## The World As We See It

### Horse and Buggy Ideas

It is plain human nature to feel sometimes, maybe often, that knowledge began when we were born.

Whenever we get to feeling too smart, maybe we ought to ask ourselves a few questions. Like—

Who made the first automobile?

Who did? Several people in different parts of the earth were working on it about the same time. This writer knew a man whose father, a Methodist preacher, attached a gasoline engine to a farm wagon, and that may have been the first motor propelled vehicle in the United States. It was so far as he knew.

They were working on it in France, and the Russians claim they had one first.

But whoever they were, all of them rode in horse-drawn vehicles, if they rode.

The horse and buggy people invented the telegraph, the telephone, the automobile, the airplane, and the first wireless set; the first steam engine, the first internal combustion (gasoline) engine.

The horse and buggy people made the first electric light, the first electric generator, the first electric motor. They did study and developed theories that opened the way for nuclear fission.

The horse and buggy people established the laboratories that began the processes that led to most of the recent developments in industrial chemistry. They foresaw and foreplanned the exploration of space, outlined the principles of rocketry, made the first experiments in it, built the telescope that opened up the heavens to science.

The makers of the first automobile used the vehicles that the horse and buggy people had built. The scientists now penetrating the heavens use an astronomy which was begun in Egypt before the pyramids. For their figures they use numerals developed by the ancient Arabs, and mathematics whose first use is lost in antiquity.

Their alphabet was created by the ancient Phoenicians, wheels invented before man's historical memory began.

The use pumps operating on the same principle as pumps built

## Farm Bureau Favors Coke Water Storage

Coke County Farm Bureau members voted unanimously for an agriculture that in the main stands on its own two feet in their convention here Tuesday night.

They recommended continuation of voluntary producer support of the screw worm eradication program and recommended to the state convention that the American Farm Bureau abandon re-

quests for subsidies and lay continued emphasis on the work being done by or sponsored by Farm Bureau in building up markets for farm commodities.

They went on record as opposed to a marketing order method of licensing and control of commodity marketing.

A resolution endorsed the construction of a dam in Coke County on the Colorado River.

Ben Boykin was elected president, H. H. Holland vice-president, and Mrs. C. E. Arrott re-elected as secretary-treasurer.

## Game Group Requests Regulatory Powers

White tail deer are in overproduction over much of the state and there is danger of another die-up when drouth comes to the hill country.

So Henry Burkett, Regional Director for the Texas Fish and Game Commission told around one hundred members and their families of the Coke County Game Management Association at their annual meeting Saturday night, at the County Park, Robert Lee.

The Association voted to ask the Legislature for regulatory powers. The deer season, which would be under this arrangement, the county is given authority to regulate done upon the advice and request of the Game Management Association.

The Association elected Aubrey Denman President, Curtis Walker Vice-President, and Earl F. Glenn Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year. The annual meeting in 1963 is to be held at Bronte.

Directors elected are: Willis Wayne Smith, Precinct 1; Bob White, Precinct 2; Wilburn Milligan, Precinct 3, and LeDrew Arrott, Precinct 4.

The group went on record as opposed to continuing the present archery season on deer which runs through the month of October prior to the rifle season in November. It was pointed out that, at present, deer may be legally killed with bow and arrow during this month.

Besides Mr. Burkett, Texas Fish and Game Commission officers present include Walter Rinehart, District Chief, Midland; Gordon Craig, Warden, Paint Rock; Walter Stapp, Oak Creek, and Roy Lynn, Warden, Sweetwater, and R. L. Flannagan, Warden for Coke, Concho, and Runnels counties.

Norrell Wallace, of San Angelo, Information and Education Director for this Region, showed a film, Trail of the White Tail, emphasizing the importance of keeping the game population down within limits of the normal available forage to prevent die-ups in bad years.

Barbecue prepared by Pat Johnson was served to the crowd—cooked in ranch style in open pit, and beans cooked in a big wash pot, country style.

Mr. Flannagan discussed the game seasons and bag limits, saying that the dove season continues through October 30 only. Quail season opens December 1, runs through January 1, Bag limit is 12, limit in possession any one time, 36.

