### A NEW LOOK AT OLD QUESTIONS

# Questions of Our Time Must Be Answered Unless W

It did not begin in Dallas or in New York, or any American city, north or south.

It came out of the past hundred years.

Neither were those problems that so perplex us in the world today the product of any American president. John F. Kennedy was the victim, not the cause of this thing that has come into American life.

With the issues that were handed him, he did his best, and that is all we can ask of any man. The measures he proposed with which we would not agree were pressed upon him by forces that were here before he was born, and worked into a great segment of American thinking.

Be it said to his memory that he would not indulge in harsh and bitter comment such as has come from some of those who think they do him service by it.

Lee Oswald went to the wrong answer book.

Where, when, and how did a young American in his teens get a copy of Das Kapital in his hands? Did he just walk in one day and pick it up in a book store? That is not the way most Americans have got hold of it.

It is being distributed systematically in the United States, and those who are distributing it are communists. It is their bible, their book of reference.

It is where they start. They end up in a method of carrying out its teaching far, far from what they expected at the start.

We can measure it more by end results than by its actual content.

Elizabeth Bentley, the story of whose death has just been in the daily newspapers, found all this out to her sorrow. She was evidently a wholesome New England girl, who in a time when she saw a lot of hardship around here was attracted by the bait offered by the open Communist party.

The closed, underground party she did not know at that time.

But later she was ordered into it and learned what all this attractive above ground talk had for its real objective. If you will read her forthright book, "Out of Bondage" you can have no trouble then understanding how a troubled American boy could be turned into one who would carry out secret orders to attempt murdering General Walker, then murder the president as Oswald very evidently did, and how it fits into their long range plans, regardless of the kind of talk going out to the public at the time.

(If you want to read this book, we will undertake to get one for you if you fail to find it at your book store.—USB)

The philosophy that became the weapon for the intellectual capture of America was forged in Germany in the days of Bismark and Frederick the great, developed under Kaiser Wilhelm, adapted by Hitler, and with some variation is the political-economic-religious philosophy of the Communist world.

It began with a pseudo-intellectual assault on historic Christianity. The architects of this philosophy were developing it to fit the Eastern idea of dictatorial rule and of conquest. Bismark put up with it because it served his purpose—to get all the Christian objections out of the way for him to build the forces of the Prussian emperor into world-wide conquest.

This philosophy did not begin as atheism. It merely pushed aside the norms of Christian truth and all other accepted truth if it suited the purposes of those who used it to accomplish their goal.

Truth was what came down to you from your superiors. It shifted with the needs of their policies, and it still does.

The idea of jurisprudence that went with it was not American, but Prussian and Mongolian, somewhat blended. It has no real sympathy with legislative process, none whatever with written constitutions that guaranteed them, except as window dressing.

Its economics tended to the feudal, which they pro-

fessed to oppose—the sovereign owning the land. Use of it was apportioned and directed by the state. Communist forms developed out of that, not out of any new freedom or real distribution of wealth.

Dissatisfied, some unhappy youth have been baited, bewildered, blindfolded, led into this labyrinth.

One of them killed the president.

Those who have gone through college during the past 25 years have encountered teachers who challenged everything connected with literature, religion, economics, or government with sharp questions that most students could not answer.

Then they would leave the matter dangling, and the student confused and bewildered on those points for years.

The constitution, representative government, great men of our past were brought into question.

This method of inquisition, not instruction, was developed in totalitarian Germany to unseat ideas contrary to their purposes and the American constitutional government was certainly contrary to their purposes.

In the great expansion of our universities in the early twenties, men with PhD degrees in the United States were in short supply. So university professors went to Germany in large numbers for their higher degrees. Not all the teachers of Germany had adopted this method, but enough had done so to transplant the thing to the United States.

Higher education for a generation became all questions, few answers, so far as American ideas and beliefs were concerned.

Totalitarian Germany had seen they could not defeat us militarily. Their only chance, they thought, was to weaken among Americans their devotion to free government, which was directly in the way of Bismark's plans for Germany and the world. If they could not do that, then American self government would spread over the world, even over Germany.

