S. R. Young, former publisher of the Robert Lee Observer, and since then real estate and rentals dealer in Robert Lee, died here Saturday morning at Coke Memorial Hospital one hour and fifteen minutes after suffering a stroke at his home, at 4:20 o'clock.

Mr. Young moved from Miles to Robert Lee, and for five years published the local newspaper. Mayor Robert Vaughan reported that a storage room has been partitioned off at the pump plant for bottles of chlorine used in water treatment.

Storing the chlorine in the same room with the motors and electric switches is considered dangerous, and this eliminates the hazard, Mr. Vaughan said.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL<br/>AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED<br/>ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE<br/>HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.<br/>SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION<br/>NO. 1 proposing an amendment to<br/>Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the<br/>Constitution of the State of Texas<br/>so as to repeal the provision making<br/>payment of the poil tax a require-<br/>ment for voting and so as to author-<br/>ize the Legislature to provide for<br/>the amendment, such iaw shall not"Section 4. In all elections by the<br/>people the vote shall be by secret bal-<br/>lot. The Legislature shall provide for<br/>the numbering of ballots and make<br/>such other regulations as may be<br/>necessary to detect and punish fraud<br/>and preserve the purity of elections,<br/>and may provide by law for the reg-<br/>istration of all voters. Should the<br/>Legislature enact a registration law<br/>in anticipation of the adoption of<br/>this Amendment, such iaw shall not ize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disquali-fications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an elec-tion a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legis-lature may authorize absentee vot-ing. This Amendment shall take ef-fort on December 1, 1963. on December 1. 1963.

Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipa-

tory character." Section 2. The foregoing Consti-tutional Amendment shall be sub-mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provi-sion making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legisla-ture to provide for the registra-tion of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the nec-essary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be pub-lished in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.



We have not qualified or rather re-qualified for certification as a modified-certified brucellosis - free county. We still lack a few herds. I do not have the exact count, but a close estimate is that we need (minimum) five or ten more of the herds that were free on the

first go round three years ago and 15 of the suspect and reactor herds. We hope we can get these before this fall.

The regulations in the law state that for recertification we must submit 20 per cent of the herds from the previous test that were brucellosis free and all of the suspect and reactor herds. So far Mr. Gruehen has tested about 95 per cent of the required free herds and about 50 per cent of the suspect and reactor herds.

Several Coke County 4-H Club members completed and submitted records on their projects or demonstrations this year. Several of these entered in the district awards program judging.

We had two boys to place among the top three in the division and program in which they were entered. John Service, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Service Jr., Robert Lee, placed third in the Junior Achievement awards program. 

4. A check given in payment of a debt will not support a prosecution. 5. The check must be presented to the drawee in due course. (An exception seems to lie where proof is made that the check would not have been honored had it been presented in due course.)

6. The full address of the drawer should be written on the check. 7. When a check is returned on account of insufficient funds, a written notice should be sent to the drawer by registered mail to "the address written on the check" advising him that the check has been returned for lack of funds. The check should be immediatly sent back to the drawee.


8. A study of the Worthless Check Law keeping in mind that public officers have been completely taken out of the field of collections, should be of benefit.

9. After complying with suggestion "7", if one wishes to prosecute, let him appear before the County or District Attorney in the County in which the check is given and make complaint. 10. If the offense complained of constitutes a misdemeanor, the County Attorney may institute prosecution on complaint and information; or, he may refer the matter to the Grand Jury. 11. If an offense is of the grade of a felony, the complaint may be made before a Justice of the Peace and referred to the Grand Jury. Felonies can only be prosecuted on an indictment and the prosecution must be conducted by the District Attorney. Sec. "6" of the Penal Statute should be very carefully observed by complainants, peace officers and prosecutors.
