# **Ponds Are Ready For Spring Rains**

When that next running rain comes in April or May, Coke County will have tubs out in the form of 1,348 acre feet of small farm and ranch ponds-337 of them engineered by the Soil Conservation Service.

This is in addition to the large structures on the Kickapoo Creek watershed, and were built on a 50-50 basis by the owners and the government.

Part of them were aided through the ASC office headed by J. E. Quisenberry, and the other through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

695,945 cubic feet of diversion structures have been built to protect crop land, divert water into ponds, or into spreading systems.

George Corse, the new band director at Silver Junior High School, has a band that includes six guitars, a banjo and four melodicas. Corse also uses the piano with the band, which he plays himself.

All this, and the fact that Mr. Corse writes most of his own arrangements, gives the band a different sound from the ordinary school band. Corse stresses what he calls "sweetness with rhythm." There will be one or two marches such as "Colonel Bogie" but the concert will include a wide variety of music types from light

classics to "hillbilly" featuring such tunes as "To a Wild Rose,' MacDowell, "Wabash Blues, 'Peg O My Heart," "Blue Moon, 'Do You Ever Think of Me?, 'Catch a Falling Star," "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You," etc.

The melodica is a new wind instrument recently invented in Western Germany. It is a reed instrument with keys like a piano and is so easily blown that no special training or embouchure development is necessary to sound the notes. Besides playing single notes the performer can also play double stops and full chords, which cannot be done on any other band instrument. The cost is very low, less than \$10.00 each for the soprano model.

Corse is very enthusiastic about the melodica and believes it will eventually revolutionize music teaching in the schools.

Every music lover in the area has a cordial invitation to attend this unusual concert at Silver Junior High School next Thursday night, April 4, at 7:30 p.m.
