In the Republican Primary in New Hampshire, Henry Cabot Lodge, Republican candidate for vice president in the last election, led with a write-in vote, with Senator Barry Goldwater second and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York third.

New Hampshire Republicans were expressing their preference for President and at the same time electing delegates to the Republican National Convention.

Our comment: Rockefeller was the worst hurt. Probably too many people think as this writer does — the Rockefellers have enough money and business and power already.

Neither Lodge nor Nixon have the glimmer of a shadow of a chance to beat Lyndon Johnson. Goldwater is the only Republican who offers more than a "Me, too." He has a long way to go before getting enough Republicans with him to get the nomination.

But he's still a front runner, and if nominated, could make a strong race.

do want them to have the opportunity to build what they want to build. We have merely used the best judgement we knew how.

Several things should be taken into consideration.

1. There will be a lot of expenses connected with renovating and improving the old hospital. An offhand estimate would be around one fourth of the total expense would be involved in bringing it up to modern needs, both as to building and furnishings.

2. While the election, if it carries, will authorize the issue of \$110,000 in bonds, we are not necessarily obligated to issue and use that much.

It could be under one hundred thousand. It is almost impossible to estimate the cost of the repairs, renovation etc. of the old building.

It will take quite a while to get this project under way, and we cannot know for sure what the obvious needs will be at that time. For example, if a project to build a dam should be definitely located here, that would call for construction larger than what would be contemplated without it.

Any job you start is apt to require more than at first figured. The \$110,000 would give us the leeway we might need in providing for your hospital needs here.

This, or any board, would be faced with providing for ten to fifty years in the future, which would have to be considered. Such a thing as this provided for future, opens the way for more types of medical skill to meet a variety of needs, if we are to give the people of the town and area maximum medical facilities here at home, to make room for as many doctors and patients as may need these facilities.

Under the Hill-Burton Grant, which provides for matching each dollar paid through this bond issue with another Federal dollar, a certain portion of the hospital must be always available to nursing home cases, Type III. This does not in any way conflict with the Type I — Type II nursing home project which has been discussed and could yet be built on the property owned by the community east of the hospital.

Type III cases are those who have to have hospital care. This provides for them.

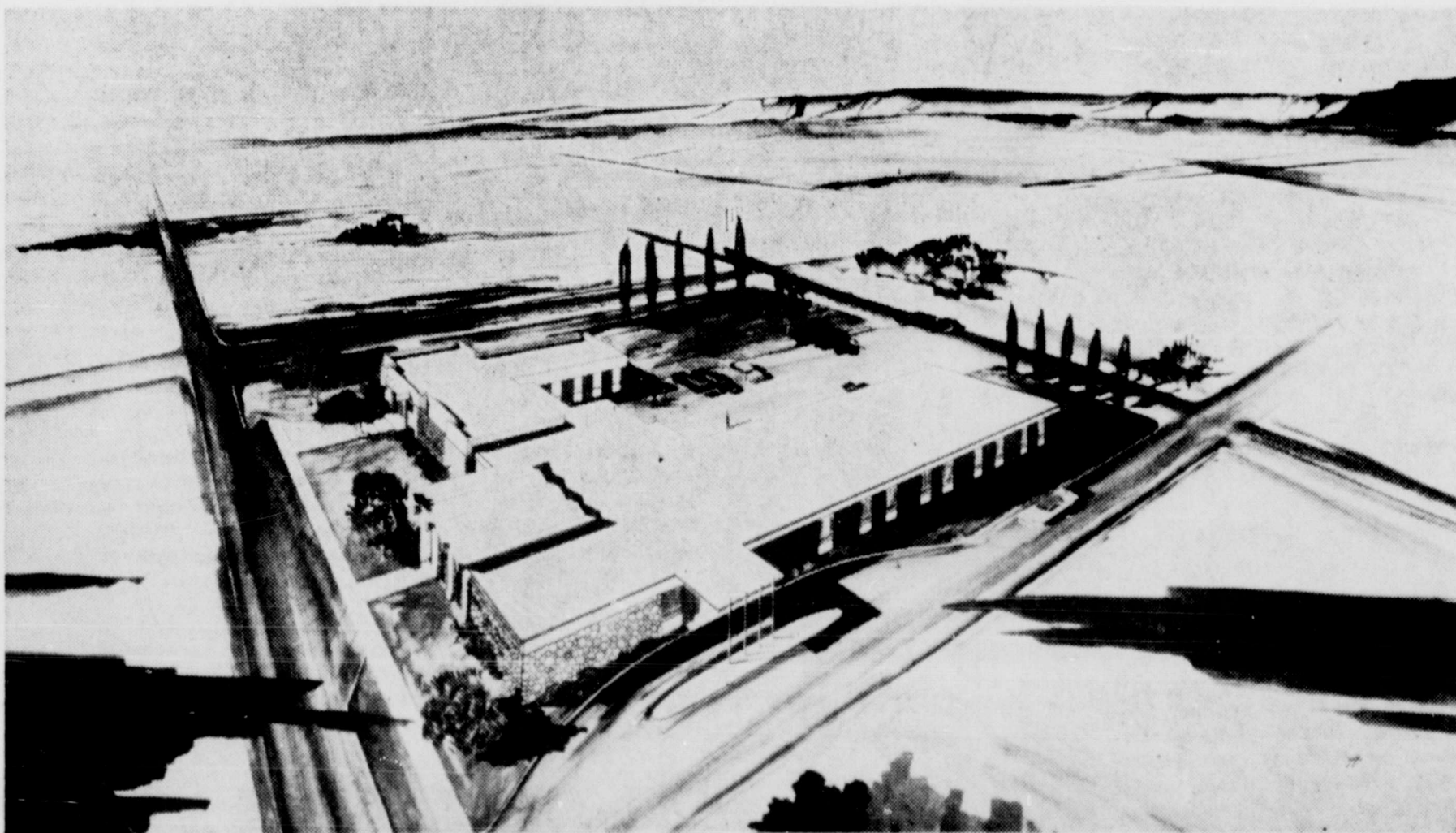
They will receive identically the same care as other patients in the hospital, but state and Federal funds will help pay their expenses.

