Well Done But Who Won?

President Kennedy has done a superb job of handling armed forces for a man who is always talking about doing away with them. This Cuban maneuver was well planned and prepared, both diplomatically and militarily, and wonderfully well carried out. But before we hail it as a victory let's give it a close look.

Those fellows took China without firing a missile or using any sort of nuclear device, likewise Indonesia, Algeria, Laos, and Cuba. While they are invading India to take it the same way, we have been kept so interested in Cuba we have hardly noticed it.

It looks pretty certain now they didn't aim to use missiles in Cuba any more than they did anywhere else. They have been too successful without them, and they don't want their own houses incinerated.

We hope, by the time this is in print, we will get some sort of statement from Washington that will put this in different light. But dispatches over the weekend looked like the President was trading them Cuba if they would take their missiles home.

If he has our word we will let the Russians alone in Cuba, Khrushchev can afford to take his missiles home. His real game is sabotage, infiltration, assassination, propaganda, and the use of conventional weapons that can be slipped into a country after the blockade is lifted, for use in mountains and jungles and to take over a country by comparatively small, well armed native armies.

He intends to work his way to the Rio Grande that way. For us to promise we will not run him out of Cuba is all he needs, for he knows we will keep the promise.

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Civil Defense Plans Shaped For County

(The following information was compiled by the editors of the Robert Lee Observer and The Bronte Enterprise for both newspapers.)

Following an emergency meeting of officials responsible for civil defense, called by County Judge W. W. Thetford at the Court house Friday afternoon, definite organization and instruction in the event of disaster, such as the landing of a nuclear missile, were drawn up for this area.

Warning Signals

A long continuous blast on the siren means probable attack, with time to contact local authorities and follow instructions.

A series of short blasts, usually three blasts, repeated, means take cover immediately. These signals will be given by the fire siren, unless mechanical failure or failure of electric power should put the siren out of commission.

In that case, the signals will be given by sirens on the fire trucks, the sheriff's department automobiles, ambulances, or whatever vehicle with such equipment is available.

Children at schools will be held in the most protected rooms in the building until the all clear sounds, except for those children whose parents come for them.

In the event of such a disaster, people are advised to use fallout shelters if they have them, otherwise to remain inside the best building available, unless some other instructions are issued by local authorities over the radio or by other means of communication.

When an alert should come, the mayor of each town goes to his office immediately, as does the county judge and the sheriff. The county judge is the officer in charge for the county and the mayor is in charge of his city.

U. S. Department of Agriculture personnel will be in charge of securing food supplies and checking them for safety. J. E. Quisen-

berry, office manager of the the Agricultural Conservation Service, is chairman. Sterling Lindsey, county agent for the extension service, is a member of this board along with Jake Jacoby, member of the local soil conservation service staff.

Those experienced in first aid work should have their names listed with their mayor, County Judge Thetford and Sheriff Melvin Childress.

In addition to their usual duties, the sheriff's department will be in charge of emergency communications. Any individual who has a radio sending set, along with company owned radio equipment may figure in this and should have

Hickman Property Settlement Asked In Jury Case Here

The suit styled Maxine J. Hickman vs Robert C. Hickman, for divorce and property settlement, went to trial here Monday before a jury in 51st Judicial District court, continued from August.

Pending since December 29, 1961, the case involves separate properties owned by each before their marriage on July 25, 1959, and requires accounting of community property and income since.

The National Bank of Sweetwater has intervened by virtue of a note for \$6,500 which they allege was made to them by Hickman with some livestock now involved in the suit as security on that note.

Mrs. Hickman is represented by Royal Hart of San Angelo, Mr. Hickman by Wm. C. McDonald of San Angelo, and the intervening bank by Nunn and Griggs.

All announced ready for trial Monday, and the following jury was impaneled: Fred Killam, Roy Wyatt, L. E. Wink, Zeddie Beal, Artell Roberts, Glenn Waldrop, Dave King, A. J. Roe Jr., Homer Jameson, Clyde Lee, R. C. Lasswell, and Marvin Landers.

The plaintiff asks restoration of her former name of Maxine Aldred.

