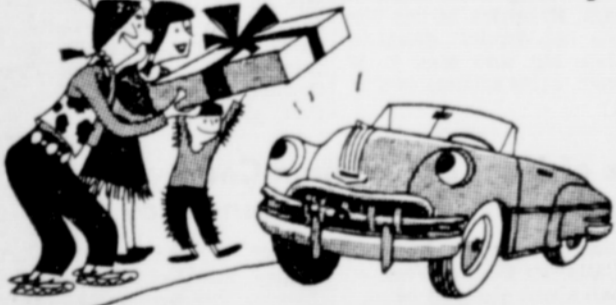

Number of TB Patients in Hospitals Growing But Number of Deaths Decreasing

Fewer people are dying from TB each year, but the number of patients in TB hospitals is growing. According to Dr. W. D. Anderson of San Angelo, chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Committee on Tuberculosis, "rapid progress is being made in saving people from death from TB but progress in saving people from the disease itself is slow."

The recent published Annual Report of the National Tuberculosis Association, Dr. Anderson said today, attributes the drop in death to the development of new drugs, important advances in surgery, and recent expansion of X-ray survey programs in which new cases of TB are discovered in the early stage. The report shows that TB deaths in the United States have dropped from 150,000 in 1900 to about 40,000 a year at present. "Since 1904 the death rate has been cut 85 per cent," Dr. Anderson said, "yet the disease is known to strike 100,000 victims annually and public health authorities estimate that about 500,000 people in the U.S.A. have TB today."

Dr. Anderson pointed out that Texas currently has the tenth highest TB death rate among the states and that one out of every 100 people screened in X-ray surveys here last year was found to have TB.

"As more cases are discovered in the early stage, and as methods of treatment continue to improve, a continued decrease in deaths is predicted," Dr. Anderson declared. He stated, however, that in spite of progress, "TB still kills more people than all other communicable diseases combined and is still the greatest disease killer in the age group from 15 to 34."

Dr. Anderson warned that the problem of medical and nursing care for the increasing number of patients in TB hospitals in Texas is acute. He noted a growing need for adequate rehabilitation, social and welfare services to TB patients.

"More people need to learn what they should do as individuals to protect themselves from TB and what they should do as voters to provide sufficient facilities to control tuberculosis in that State," he declared. Adding that the voluntary TB associations can help meet these needs by continuing and intensifying their education programs, Dr. Anderson urged all Texans to buy and use Christmas Seals this year. The annual Christmas Seal Sale now being conducted throughout the nation, he pointed out, will support the entire program of the TB associations.