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Slow Transportation Caused Demand For Government Near Home, So The Early Settlers Petitioned for County

(Mrs. Yarbrough, formerly a teacher here, wrote a history of Coke County as her thesis for a Masters Degree, and has continued her interest in Coke County and local history.)

Coke County was created 75 years ago out of Tom Green County by an Act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, approved March 13, 1889.

Had the development of transportation and communication been a little more prompt, Coke County probably never would have existed as a political entity; moreover, Texas probably would have had many fewer counties than her present number—254.

The area that is Coke County was originally a part of the Department of Bexar, eventually called Bexar County. At that time Bexar comprised a very large part of the Republic of Texas, in fact about one-half of it.

The seat of government of Bexar was San Antonio, more than 200 miles from this area. Because of the great distances the people in the far reaches of Bexar found themselves with a legal center but almost totally lacking in many of the benefits to be derived from such a center. People became tired of having to go to San Antonio to have a deed re-

corded or to attend court. They began to talk of the benefits of a county government closer home. The lack of transportation made a closer government a practical necessity.

Out of that need came the movement that resulted in the creation and organization of Tom Green County, which was authorized by the Texas Legislature on March 13, 1874. The area that is now Coke was a part of Tom Green.

For 15 years the Coke area remained a part of Tom Green, and then the old story was re-enacted. People began to talk of the benefits of a county government closer to home. A trip to San Angelo for business or to attend court required from three to five days. People complained that the people in the vicinity of San Angelo "ran everything." Tax money should be "spent closer home," et cetera.

Early in 1889, a meeting was arranged for the purpose of making definite plans to get the county created. About sixty men met in a grove of china trees on the Colorado River, had a barbecue, and planned the strategy. No women were present. (Of course women could not vote then.)

Ennis Adams rode horseback over the country, carrying the petition which was presented to the Legislature asking for the formation of the county. All legal requirements were met, and the county was duly created.

Section one of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, approved March 13, 1889, reads:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That a new county, to be called Coke County, is hereby created out of Tom Green County, to-wit:

The Act was in six sections. It defined the boundaries and required the calling of an election of county officers within thirty days after the Act should be approved. A committee was named in the Act to supervise the calling of the election. This committee was, D. T. Fairley, Z. W. Withers, and T. A. Collier. The new county was required to pay its pro-rata share of Tom Green's outstanding indebtedness.

RL Students Take Scholarship Test

Rita Tillman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Tillman, Linda McBroom, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell McBroom, and Dennis Gartman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Gartman, took the 1964 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

The test was administered at the school at 9 a.m., Tuesday March 10. The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development. It is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

The test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

The average scholarship salary awarded to freshman Merit Scholars in 1963 was \$796 annually, or \$3184 for the four years of college.