According to papers filed in the case, property in excess of a quarter of a million dollars is involved, including the plaintiff's income from the W. A. Halamecek Family Partnership which operates ranch interests in Coke and Reeves counties.

POLIO VACCINE GIVEN FRIDAY, SUNDAY AT ROBERT LEE SCHOOL

The oral (by mouth) vaccine for polio will be given at the school Friday, November 9, from 1 to 3 p.m. for school children only, to those whose parents authorize it in writing.

On Sunday, November 11, the vaccine will be available to adults and pre-school age children, also at the school, from 12 to 2 p.m.

Tuesday Will Decide Hot Governors Race

The hottest contest between Democrat and Republican nominees for governor of Texas within the memory of most Coke County citizens draws to a close this week with decision up to the voters next Tuesday, Nov. 6.

The Republicans have candidates for Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Congressman at Large, Railroad Commissioner, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Commissioner of the General Land Office.

E. S. Mayer Jr. is opposing O. C. Fisher as Congressman in this district, the 21st, and Joe

Collins opposing Penroe Metcalf for the State Board of Education.

Voters are cautioned to be sure to mark out all columns or names of candidates other than those for whom he or she wishes to vote.

Fourteen amendments to the State Constitution are to be voted on.

For the posts of state Senator, state Representative from this district, the 78th, and all local officers Democrats are unopposed.

Sample ballots may be secured at the office of County Clerk J. L. Tinkler, at the Robert Lee Observer, or the Bronte Enterprise.

The column for the Democratic Party is on the left, as usual. Republican next, then the Constitution Party with Jack Carswell nominated for Governor and Joseph M. Rummel for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The column for Independents is blank and another write in column lists offices with space to write in any names the voter desires.

Dogies Defeat Dragons 27-8 on Home Field

The Robert Lee Junior High Dogies continued their season of undefeated, untied wins Tuesday night by rolling up a score of 27-8 over the Sacred Heart Dragons of San Angelo.

Gaylon Pitcock carried the ball for two touchdowns, Gary Sam Williams counted up one and added three extra points and in a tricky end run and long pass to Randy Hall teamed up for the final count, Randy making his getaway for a neat catch and touchdown, then Williams kicking a field goal for the one point extra.

The Dogies made 14 first downs to the Dragons' 3, took six penalties for 60 yards to the Dragons 1 for 18.

The Dogies have an open week ahead, then on November 15 meet the Silver Indians at Silver. Coach Garland Davis gave all his players practice and it was not until the Dogie second string went in that the Dragons scored.

Along Williams long boogie and passing and the consistent winning of the first string line and backfield, Pitcock showed increasing promise in broken field ball carrying as well as blocking.

Aiming At The Top, Steers To Meet Trent Here Friday Night

Rating at the top for the season in point of percentages of total games won, among Class 8-B and Class 7-B teams, the Robert Lee Steers take on Trent Gorillas at Robert Lee's Griffith field Friday night, 7:30.

The Steers came out of the Hermleigh game last Friday in good condition, and with the heavy end of a 37-14 score, which they had to earn against a team of Cardinals who played football in every quarter, according to qualified observers.

The Steers in their first 8B game of the season at Hermleigh scored in every quarter. For the first TD

Halfback Lynn White went over on a three yard carry and Rusty Dodson ran the conversion.

White also carried the ball on the next touchdown.

Hermleigh Cardinals scored in the second half when Paul Kimsey made an 18 yard carry, Halfback Terry Smith running the conversion.

Then the Steers came back with a six yard run by Phil Lowder, and Dodson ran the conversion.

In the third quarter, Guard Joe Vernon of the Cardinals blocked a Robert Lee punt, Fred Gifford picked up the ball and ran to the one yard line, and in two plays the Cardinals got over, J. B. Roberson, their quarterback going over from the two yard line.

Robert Lee scored again in the fourth period when Coalson intercepted a pass and ran 22 yards to the goal, and then Lowder ran conversion.

To end the scoring, Dodson raced 41 yards through the line for six points, and Jimmy Carraway booted a 1 point conversion, said to be the first goal kicked by a Steer in recent memory.

Robert Lee, however, turned their opponents passing to their own gain by intercepting three to their one interception.

