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

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

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

the Struggle As It Really Is

The blood spilled by Americans on Korean and North Vietnam battlefields should be a constant reminder to patriotic Americans that the present conflict between communism and freedom is much more than just a cold war.

In the long run it matters little what the cold war is called. What is important is that freedom-loving Americans recognize that our nation is engaged in a great global conflict which threatens the freedom of all men.

In 1917, Russia was a weak, backward nation. In the short span since then, Russia has emerged as the second most powerful nation in the world. It has made such inroads that communism now controls more than one third of the world's population. We must realize that the one purpose of Khrushchev, Castro and Mao Tse-tung is to conquer the world. Victory for freedom depends on how strongly we accept or reject this horrifying fact of our time.

A quick glance at the communist achievements thus far shows:

Between 1917 and 1945, communism was basically limited to the territorial boundaries of Russia. Although the basic views and beliefs of the communists philosophy were well known, we were not too concerned. But within those borders, the greatest menace of all time was working and building and preparing itself for the right

During the two years after World War II, Russia managed to widen its influence and control over an additional 80 million people

When Winston Churchill named the walls of communism, "The Iron Curtain," the free Western World became more aware of the new threat confronting freedom. But we were still not hearing the order to attack that the dedicated communists heard back in 1917.

* In 1949, after we failed to support the Chinese Nationalist Army of Chiang Kai-shek, the communists overthrew the government, and the communist empire stretched from the Elbe River in Eastern Europe across Asia to the China Sea. With one great sweep, communism added 600 million individuals to its roster of slavery.

* Since the Hungarian uprising a little more than seven years ago, the historical developments have been most depressing. Only five years ago the world struggle was deep in Eastern Europe. Africa was Western-oriented from the Mediterranean to the Cape of Good Hope, and the Caribbean was a sanctuary of Western dominance. In South America, the communists had few if any supporters.

In the past five years, Cuba has become a Soviet satellite, and possesses the largest army in the history of Latin America.

Soviet submarines and "fishing" trawlers prowl the Caribbean, exporting agents and saboteurs to every nation in Latin America. The Soviets have a base in British Guiana, while Brazil, the largest nation in South America, is in the hands of anti-freedom sympathizers.

* In the Far East, the march down Southeast Asia continues. * In Africa, the story is much the same. With Algeria on the

North, Ghana on the West, and now Somalia on the east turning procommunist, it appears that communism is preparing an all-out effort in taking Africa.

Ever since Lenin's bloody revolution in 1917, the order to attack has been carried out by communist agents and saboteurs with rewarding obedience. In the world struggle, it has been the communists who have been waging war while we have been waving the olive branch. While we have continued to talk in terms of settlements, treaties, and the necessity of more negotiations, the communists have been claiming victories. Through a massive foreign aid program, it was believed that peace could be bought with American dollars. It is quite obvious that foreign aid fails to win respect and to further the cause of freedom.

Ths world struggle is not being waged solely in terms of subversion and imperialism; it is also a technological war. This war includes the so-called "race to the moon" and the struggle in the rapid development of the intercontinental ballistic missile. It should be remembered that the struggle for technological superiority between East and West is as much a part of the cold war as anything

For instance, a few months ago the leaders of our nation signed the test-ban treaty with Russia despite the warnings of history and some of our most noted scientists.

One scientist in particular argued that this nation's security could not be guaranteed if our leaders signed the document. He argued that with our nation unable to test nuclear weapons in the atmosphere, it would be extremely doubtful if our scientists would be able to develop an anti-missile missile. He suggested that Russia, during its last series of atomic tests in the atmosphere, had quite possibly obtained the necessary information to develop this significant weapon. If this were true, then the Soviets would have scored a great victory in advocating the signing of the nuclear Test-Ban Treaty. Just recently, it was learned that during a special parade in Moscow, the communists had displayed what was believed to be antimissile missiles.

The enemy with which we find ourselves confronted is not just another nation; it is a fanatic ideology which is determined to destroy freedom. This is a struggle for the mnds of men and a battle between government control and personal enterprise; between religion and atheism.

To the communist, there is no value in human life. In his mind, the concept that man was created in the image of God is absurd. Communism teaches that man is just an animal. As far as individualism is concerned, personal ambitions and goals are to be sacrificed for the well-being of the state.

In the world struggle we are not fighting a disorganized group of harmless eccentrics; the enemy is a fanatic, sworn to destroy us. This is NOT A COLD WAR and should not be known as such.