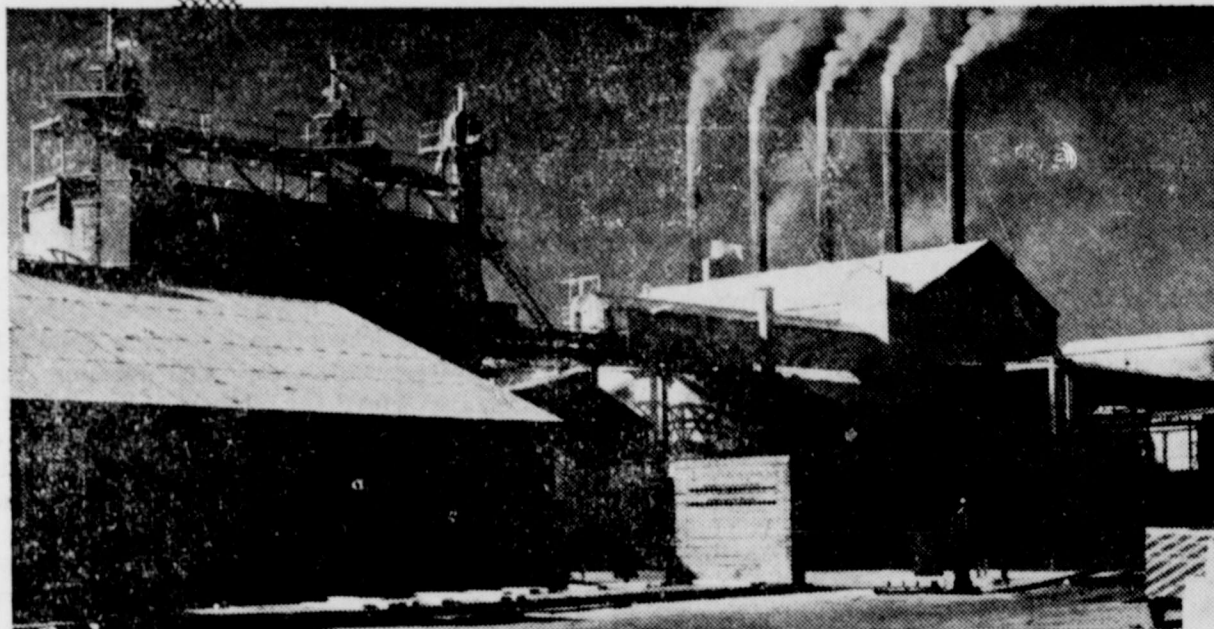

The President introduced an order for hospital bond election which was read in full. Mr. McCabe moved its adoption and Mr. Ivey seconded the motion. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Messrs. Wojtek, Quisenberry, Ivey, McCabe, and McAdams

NOES: None

THE ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Article IX, Section 9, of the Constitution of Texas, and Chapter 315, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963, the West Coke County Hospital District, with boundaries coextensive with those of Commissioners' Precincts 1 and 3 of Coke County, Texas, has heretofore been created and established and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the aforesaid law, this Board of Directors is empowered to order an election to determine whether bonds of the said District shall be issued for hospital purposes, now, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF WEST COKE COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, Coke County, Texas:

SECTION 1: That an election be held throughout the West Coke County Hospital District on the 4th day of April, 1964, said date being not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the residents qualified electors of said Hospital District, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the Board of Directors of West Coke County Hospital District, Coke County, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED

TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS

(\$110,000) in bonds of said Hospital District for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospitals and hospital system, as determined by the Board, and for any or all such purposes; and bonds to mature over a period of years not to exceed FIFTEEN (15) years from their date of issuance, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, within the taxing limits heretofore authorized at an election held on the 17th day of August, 1963?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Article IX, Section 9, of the Constitution of Texas, and Chapter 315, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the Hospital District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

SECTION 3: The polling places

where the election shall be held and the presiding officers at each of the said polling places are as follows:

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the Office of the County Clerk, Courthouse, Robert Lee, Texas, and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963, absentee ballots may be cast between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M. on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, Sunday, or an official State holiday.

SECTION 4: The election shall be held in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, and, except as therein provided, shall be conducted in accordance with the General Laws of Texas pertaining to elections.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

SECTION 6: Notice of the election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of the election order in each election precinct and at the courthouse door and by publishing a substantial copy of this order in a newspaper of general circulation in the District on the same day in each of two successive weeks prior to the date of the election, the date of the first publication being at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for the election.

