





"THIS IS WAR"

Today America is at war. America has been at war-paradoxically-since the end of World War II, in 1945. For the most part it has not been a shooting war, but it is fraught with as many perils. In a very real sense we are testing whether this nation can long endure. Thus far, we have been failing the test. We are losing the cold war.

Responsible statesmen and scientists have been saying so for years. But the American people find it hard to believe that America is falling behind, and they find it still harder to act in reversing the tide while there is still time.

Speaking in Chicago, Admiral Arleigh A. Burke, former chief of

But Communism had no force at all less than fifty years ago. It had only an ideal to work with and human need to work on.

Lenin wrote, "As long as capitalism and socialism exist, we cannot live in peace: In the end, one or the other will triumph-a funeral dirge will be sung either over the Soviet Republic or over world capitalism."

"Fortunately, millions of our fellow citizens sense the urgency of our times-and the importance of the actions of such times require. But there remain many others in private life in our 'affluent society' who are so self-satisfied, so comfortable, so content that they cannot be bothered with the realities and the dangers which surround them. To such people, the conflict, the challenge, the urgent need for action are meant for somebody else.

"If this seems critical, let me assure you that it was meant to be. Just existing in a free society is no great achievement. Nations do not become great nor remain great just because of freedom.

Recently I read about a nation which was described as a pleasant place for business enterprise, a place where young men were taught to get on, where extravagance kept pace with shrewd finance. Its citizens were self-satisfied, placid, self-confident, money-getting, pleasure-loving, honoring success and hugging their financial security. That nation was Carthage just before its fall."

About thirty years ago, Americans failed to read Mein Kampf; they failed to take seriously "the intellectual engineers of Nazi strategy for world domination." And many of these same Americans paid dearly for their ignorance. The rest were spared for an even greater danger.

We find the 1960's very similar to the 1930's. We have "peace." We have business "as usual." And we have another group of totalitarian dictators who have written countless books foretelling our "burial." Again, we have not done our homework-we have not read many of the books.

Communism has made tremendous growth in the past ten years and today its missionaries are active on many campuses in Latin America. Millions are tuned in to the dialectics of Marx and the psychological warfare of Khrushchev. Today's danger to free men is as great as the danger of 1939. Some will insist that it is greater now because Red techniques are more subtle and insidious than those of the Nazis because the Reds dominate more of the world and its resources and because they appeal to the urgent need of the world's peoples for full stomachs.

It may be noted that an English historian, C. Northcote Parkinson, has said: "We learn from history that various forms of rule have

That was long ago when the Soviet Union was just a bad dream in an isolated corner of the earth. But today, with Communism a fierce reality, Khrushchev can bellow and believe that it will bury us. Others believe it, too. The late William Z. Foster, former chairman of the Communist Party, U. S. A., had the confidence to dedicate a book thus: "To my great-grandson, Joseph Manley Kolko, who will live in a Communist United States."

Suppose Communism does win? According to Foster, here is what would happen just in the area of education:

"The schools, colleges and universities will be coordinated and grouped under the National Department of Education and its state and local branches.

"The studies will be revolutionized, being cleansed of religious, patriotic and other features of the bourgeois ideology.

"The students will be taught on the basis of Marxian dialectical materialism, internationalism and general ethics of the new Socialist society . . . "

In 1945, these would have been considered idle boasts. A victorious America was the greatest power the world had ever known.

We know now that the cold war began with the Kremlin before the hot one ended. The Russians lost little time in setting up puppet Red regimes in Poland and Romania. Then, peacefully, the Communists installed their own regime in Hungary. Not so peacefully they inched into Greece and Turkey. In alarm, the Truman Doctrine was proclaimed and Congress voted \$400 million for "support of free peoples who are resisting attempted subjugation by armed minorities or by outside pressures."

Then the Marshall Plan was authorized to get the war-torn nations on their feet economically. The first three and one-half years, Americans paid out \$12 billion in an effort to stop creeping Communism. In 1948, freedom-loving Czechoslovakia fell into Red hands. We know the story of how cleverly the Communists have worked. And in nations so far friendly to the United States-Turkey, South Korea, Iran -there is serious unrest, an invitation to Communism.

America is at war, at war with the forces of international Communism. The outcome of this struggle will determine whether the world regresses into totalitarian terror and darkness or progresses toward a world in which all men are free to live their lives as they chocse. America is at war because she is the embodiment of all that freedom and free men stand for and she is the natural target of those who intend to enslave the world. We are at war because an enemy has chosen to attack us-has stated clearly that Communism and capitalism cannot exist side by side in the same world and that Communism intends to rule the world.


Jan. 30, 1964 Farm Bureau Here **Gets Note From** The John Connallys


