Just after returning from a visit to eastern states and Washington, D. C., he rode his horse out in the pasture, Thursday morning of last week. When his horse returned without him, relatives went out to see what had happened and found him lying where he had dismounted and lain down to rest.

He had suffered a heart attack about three years ago.

Fire Department Reaches Limit in **Lowering Key Rate**

Mayor Robert Vaughan said the installation of such a 500 Gallon Per Minute pump is a future prospect, and would depend on water consumption, and would involve an expenditure of a possible six to eight thousand dollars.

Pumps now in operation will pump 300 and 250 GPM against a 150 head. To further lower the rate, regardless of what else may be done, will require a total of 1.000 GPM put into the mains against a 150 foot head.

The local fire department has done all they can do to lower the insurance rate further unless or until a larger pump can be installed to put more water pressure into the city's mains, according to J. C. Walace, fire chief.

The key rate, which now is 41% could be lowered to a possible 31 per cent, Mr. Wallace said, if this requirement could be met.



West Coke County Hospital District

SPECIAL ELECTION, SATURDAY, AUG. 17

- 1. To provide better hospital service and place the ownership and management exclusively under a Board of Directors residing in the west half of the county.
- 2. The present hospital building and grounds and all its equipment would be turned over to the new district debt free.
- 3. Persons voting in favor of the proposed District Hospital should favor enlarging the hospital to provide more beds and carry out needed improvements.
- 4. Every effort will be made to secure a second doctor to work in the hospital. Present facilities do not provide enough beds for the patients of more than one physician.
- 5. Local and state medical groups have advised that it would be an attractive opportunity for another doctor, and it is firmly believed that one would locate here.
- 6. Another provision of the law permitting the organizing of a West County Hospital District is that the Directors shall employ an administrator to manage and direct all operations of the hospital. He shall serve at the will of the Directors and receive such compensation as may be fixed by the Board of Directors.
- 7. They will be authorized to contract with any county or city located outside the district for the care and treatment of the sick, diseased or injured persons; and shall also have the authority to contract with agencies of the state and federal government for the treatment of patients.
- 8. The law states that the district shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants.
- 9. However, when a patient residing within the district has been admitted, the Administrator shall make inquiry as to his circumstances and those of relatives legally liable for his support. If he finds that such patient or said relatives are able to pay for his care and treatment, an order shall be made directing the patient or his relatives pay the Hospital District.
- 10. The Administrator shall have power and authority to collect such sums from the estate of a patient or his relatives legally liable for his support in the manner provided by law for the collection of expenses in the last illness of a deceased person.
- 11. The Board of Directors of the Hospital District is authorized on behalf of said District, to accept gifts, donations and endowments for such purposes as may be prescribed by the donor.

- 12. The Board of Directors shall prepare an annual budget based upon the fiscal year of the Hospital District, and hold a public hearing before the adoption of said budget.
- 13. If the West Coke County Hospital District is organized by a majority vote next Saturday, the District will have authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 25 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property within Precincts 1 and 3.
- 14. Since the taxable valuation of the proposed District is in excess of \$16,000,000, a levy of 10 cents or less would be required for operational expenses.
- 15. The matter of a hospital addition will not be submitted at this week's election. However, it is a key to the entire proposition.
- 16. A draft of a proposed new wing provides for 12 rooms, each with a toilet and bath, with beds for 24 patients. Estimated cost is \$120,000. A federal grant of one-half the cost could be obtained under the Hill-Burton Act if designation is made that a certain number of rooms are for the care of aged persons who require hospitalization.
- 17. Voters favoring the new Hospital District should keep in mind they will be expected to support a reasonable bond issue. It will come up after the Board of Directors make a careful study and determine how many additional beds may be needed, as well as any other improvements which may seem necessary.
- 18. With 85 per cent of the county taxes coming from oil properties, land and other property owned by individuals enjoy a very low tax assessment. The proposed West Coke County Hospital District, comprising all of Precincts 1 and 3, has oil valuations of more than \$13,000,000 of the \$16 million total. A tax levy of not to exceed 15 cents should be sufficient for operating and bond payments.
- 19. Residents of the east part of the county have a privately owned hospital at Bronte, and most of them are not interested in the welfare of a county-wide hospital.
- 20. With a nursing home to be built in the near future, there will be greater need for a second doctor. Before we can expect to secure another physician we must have hospital beds for his patients.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Con-stitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all pol-itical subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, dis-ability and death benefits for all ap-pointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jeffer-son County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, pro-clamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 62 of ArtIcle XVI of the Constitution of the
State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

'(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the in-come of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the politic-

"(2) Needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance. Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(3) Needy blind persons who are patched."