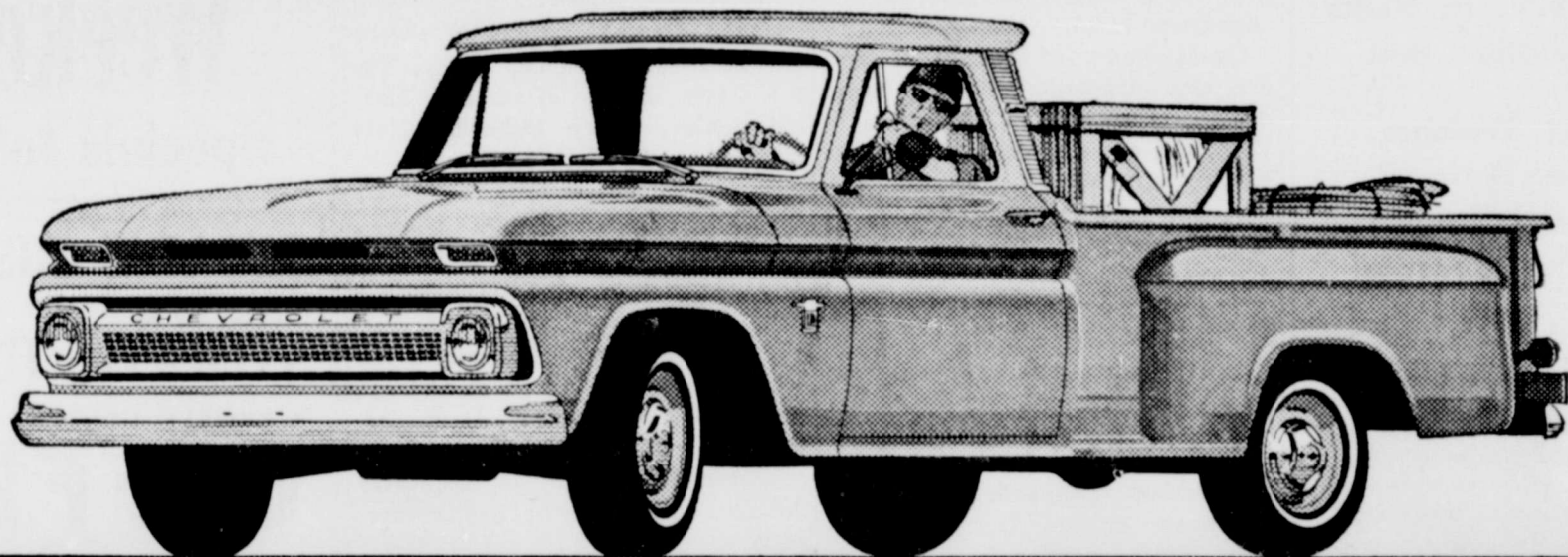

COUNTRYSIDE

It's nice to have some moisture in the ground for a change. The ground is not saturated, but certainly the outlook is much better than it was a couple of months ago.

A few warm days should change the panorama from the wintery look to that of spring. The pastures and grain fields have already made some change in appearance.

One wonders what most of the operators will do with their grain fields. Naturally, the individual needs have to be considered. I have talked to several men and most have indicated they would shoot for a grain crop rather than turn in on their field. Two men indicated they may graze down their small grains than try for a grain crop.

Regardless of their decision, more moisture will be needed. Maybe this will be the year. The oldtimers tell me we can count on a grain crop one in every five

years. It has been several years since we made a crop of small grains.

The County field crops committee is searching for new crops new ideas, that may add to the county economy. One idea they will pursue is to plant early maturing cotton varieties in years when we have stored moisture going into the planting season. We hope to get out some trial plots this year using paymaster 101 "A" and blightmaster varieties.

Also, we will try some soybean plots if seed can be secured. This crop may have potential in some operations in our area.

Fertilization, if we have the moisture, will receive more emphasis than ever this year. Mr. Pyburn, working with FHA borrowers, will be cooperating in the fertilizer tests.

Another idea Mr. Pyburn has presented and looks promising is the development of fruit and berries in the sandy land parts of our county. We will have market, we believe, if we can develop the produce to supply the market.

Several of the new sorghum-sudan hybrid hay, grazing, or silage crops will be tried this year. Two companies have sent us samples to try along with some sorghums. In all, we have received 10 varieties so far.

We will let you know later where the plots are located. If you would like to check them, I am sure the operators would welcome you.