Then if he can keep us talking about disarmament for awhile until the Chinese Reds have India in their grasp, his missiles never cost him as much as it did us to get rid of them, and will have accomplished their purpose for him.

The President has proved he can lead and could fight. But if that is the kind of trade he is making, he will do what others have too often done—give away in diplomacy all that the armed forces can gain by show of power in peace time or victory in war.

If, with the kind of hand he held last week, he has let Khrushchev walk out with Cuba in his pocket, then he hasn't done anything yet, except give the armed forces some valuable experience, which they won't be allowed to use in the Red revolutions that will follow in South America.

Developments could prove otherwise, and we devoutly hope this appraisal is wrong. But as of Monday morning it looked like, despite our show of might and power, we had scrapped the Monroe Doctrine, handed Cuba to the Russians, and put our O.K. on their staying there, provided they just won't keep missiles on the island.

This is all they need, and to get this was why they put the missiles there in the first place.

- ▶ In 1937, before Connally graduated from college he was working in Lyndon Johnson's first race for Congress. Following Johnson's election, Connally went to Washington as Congressman Johnson's assistant.
- ▶ In 1948 Connally managed Johnson's Senate campaign, (87 vote landslide) which involved the scandalous vote frauds of Duval County and Box 13 in Jim Wells County. Johnson took Connally back to Washington as administrative assistant (top man) in his Senate office.
- ▶ Late in 1949 Connally joined the law firm of Powell, Wirtz and Rauhaut in Austin. State Senator Wirtz was Under Secretary of the Interior when he resigned his Washington post to return to Texas to run Johnson's first Senatorial campaign in 1941.
- ▶ In 1952 John Connally went to work for Fort Worth oil man, Sid Richardson. Attorney General Will Wilson said, "Sid Richardson did not hire (Connally) for his training or knowledge. Sid Richardson hired him because he was LBJ's campaign manager." Lyndon Johnson had this comment on Mr. Richardson, "Nobody did more to send me to the Senate than the late Sid Richardson." Fort Worth Star Telegram, January 12, 1961.
- ▶ In 1956 Lyndon Johnson tapped Connally to place Johnson's name in nomination for President at the Democratic National Convention.
- ▶ In 1956, 1958, and 1960 Connally was picked to lead the Johnson forces in the county and state conventions.
- ▶ In 1960, Johnson called on Connally to lead the drive to obtain the Presidential nomination for him. Later, Connally was active in Johnson's Texas campaign.
- ▶ As a reward, Connally was tagged for the post of Secretary of the Navy shortly after President Kennedy visited Vice-President-elect Johnson's ranch. The New York Times termed Connally's appointment as "Mr. Johnson's biggest patronage plum." (June 4, 1962)
- ▶ In 1961 Connally, after less than a year on the job he pledged to fill for four years, resigned to run for Governor of Texas. Time magazine said Connally's announcement for Governor "certainly seemed to carry Lyndon Johnson's political fingerprints." (December 22, 1961) After Connally's victory over Yarborough, Time said "His mentor Lyndon Johnson thus tightened his grip on the Texas Democratic organization." (June 8, 1962)
- ▶ All over Texas long-time Lyndon Johnson backers are spearheading Connally's million dollar campaign. Why? Federal pay offs from the Kennedy-Johnson team.

With this background it's an insult to Texans' intelligence to pretend that John Connally is not the hand-picked candidate of Lyndon Johnson. Thinking Texans will reject this brazen attempt to merge State and Federal patronage into one gigantic political machine run out of Washington by L. B. J.

Wink Test Turns Dry With Gas, 500 Ft. Salt Water

Lipan Oil Company of San Angelo No. 1 L. E. Wink 8 miles north of Robert Lee has been plugged and abandoned, with the Dugger and Herring rig stacked at the location early this week.

Recovery on a drill stem test was 600 feet of gas in the drill pipe, 100 feet of salty oil and gas cut mud, and 500 feet of salt water.

The Tucker Drilling Company test on Palmer Leeper ranch was also reported plugged and abandoned.

(A Personal Word
By The Editor)

The secret ballot is the safeguard of any government by the people. Without it there is no real Democracy, Republic, or any other form in which the people have the say.

Labor unions arrive at their decision as to whom they support without it. Farm referendums are not secret. Whoever opens the letter that contains the ballot can, if he wishes, record how each man voted.

