## T Check Law In Eftect; Attorney

(Editor's note: The following ar ticle was written by County Attorney Frank C. Dickey as a mat
ter of public information in orde ter of public information in orde
to acquaint readers with a new check law which went into effect August 24.

By FRANK C. DICKEY Concerning Worthless Checks The Legislatures of the severa States have devoted much time and effort to the enactment of laws defining and prescribing punishment for the issuing and passing of worthless checks. Texas
has contributed her share of legishas contributed her share of legislative effort. A very short Bill of Rights (Art. 1 sec. 18 included in the Constitution of 1876: "No per-
son shall ever be imprisoned for debt" limits the scope of operadebt limits the scope of operation as to whether the giving and passing of a worthless check concult at its best.
In the beginning the criminal laws regulating fraudulent trans actions were relied upon as regulatory of the passing of worthless checks; and, the remedy provided
by the old fraud statutes is thought by the old fraud statutes is thought by some jurists to be superior to the prevailing remedy. Our rules of criminal procedure such as burden and degree of proof, character and sufficiency of evidence, pre-
sumption of innocence and many other safe-guards, which "we the people" have established, render prosecution for special offenses as worthless checking difficult and tedious.
Writing laws that would send a seventeen year old boy to the penitentiary for writing a third worthless check for the amount of twenty-five cents is a shocking example of commercial influence reflected in such a criminal law; yet, we have had for the past several years such a law in our

Whatever the inequities of the new law, it does put the offense of issuing a worthless check defin tely in the category of crimes
and, in doing so, it obviates the necessity of observing the laws relating
cution.
It has long been a matter of common knowledge that an officer is prohibited by law from accepting restitution for property stolen or wrongfully disposed of as satisfac-
tion for a penal offense. Such an tion for a penal offense. Such an
offense under the law requires the offense under the law requires the
removal of the officer from office removal of the officer from office
and subjects him to a heavy penalty. The fundamental principle of law involved being that the right to involved being that the right
to restitution is a civil right and the injured party's recourse is by civil action. The violation of a penal statute is an offense against he State and the injured party or enforcement
Under the new law, a party damaged by receiving a worthless check; as far as collecting is con-
cerned, must look to his civil remedy. Peace officers and prose medy. Peace officers and prose-
cutors are prohibited from engag ng in the process.
Prosecutors are required to take complaints for such offenses as constitute violations of the penal laws. All such worthless check offense complaints must be proessed in the courts having jurisdiction the same as other offenses like gravity
Article 380a Penal Code makes an offense for any Justice of Peace Officer to receive for Peace Officer to receive for collecion or undertake the collection of

The prohibition, under penalty, complainants and prosecuting
witness from influencing or witness from influencing or at of complaints or dismissal of pro secution is in keeping with the principle that the criminal laws must not be resorted to for the purpose of collecting a debt. (Art. 567b Sec. 6, P. C.)
Some of the precautions recom mended to keep down losses from accepting worthless checks as cash are:

1. Know the drawer of the check or obtain an endorsement by a 2. A check signed "John Doe by Richard Roe" will rarely ever support a prosecution.
2. A post-dated check or a pre dated check will not support prosecution.
3. A check given in payment of a debt will not support a prosecu-
tion. (The Statute provides a seeming exception in the case of a check given for the performance of labor or personal service; however the law has been held inoperative where the check was given in compliance with a promise to pay.)
4. The check must be presented to the drawee in due course. (An exception seems to lie where proof is made that the check would not have been honored had it been pre ented in due course.)
5. The full address of the draw7.