They did not succeed at it then, nor do we believe the international communist movement which came along to adopt the same method and capture it—we do not believe they will succeed at it now. And self government HAS taken hold in Western Germany.

But they have made our job infinitely more difficult than it would have been without the inroads of their earlier philosophy.

American education has been veering away from it in the past ten years, but not before many of my generation, and later were cast away at sea in an open boat intellectually, and left to hitch help from whatever ship might pass that way.

The architects of this thing were careful to see that the Marxist ship passed that way.

The whole thing is far too big a subject to cover in all its phases. This writer saw its chilling effects on the faith of many young people, some of whom were close to him. He has seen a generation of young people leave the youth work of several churches that were once vital with the faith of youth.

The effects have been wide and deep. We cannot pull all the tares without uprooting much wheat. The effort was to pull the rug out from under American faith in the institutional freedoms that have been made secure only as they found expression in self government, underscored by a written constitution.

The love of freedom, however, has come on through the intellectual labyrinth into which first totalitarian Germany, then totalitarian Marxism have led our American thinking.

Here is a slogan that has appealed both to the uneducated and educated: From each according to his ability, to each according to his need.

# ss We Want Youth To Use The Wrong Answer Book

It sounds good, doesn't it? How nice the world would be if that could be put into effect!!

But look at it again. Who is going to determine whose ability? I have seen two generations of youth come through school. I have seen young men of great abilty, potentially, whose ability didn't turn many wheels. What manner of influence, what kind of society is to bring forth that latent ability and put it to production?

The Marxist society advances that slogan, and uses it as bait. But our own form of society brings forth fully as much, and in some fields far more abilities into production, and we attained our society without assassinations, or seizing the lands, properties, and businesses of our citizens, either by condemnation, taxation, revolution, or Nazi type controls.

Then who is to determine what the needs of each are? The Marxist theory is, of course, that the state is to do that. But I have a whale of a lot of needs if someone else will supply them.

It, if made a rigid rule of economics and government, would call for a commissar to decide what is the ability of each man, and then devise means of getting it out of him.

In the light of that, why is it that in Russia now by far the big part of the food they eat is produced on little garden plots which they are allowed to own, whereas the big collective farms have failed!

It means simply this—a free, open society brings forth more ability from the able, and supplies more universally the needs of its people than the society the communists have evolved to put their slogan into effect.

It may seem foolish and idle to some for a newspaper editor to be giving the arguments on this question, but I happen to know that to many students in the most subtle manner the other side of the question has been often presented over the past thirty years, and is still being presented in a subtle manner.

Oswald never went to college. But he went to the wrong answer book.

In and out of college, we must see to it that our youth finds a better answer.

In the race question, as in many others the method has been to raise the questions, then look to authoritarian government for the answers. But, as Life Magazine points out in a recent article, the real solution is being found and will be found by people, both white and black doing what many southern people have done for many years, working patiently at a work of righteousness and improvement in the communities where the Negroes live.

More can be done, to be sure. Negro initiative once "militancy" is rejected can do wonders.

The hope of the colored race is not in some central power taking the white man by the scruff of the neck and sitting him down at the same table.

A more sober view now being expressed is that his hope is not in necessarily sitting beside a white student, but in getting the training he needs in some school, regardless of whether it is all black, mostly white, or balanced—it is in getting the education he needs and taking a good advantage of the educational opportunities afforded him.

The best people of the South have long realized that only the Negro can lead his own race, and that the best leadership must be developed and can best be developed with colored people teaching their own.

Standards of those schools have been improved. They can be improved still more. This is not a program of prejudice, but of common sense.

## From Walter Knott

Many of our readers have heard of or visited the famous Knott's Berry Farm and Ghost Town near Buena Park, California, but may not have known that Walter Knott, who with Mrs. Knott, established it, is a leader in Orange County and Southern California and is making his influence felt in the Southwest and on the West Coast.

From time to time the Observer editor has had correspondence with Mr. Knott, and the following, somewhat abridged, is one of his letters.