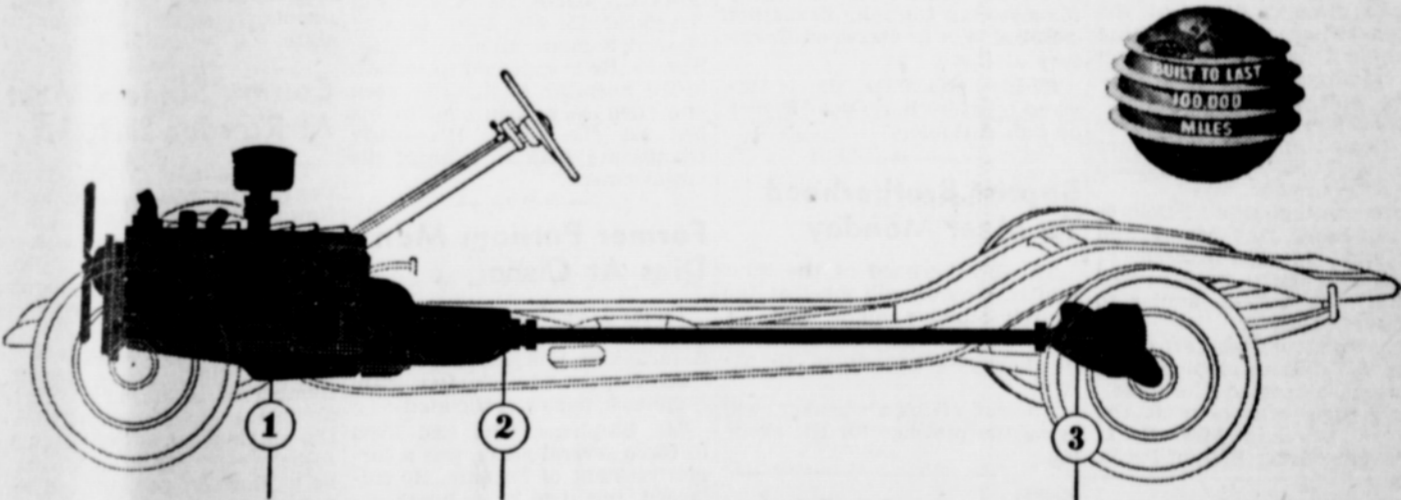

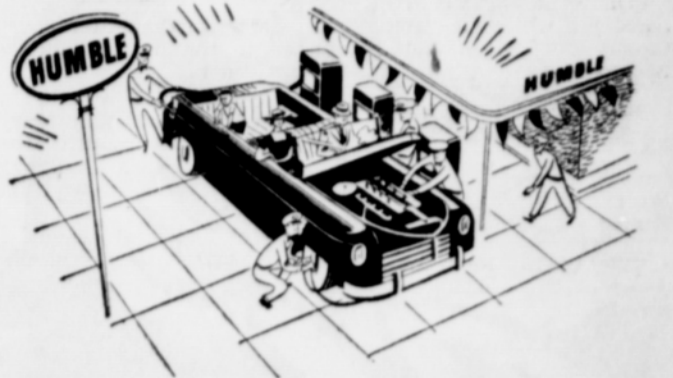

**"Antisocial Person"
Needs Help**

Between the states of behavior known as mental health and mental illness there are classifications which are a combination of both, in which a person on some phases of life is quite normal, quite healthy and on other features behaves poorly.

The psychopathic personality is not all mentally healthy nor all mentally unhealthy. In many phases of life the psychopath behaves quite normally, and even in the same situation he does not always behave the same way. He is usually more against people and situations than he is for them and the broadest definition of a psychopath is an antisocial person.

He's the kind of person who may know the rules of the game of life but refuses to apply them to himself. He is morally irresponsible, not because he doesn't know what morals are but because he fails to make them a part of his life. The extremes of psychopathic personalities usually include such people as the sexual perverts, the alcoholics, the dope addicts, the kleptomaniacs, those who constantly start fires, and the "lone wolf" criminal. There are less serious characteristics of psychopathy, too, such people as the oversensitive, the unpredictable, the cranks, the moody, the sourpusses, and the stuffed shirts. The person who refuses to assume independence, who enjoys the dependence of relief and charity, any one who forces himself into the life of others either by brute force or by complete dependence may fall into the broadest definition of psychopathic personality.

How does a person get to be psychopathic? It is possible that some people might be born without the capacity to learn right from wrong, though developing normally in other ways. It is possible that a rough part of town where everyone is out to get whatever he can by fair means or foul would breed children who assumed that same "survival of the fittest" philosophy. It is possible that home abuse or neglect in training would keep a child from ever seeing anything good to model his actions on. It is more prob-

able, however that a combination of all of these, heredity, environment and home training, with emphasis upon the home, plays a part in the development of an antisocial personality.

All children go through a phase when they must have their way, punishment or not. When an adult has no regard for anyone or anything besides his own desires, his own aims, he has failed to develop beyond a normal childhood state and would quite likely fall into the

category of psychopathic personality. Mental health is adjustment to oneself, one's fellowman, and one's role in life; the psychopath usually fails to adjust to his fellowman.

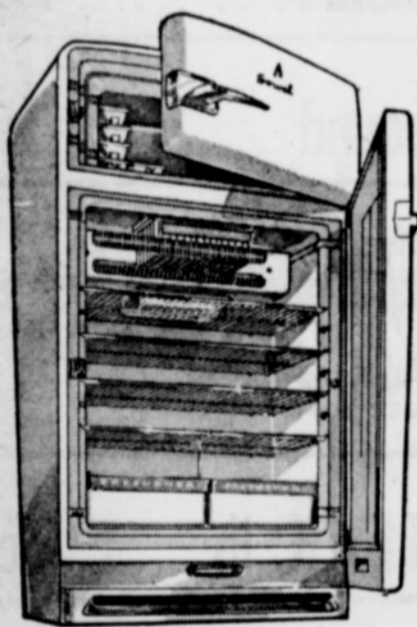

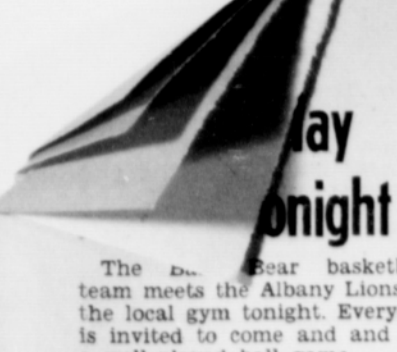

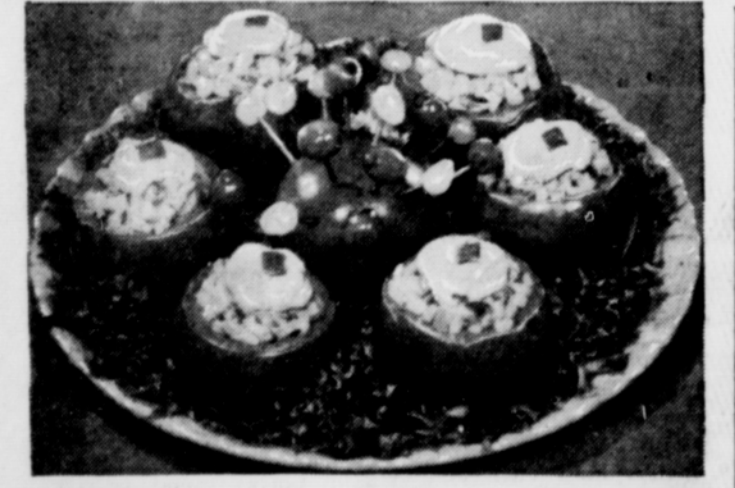