Wherever there is not a secret ballot, there is always a chance for reprisals. A man could lose his job. He could be boycotted in business, he could, and at times men have been clubbed and even killed for voting "wrong."

Our ballot system is not as secret as it should be, in many cases. Anyone who has reason to fear his vote might be recorded or checked in any manner, he can take one precaution by taking his ballot out of the middle of the stack on the election judge's desk.

If only one ballot lies on the desk, see that more are placed with it before drawing yours, and then do not take it off the top of the sack, but select one wherever you will.

No official of any kind has any business knowing how you voted, unless you tell it yourself. That is your affair, and yours alone. Every official has sworn to observe the secrecy of the ballot, and if he violates that oath he has violated the first principle of being an American.

In our county and community, we don't consider precautions to protect the secrecy of the ballot needed.

Yet, humanity being so human, we might do well to observe them to reduce temptation.

Sometimes more suffering and pain than the human frame can stand comes to a man in those days when the end draws near.

The passing from this life is never easy. With 81 years behind him, the loss of sight facing him, unrelieved and continuous pain from a diseased eye—boxed in by life, Frank Burns broke the box away.

It is not for us to say how we will meet what the failing years may bring.

When the time comes for this writer he would like to just lean his head over his typewriter.

But the Lord remembereth our frame. It seems He does not always intervene before a man has reached the limit that his body can bear.

Concerning County Finance

In order for the public to be informed, governing bodies are required by law to publish regular financial statements.

For many of us, these statements are hard to break down into terms we can clearly understand. This does not reflect on anybody who does the bookkeeping and makes the reports. It means that we are not all auditors, bookkeepers or even familiar with the type of funds and with what bookkeeping balances are.

For example, last week the treasurer's report published showed a county balance of \$248,210.17, which looks like a lot of money. But does it mean the county can dip into that for anything anytime? Just how much money does the county actually have that is not earmarked to meet outstanding indebtedness?

That is what we mean when we say, for most of us, it is a complicated thing. We have found county officials willing to go into detail on these matters any time we have gone into their offices.

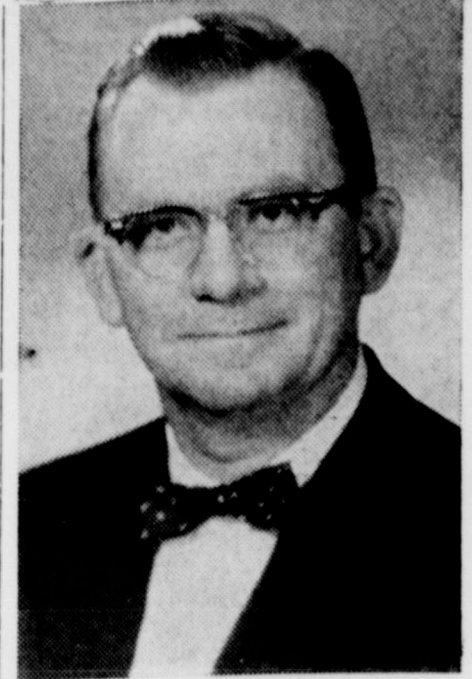
We also have a copy of the budget in our office, but that, too, is not easy to analyze. We have been trying to get around to doing some homework on that.

1962 Feed Grain Program

Anyone having diverted acres under the 1962 Wheat Stabilization, Barley and Feed Grain program may graze this acreage after November 1, 1962. No crop may be harvested from the 1962 diverted acres. This is not to be confused with the Soil Bank Program. Acreage now in the Soil Bank may not be grazed or harvested until the contract expires.

1963 Wheat Program

The 1963 Wheat Stabilization Program will be a volunteer program. You may divert a minimum of 20% or a maximum of 50% of your allotment or base acres which ever is larger. There is some change in the 1963 program. There will be only one payment rate. You must divert the number of acres that you sign up for on your intention to participate. If you do not wish to participate in the wheat stabilization program you may plant your allotment, or 15 acres if you do not have an allotment. If your allotment is less than 15 acres you may plant up to 15 acres.

The sign up date for wheat stabilization is from NOW until Dec. 14, 1962.