Deer limit is two bucks per person in Coke county. Turkey bag limit is three gobblers per person.

## Steers Will Start 8-B Play Next Week

The Steers have a schedule rest this week while drilling for their first conference tilt when they meet Hermleigh at Hermleigh next Friday night at 7:30.

They dropped their first game to lose this season when the Ozona Lions roared into the ball game with everything they had to make a couple of touchdowns in the first half, with one pair of extra points, counting 14-0 at the end of the first half and at the end of the game.

The Steers, who had taken considerable penalties in previous games, seemed to be trying to avoid making so many penalties, but they were plowed into by a line having an edge in weight, and the Lions' shifty and fleet back fielder, Robert Montgomery, got loose enough times to roll up the winning points before the

Steers pinned him down and stopped the razzle dazzle in the second half, threatened to score once, but didn't quite have the power.

The stands were full of home folks and Ozona visitors.

The game was well played and not as one-sided as the score indicated. The Ozona High School Band, and the Steerettes, local colorful pep squad gave big time tone to the intermission at half.

So far as can be learned from Observer files and local former players, this is the first time for Robert Lee to play Ozona since a bi-district go in '45 or '46.

The Steers have played six games, won 4, lost one, tied one, and still stand out ahead of the other 8-B teams, Hermleigh, Loraine, Trent, and Bronte in point of games won.

centuries ago, copper pipes made much like those in homes buried by the sands of the Sahara before the Bible was written.

So it is with questions of economics and government that concern us so much today. Most of the benefits we enjoy from government and the oppressions and tyrannies that have cursed mankind had their beginnings many, many centuries before any of us were born.

This is true of the Prussian-Russian-Communist idea versus the idea of government with the consent of the governed by legislatures, Congress, and the free choice of a free people.

The problems that are upon us today are not entirely the fault of any one president, any one court, and one Congress.

The East idea versus the West idea dates back to the families of the sons of Noah—back to the time when families grew into tribes, tribes into races and nations, nations into empires.

We have not just lately discovered the tyranny of dictators nor the problems of republics. Every new problem is a new aspect of a struggle as old as the human race—to maintain freedom in the face of those with cleverness, ability, or power determined to own and control the bulk of their fellow men.

**Second Immunization Sunday** Set Sunday, Nov. 11, is the day planned to offer Silver and Mitchell County residents Type III of the Sabin Oral vaccine.

The Silver School Cafeteria will again be used as the feeding station with the hours being 12 p.m. — 6 p.m. Type III, second most prevalent of the polio viruses, has been chosen as the second dose by all this West Texas area. City Health Officer Dr. Ken Cowan pointed out two reasons for giving Type III before Type II, as was first announced. First, medical records show that Type III is far more dangerous and more common than the small percentage of Type II polio cases. Second reason advanced by Colorado City health directors, along with public health authorities throughout West Texas and most of the nation is the fact that Type II viruses require an unusually long period

before immunization is built against it, polio research experts hold. Should Type II be taken second, that is, on Nov. 11, it would place in jeopardy the town and county hopes for building immunity against the two best-known (and the two meanest) polio viruses in a delay for a number of weeks.

If there is any change in the present plans, the public will be notified.

Remember the date — Nov. 11 Time— 12 p.m.-6 p.m.

- ½ t. salt

Cream fat and sugar; add eggs one at a time and beat well. Turn mixer to lowest speed and add flour and extracts. Bake in tube pan 1 hour at 300°. Two oblong loaf pans may be used instead of tube pan.

