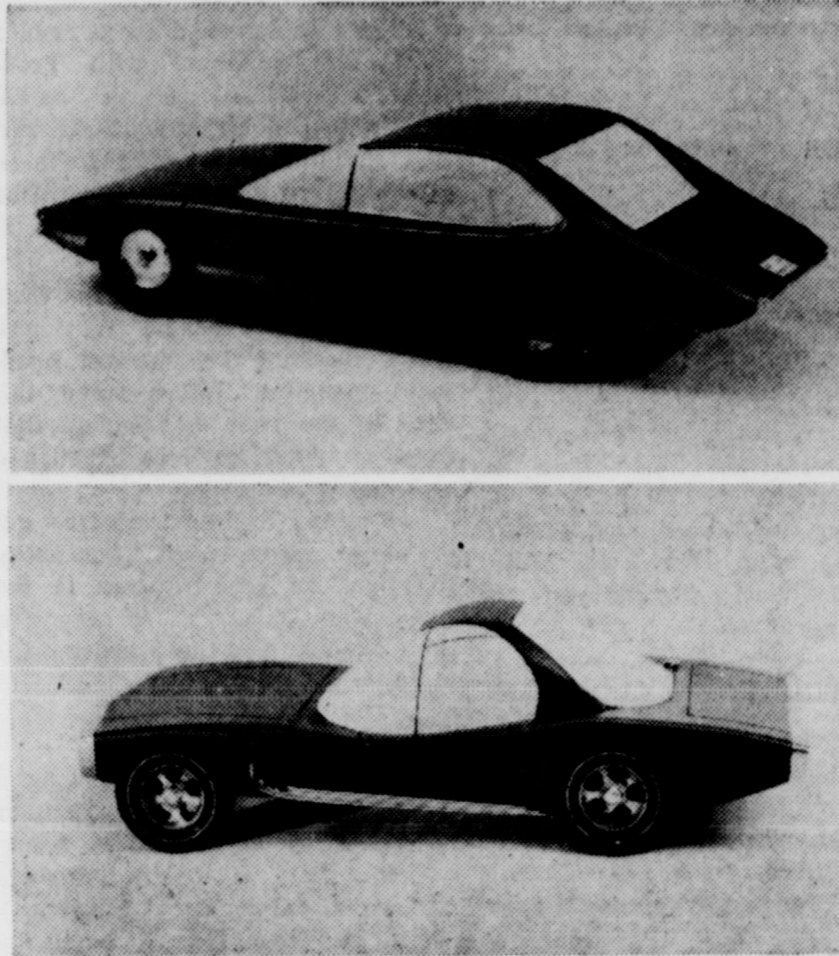
A reception followed the ceremony in the Smith home. Members of the family and close friends attended the wedding and reception.

Additional Teacher For Robert Lee This Year Given Approval

The state education department has granted the Robert Lee Schools an additional teacher for the 1962-1963 school year, reports Hervey Latham, superintendent.

During the tax study held this past year, it was found the school district had approximately 370 square miles, instead of the 262½ square miles previously believed to be the correct area total. This was evidently due to the failure to add the Green Mountain School District area when it was consolidated with the Robert Lee School District.

In 1956, the state legislature passed a law stating that school districts with fewer than one student per square mile would be granted an additional classroom teacher above the amount allocated under the average daily attendance plan. The Robert Lee School District will have 339 scholars this coming year, which

qualified it for the additional teacher.

Due to the tremendous enrollment in the seventh grade, it is hoped to be able to sectionalize at least two subjects of that grade, and also hire a teacher to teach commercial subjects and one or two English classes.

A band teacher has not been located as yet. Mr. Latham stated it was going to be difficult, under the present pay schedule, to hire a band teacher for a band this size. Only eight high school students have pre-registered for band this coming year.

OBSERVATIONS

From the northwest corner to the southeast corner, east side, west side, and all around the county, fire can burn down a house, destroy a pasture and the livestock with it.

There is a group of loyal men who meet twice a month in Robert Lee to practice and study on their own time how to put out these fires. We accept their services very gratefully when we need them. They also do extra chores keeping up the equipment, without which their work at any fire would be fruitless.

But they cannot be expected to re-place worn-out equipment nor should we expect them to get out and raise funds to re-place it. If there is any fund raising to do, some of the rest of us citizens who benefit by their voluntary, willing help should get out and do that.

