The Civil War was fought by two classes of people-those who wanted to change things too fast and those who didn't want to change fast enough.

So they got out and killed each other for four long years.

If it is right and the real, abiding law of the land demands it, the people of Mississippi and other states of the South will finally come around after awhile and let negroes into their university.

They are Americans. Americans have to be won over to different view points. For the Federal government to force states to him, breaking his glasses and submit against their will is to deny the first principles of what we like to call Democratic government.

The people of the South have spent millions building schools for negroes. Those Christians who believe they should go further and admit negroes to the white schools should exercise some Christian patience. It is not Christian to put a bayonet to people's throats, even to make them do what we think is right. It is not American. You cannot come in from Washington, arrest and imprison the elected officials of a state without doing violence to our whole people.

It is not wise socially or politically. If we think the peple of Mississippi are wrong, we have worse wrongs in the world almost as near in Cuba. Are we going to use the U. S. army, air force, Continued on Page 2

That would be a tough assignment.

If the abolitionists had been willing to use persuasion and to keep preaching their doctrine for ten more years in 1860 slavery could have been peacefully done away with in America as it was in England.

This is no time for a repetition of the carpetbagging days. If there are Baptists, Methodists, or Presbyterians in Texas who believe their brethren in Mississippi are living in sin, then let's send missionaries, not tear gas.

We have had too many people in other sections want to Christianize the South with paratroopers, marshalls, and court orders.

It will never be done that way. But the United States of America


can be destroyed that way. The lot of the negro would have been much better in the 1880's if the Civil War had not been fought and the emancipation accomplished by the longer peaceful processes of government. The lot of the negro in the 1980's will be far better socially, economically, and

politically, if peaceful processes are continued. He will not be helped by forcing his way into and among a people angered and resentful.

Reformers who can't wait have always become Hitlers or revolutionists, turned into killers.

To come in from Washington and arrest and imprison the officials of a state would create far more problems than it would remedy, both for the state and for the nation.

That kind of mechanics is like trying to repair a short with a sledge hammer.
