Dec. 20, 1962 Joe Fields Passes Away at Roscoe, to Be Buried Friday

Services are to be held today, Thursday, at 2:00 o'clock for Joseph E. Johnson (Joe) Fields, 90, who died in Roscoe about 9 a.m. Tuesday.

A resident of Coke County since 1889, Mr. Field lived on his farm in the Edith community until his health failed and he moved to Robert Lee and lived in town for several years.