This writer has some grass and brush and some houses that would burn like tinder. He is also a taxpayer, very much concerned with holding state, county, and school taxes within reason.

There are certain problems involved when fire equipment is to be bought by county funds. The people of Bronte are certainly to be commended for their work in raising over \$2,000 for a new fire truck.

It is not for this writer to say just what is the best method of going about it. He is willing to listen and learn. But we may as well face the stern facts of life. It costs money to protect Coke county against fire, even when the work is all done by volunteers.

Anybody anywhere in Coke County may have to dial 453-4291 any hour of any day or any night. The response will be unquestioning, quick, and capable, so far as the men are concerned.

So far as equipment in the future is concerned—you and I are going to have that to decide.

The county is furnishing \$1,000 per year to each of the two towns. That has been used to buy some old vehicles, and to buy tires and such repairs. It does not accumulate much funds to buy new equipment.

We may get along a good while yet with what we have. Or we may lose half a town and a lot of pasture, or a ranch house, too with what we have. It's time to give it a good thinking over, neighbors.

Soil Specialist Is Working On Survey of Coke County Soil

Jewaine McAndrews, who came to Robert Lee from Sonora several weeks ago is making a soil survey of Coke county for the Soil Conservation Service as a part of a nationwide soil survey.

Over 40,000 acres have been surveyed to date. Upon completion of the project a soil survey will be published, which will include a map that shows the location and extent of the soils in the county.

It will also show the boundaries of the various kinds and types of soils and how they can be used and managed. Depth, slope, erosion conditions, stoniness, color, and clay content are among the information gathered about each individual soil type.

Mr. McAndrews, Soil Scientist, works out of the Robert Lee SCS headquarters. He is living here, married, and has a daughter, Vicki Lynn, and a son, Stan.

Bulletin On Winter Temporary Pasturage At Lindsey's Office

Now is the time to be thinking about planting seed and the variety or varieties to plant for winter temporary pasturage. County agent Lindsey expects in the next few days, to receive a supply of the revised "Winter Temporary Pastures" bulletin. It will contain the varieties of oats, barley and other forage crops recommended for our area.

Advance information received revealed that three oat varieties have been added to the list - more grain, suregrain and Alamo-X. The first two are intermediate type oats that give early grazing. Also, they have shown good resistance to leaf rust.

Alamo-X is a spring type oat with an upright growth pattern.

Call the county agent or drop by the office if you would like to have a copy of the winter temporary pasture guide when it arrives.

REPORTS OF DAMAGE FROM CHEMICAL USED ON GRUBS IN CATTLE

County Agent Sterling Lindsey has received a report from the Extension Entomologist, C. F. Garner, stating that the new pour-on cattle grub control chemical has caused injury to livestock. The injury has primarily been in the form of chemical burn, but other toxic symptoms have been noted, also. He stated that the injuries apparently came from ingredients in the emulsifiable concentrate other than the DDT itself.

If you have used the product with injurious effects, we would appreciate hearing from you, the county agent said.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for the performance of the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereafter.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting state employees to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency, or any political subdivision thereof, or the Federal Government, if approved by administrative head or governing board of such employee and there is no conflict of interest."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section authorizing the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, providing for a possible consolidation of the two, providing a mode of funding and also authorizing construction, equipping, maintaining, and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 10(a). The Legislature may authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which shall include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria, and Damon Independent School Districts and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District. The qualified elector of the hospital districts may, by majority vote of each such hospital district, consolidate the Sweeny Hospital District into the Damon, West Columbia, and Brazoria Hospital District at any time subsequent to the organization of the separate hospital districts.

"Such districts, if created, may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property within the districts, provided no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident, qualified, property taxing voters who may have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections, provided existing obligations are not impaired, but in no event shall any change of rate exceed twenty-five cents (25c) per one hundred dollar valuation.

"The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to acquire, construct, maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the acquisition, construction, purchase, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same and such bonds shall be payable from said twenty-five cent tax.

