

Somebody-the scientists-have said that we don't use but a small fraction of our brains. I knew that a good while ago. Sometimes I used a FRACTION, sometimes I didn't use ANY.

The story is told of a little locomotive on an old time railroad, one of these little roads out from Podunk to Nowhere, and it had such a little boiler and such a big whistle, that every time the engineer blowed the whistle he had to stop the train.

One of humanity's afflictions is that so often when the mouth flies open the brain goes shut-not enough power there to think and talk both at the same time.

But the fellow who reads and learns something, or thinks it out for himself, if he doesn't put it into practice where somebody can see it or tell somebody about it has lost all his thinking and it doesn't do him or anybody else any good.

Some of the best citizens have done a lot of steady work and steady thinking all at the same time. A man could stand across the fence and watch them and learn something.

They didn't write a book or talk a lot, but they plowed a lot of ground, worked a lot of cattle, built a lot of fence, rode a lot of pasture, built schools, churches, factories, counties, states, and nations.

There's a moral in this somewhere. Sometimes maybe a man ought to stop his plow and do some concentrated thinking. But when he has got it figured out and made what improvement he can, then he needs to get back to his plowing, or his thinking won't get him or anybody else out of the weeds.

The reason for such haste, accuracy and complete observance is that one female screwworm fly lays an average of 400 eggs. If half her eggs hatch, are allowed to complete their cycle, within three generations there could be more than 16 million screwworms