The weekly screwworm report showed 12 weeks with no screwworms. Since the report was mailed I understand a case has been found in South Texas. The record so far is a good one, but we want it to remain a good one.

If you should need a sample bottle to mail in a worm case give us a ring. We still have a supply on hand.

Grasshopper infestations of western and mid-western ranges were more widespread in 1963 than 1962, and are expected to increase further in 1964. In a 16-state survey, infestations large enough to be of economic importance were discovered.

President Johnson has laid himself open to the kind of campaign Goldwater could wage.

Within a few weeks after he became President, Mr. Johnson addressed a top flight council of American business men, and a friend of the President had his comments inserted in the Congressional Record.

Johnson urged the business men to support the Civil Rights Bill, and at the same time pointed out to them that in hirings since the program headed by Johnson as Vice President, got under way one fourth of the people hired by these major companies had been Negroes.

What the President did NOT say was that less than half of one-fourth of the population is Negro. So in the hirings, the percentage of Negroes was twice as high as their percentage of the population, which shows a decided discrimination AGAINST WHITES.

Also the hirings in the Federal government under the Johnson program has brought the number of Negro Federal employees in the United States government considerably higher than the percentage of the population—still a discrimination AGAINST WHITES.

Yet Johnson has brought all sorts of pressure on Congress to pass a law to prevent discrimination AGAINST NEGROES. Can you figure that out?

EDITORIAL: YOU CAN'T GET TAXES OUT OF POLITICS

We repeat here what we have said before. We have never thought a tax-supported institution is the best way to build or operate a hospital.

At best it is second choice, or last chance. As long as you levy a tax to support anything and conduct it with publicly elected officials, paid or unpaid, county, precinct, or district you will have politics and controversy.

That did not stop when you voted it out of the county and into a district. Financial problems did not stop, either.

This writer made his position plain. But it was a one-man position. You cannot operate a hospital or build it in the first place with voluntary capital, IF CAPITAL DOES NOT VOLUNTEER.

Neither have we nor can we build a nursing home with private enterprise, if nobody with the money or the credit will enterprise.

The problems the people now have are of their own choosing. Private individuals who could do so did not give me any encouragement, and one man cannot raise this kind of money single-handed. Both the local leadership and majority chose this method. Whether the hospital got out of the frying pan into the fire by forming the district remains to be seen.

When private capital will not meet a need, government is brought in, simply because the voters bring it in. Our position is that we must do the best we can with what we have.

Your Editor will speak out what he believes. But he will live in peace and friendship with your decision.

A fresh group of high school and college graduates will seek jobs this spring. For many, it will be their first try at finding a job.

A good education, an alert mind, and a fresh initiative will be attributes many of them will have, yet some will have difficulty in landing a job.

That all-important first impression can be spoiled by a rumpled dress, baggy trousers, or the wrong attire. A personnel man interviewing a sloppy, unkempt job applicant is put on his guard.

The importance of good clothing appearance will be emphasized during Good Grooming week, which has been scheduled for April 19-25, under the sponsorship of the National Institute of Dry Cleaning.

It is emphasized that the proper attire for a woman job applicant is a nicely tailored suit or dress. Hat and gloves go with the tailored look, and one should not overdress with jewelry, color or style.

A clean, well groomed suit is best for men — and "absolutely no loafers."

Good grooming has a side effect that is most important. It gives a person a sense of confidence, and this helps greatly in making a favorable impression in a job interview.

Even though you're 60 or 70, or more, don't "retire" from good eating habits. All of your life you need foods that will give you protein, minerals, and vitamins, and foods for energy and warmth.

Unless you have a special health problem you should continue to include in your daily diet (1) milk products, (2) meat, poultry, fish, eggs, or dry beans and peas as an occasional alternates, (3) bread

and other cereal products, and (4) fruits and vegetables...and some fats and sweets.

If you cook for two, or just for yourself, the "large economy size" is no bargain. Part of it will grow stale or spoil before it can be used, and leftovers can be dull. don't just "warm them up" — When you do have leftovers, make a new and interesting dish by combining them with each other or with freshly prepared foods.

You can prepare a nourishing meal even on a one-burner hot plate — for example, a one-dish meal that includes meat and vegetables. Or cook one food in the bottom of a double boiler while another warms in the top. Food cooked in a heavy, covered pot will stay warm while you use the burner to cook another.

In any case, make mealtimes pleasant. If you don't want to set the table, fix an attractive tray and take it to the television or that window with a view.