"(b) In addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized under this Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas, Titus County is hereby

authorized and empowered to levy, assess and collect a tax not exceeding twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in said County in any one year for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on any bonds issued by said County for the purpose of constructing and equipping a home or homes for the aged persons in said County and to pay the maintenance and operation expenses thereof, provided said bonds and tax shall have been authorized at an election or elections held for that purpose by a majority of the qualified electors of Titus County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election. This provision shall be self-enacting and no enabling legislation hereunder shall be required. Any bond issued hereunder shall be issued in accordance with the General Laws except as herein otherwise provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and for permitting the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which is to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, also providing for a possible consolidation of the two by qualified voters of such districts, and providing for all necessary construction, equipping, maintaining and financing if authorized."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 proposing an amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to raise the limit on use of state funds for financial assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) a year to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000) a year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read: "Section 51a. Payment of Assistance to Needy Aged, Needy Blind and Needy Children.

The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such applications; provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further, that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously

for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000) per year. The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000)."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

We cannot afford to get to shouting so loudly at each other that nobody knows what the other is actually saying. We have definite issues to decide, decisions to make as a people. Let us discuss those issues with some calmness and restraint, giving those we want to convince a chance to turn a friendly ear to whatever facts we can offer them.

If we cannot offer them facts, then all our shouting will fall on deaf ears, and our purposes will be defeated.

On the other hand, Lenin, the apostle of communism, said "We will destroy everything, and on the ruins we will build our temple."

The Christian American has said, "We will build new homes, schools, factories—whatever we must build, and do it soundly and well. But we will not be tricked into the folly of destroying everything we have with which to do our building, neither will we pull down our neighbor's house on him."

Any temple that would require the destruction of everything to build would be a temple to what?

Americans are not primarily ANTI anything. It is simply that Lenin and those who follow him are Anti-US. The American Revolution set up something good without destroying all the old. The communist revolution is anti-American revolution.

It is they who pronounce the anti-everythings, the negatives, they who are reactionary, who would go back to their Genghis Kahn.

America and Americans have always been constructive. We as a people have built. If we are anti-communist it is simply because they have set themselves against us, sought to block our path, destroy everything we have built.

bands that ranged from the edge of the plains to the Pecos with their families, and in war bands often went into Mexican settlements for scalps and plunder, on both sides of the Rio Grande

In his reports he spoke of the North, Middle, and Southern Comanches, and described his meeting with Saneco, a chief in charge of a large settlement of Comanches on the Clear Fork of the Brazos. However, settlement was not the word he used, as they moved from one camping ground to another, and built no permanent habitations.

Spaniards Patrolled Coke County
Records in Old Mexico contain reports from the officers of the Spanish army, detachments of which from time to time crossed this country, and that the Comanches had held the country for three hundred years before our own people began to come in here.

They speak of their men picking up pecans on the Concho over three hundred years ago, and a Spanish priest with a portable organ in those times conducted services among the Indians, at one time doing this at the site of the present Ballinger.

A Spanish saber was found sticking in the ground in a pasture near Sanco, also a metal Spanish stirrup in that vicinity. This was on the route followed by the Spanish patrols from Santa Fe, then the capitol of the country we now live in. They would ride through to San Antonio, where they had an army post.

Incidentally, San Antonio has always been an army town, ever since there was a San Antonio.

The Spanish never tried to make any settlement in West Texas except a mission or two, and the

Indians seemed to have got along with them, as the Spaniards were not around enough of the time to interfere with their favorite pastimes of hunting, fishing, and horse stealing from other tribes, with the good clean fun of snatching a scalp or two now and then to carry home and prove their manhood to the rest of the tribe.

Comanches Rode the Range
In the fall of the year they moved with what few belongings they had, packing their buffalo hides for wigwams or other shelter along with them, and along the pleasant little streams, then affording much more water than now, they made their temporary villages on camp sites that had been used for uncounted centuries before them by other tribes whose memory had already faded from the mind of man.

They were expert horsemen, loved horses, and trafficked in them, raised them on the open range, and as time went on, raided the settlements for horses to trade with other tribes and the Mexicans, as well as to use for their own mounts.

Teachers doing research and others who make it a hobby can find much material in the quarterlies of the Southwestern Historical Association and of the West Texas Historical Association.

The late Judge R. C. Crane of Sweetwater, and the late Col. M. L. Crimmins of San Antonio collected vast amounts of this information, and their libraries were left to posterity. Inquiry at Sweetwater and at Brooke Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston might secure information as to where these collections are now.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Hardin-Simmons did a lot of research in West Texas history, and the library at that school has some good materials.
