## Observations

(A Personal Word By The Editor)

there has been two notions Other improvements have been around, one in the town and the other in the country.

Maybe not so much now as it once was, but too often farmers and ranchmen have had the idea that their home town retailer was getting rich at the customer's expense-a sort of a parasite living

On the other hand too many working men and some business men have had the notion back in their minds that the landowner was a sort of bloated capitalist, esspecially if he had enough land to make a fair living. He ought to have it taxed out of him.

We ought to get away from both ideas.

Where one home town merchant is making money, two are just barely getting by, and another is going out of business-just like it is out on the stock farm. What's wrong about the merchant making a little money, if he's a good business man? He will need it to expand his business and give you the service you want. He has got to make some money if he can stand to give anybody credit for thirty, sixty, or 700 days like he is often asked to do.

On the other hand, what's wrong with the landowner making a little money too? He'll need it when the next drought comes, and it may be here already. He will need it to pay taxes with the two, three, four, five, or maybe more years he won't make enough out of his livestock to pay interest and taxes, net.

Whene oil companiees ask for their valuations to be lowered, they do it on the basis that their wells are being depleted, their income is less.

When they ask that the landowners taxes be raised, they never bring that up. For the landowner, the valuation does not depend on income. For the oil company, it does. Who ever thought up that sort of a double stand-

Coke County landowners have always been faithful to pay their taxes. They have borrowed money through many a year to pay their taxes. They have kept the county going on that borrowed money in years when there were no oil operations within a hundred miles of here.

Land valuations are theoretically low. But that has been taken care of. Enough levy has been made on these low valuations to bring the total tax take up to what the traffic will bear.

A piece of land that brings in \$750 in grass lease pays \$110 per year in state, county and school taxes. If the tax levy continues to rise, then the man who is leasing that land and trying to make a living off of livestock is going to have to pay more for his lease.

The time has come when a good many citizens in Robert Lee who ranch on leased grass will be paying any tax increase levied on the land they lease, through higher leases. But they are already paying as much as the business will bear.

The stock argument around the land is, "Get into another business, then. That one isn't paying."

But where will they go to get into another business? Not likely around here. Want to lose them as customers in your grocery store, dry goods store, garage, drug store, filling station.

The county has a tax levy of \$227,000 per year, and 99 per cent of it is paid. The commissioners court for several years now has followed a policy of pay-as-you-go,

Roy Boathe, also of Sweetwater, took us on a tour of his bermuda pastures which he irrigates with effluent from the City of Sweetwater. He has three varieties-Coastal, Midland and NK-37 - in well. The NK 37, he stated, produced the finest quality hay. Mr. Boathe received a yield of approximately 400 bales (60 lbs per bale) per acre of hay last year. He stated that he waters and fertilizes (100 lbs. per acre nitrogen) about every 3-4 weeks. He primarily green chops and hauls the feed to his cattle.