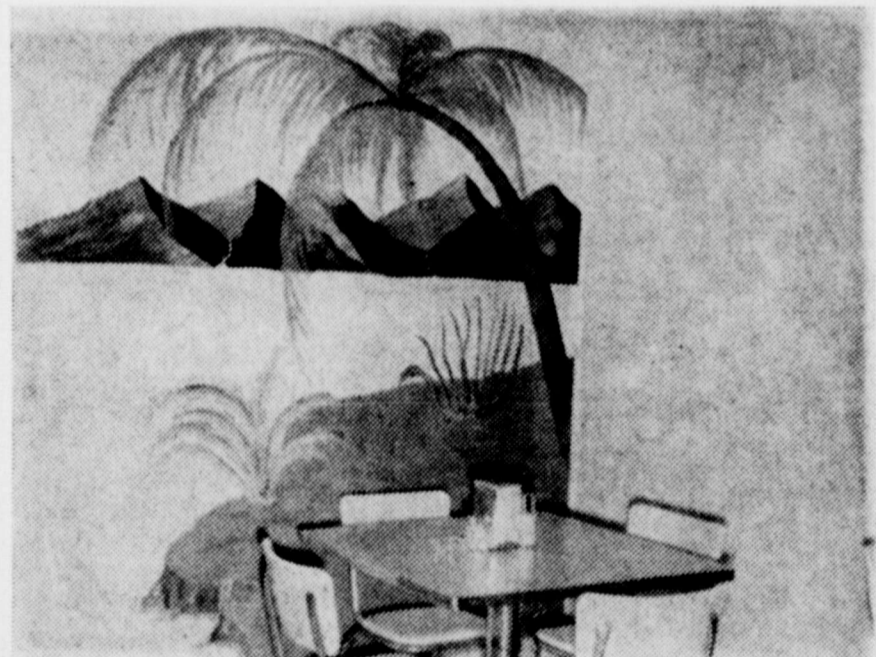

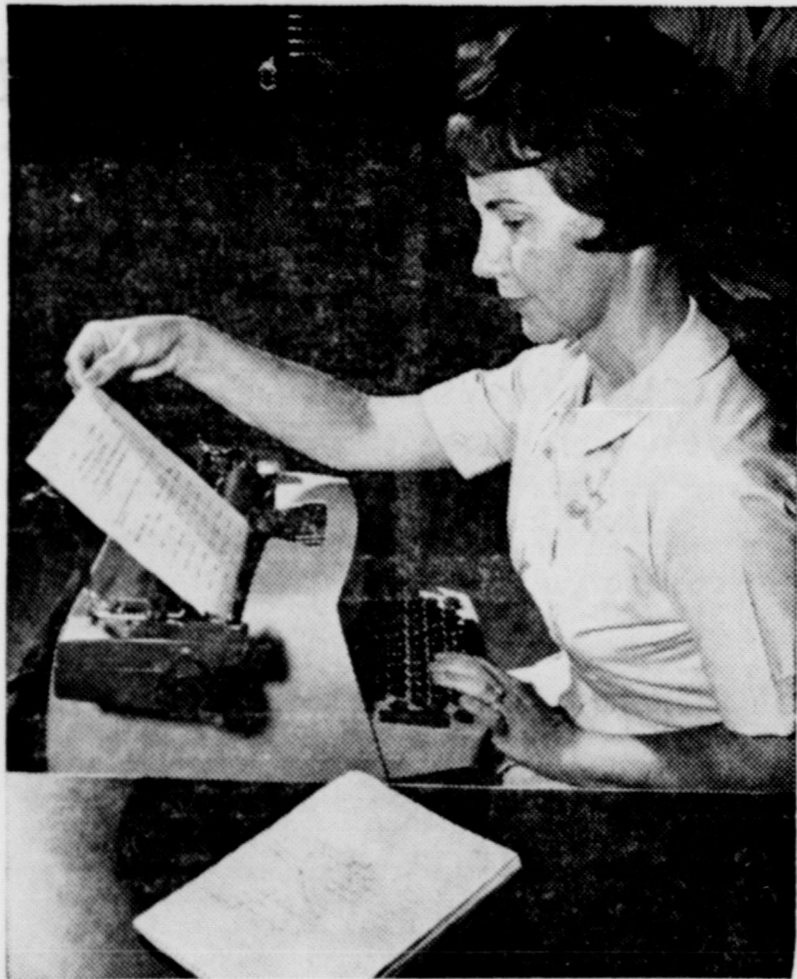
