UCRA - Municipal District May Get in Huddle on Project

Further checking of dam sites by engineers employed by Upper Colorado River Authority will start down river and come up through Coke County.

Gerald Allen, Chairman of the UCRA Board of Directors, in an informal discussion at the Board of Community Development here Tuesday said that officials of the Colorado River Municipal Water District had visited with him here, and that they indicated it would be two months yet before their

study is complete and they can settle on a site.

After that UCRA and CRMWD directors will meet together to go into the project further, according to these tentative conversations.

"We don't care who builds the dam," Mr. Allen said. "But we are working as hard as we can on it, and only want to see that whoever builds it provides water for the people in our area as well as up the river. We are doing everything possible to tie something down here."

Jack Allard of Barnhart, former Sanco ranchman, was seriously hurt Thursday when the wind blew his coat against a pulley on an irrigation pump. The pump threw him around on the cement floor breaking 9 ribs and cutting an 8 inch gash in his scalp. He is in the Big Lake hospital.

Mrs. Bryan Yarborough, Chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, is in charge of planning the program.

The dedication program is scheduled for 2 p.m. in the district court room.

Conference room and commissioners court room will be open during the morning for those who would like to meet and mingle.

The school is to turn out for the afternoon program, and a chorus of students will sing.

Gas Fire Destroys L. Sparks Residence

Fire Chief Calvin Wallace said that as far as they could determine, the fire which destroyed Luther Sparks home Monday morning must have caught from a leaky butane line. It is thought that the gas ignited from a hot water heater pilot.

Mr. Sparks and the six children were awakened around 3:30 choking with smoke. As he was getting the youngsters out of the building, a daughter ran to the Wallace home to awaken Mr. Wallace, who said he could see flames leaping from the house when he turned in the alarm.

By the time the Fire Department could get there, the building was gutted, and little could be done except to wet down the

ruins, which later in the day persisted in flaming up again.

Mrs. Kathryn Geist, who, with Mr. Douglas Dean and others have been interested in providing the immediate needs of the family, said an abundance of clothing had already been provided.

Their interest now is in providing good used furniture to replace that destroyed. Money for that purpose may be left with Mr. Wallace at his store or handed to Mrs. Geist. Checks may be made payable to Luther Sparks fund, will be placed in the bank and used to buy furniture.

Declaring Texas Civil War History Appreciation Week

WHEREAS the State of Texas played a vital and extensive part in the Civil War;

WHEREAS the Coke County Historical Survey Committee is conducting Civil War Centennial observances in the form of educational programs and speeches before local groups; surveying, recording and marking the neglected graves of Civil War veterans and compiling biographical material on their lives; marking sites, homes and structures figuring in the Civil War; working on the history of the connection of the area and the war; and

WHEREAS the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and its Civil War Centennial Advisory Committee is sponsoring this program of recognition, research, recordation and education in an attempt to compile all data into a comprehensive report of the state's history between 1861-1865; and

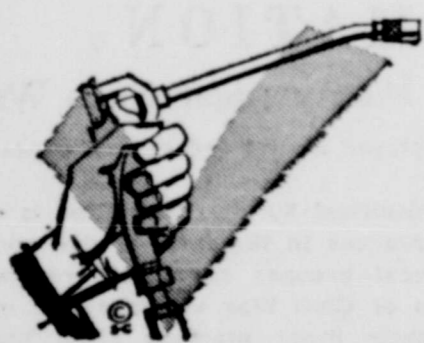

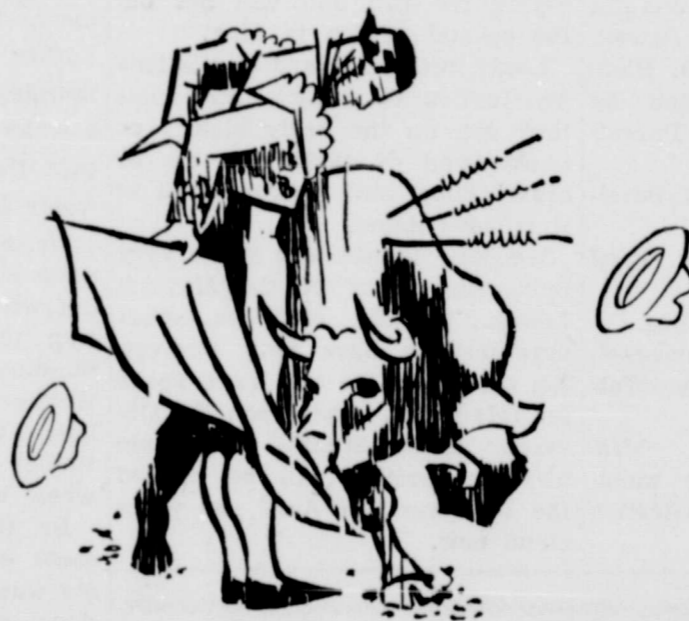

Our Home Circle

Knowing what to do when a tornado is approaching may save your life, says Fay C. Roe, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Tornadoes can occur any place in the United States at any time of the year and any hour of the day, but mostly between 3 and 7 p.m. Tornadoes, in most cases move from a westerly direction usually from the southwest. The path is usually 10 to 40 miles long, but have moved forward for 300 miles. The average width is 400 yards, but have been known to be over a mile in width.

Tornadoes travel 25 to 40 miles per hour with wind speed within the tornado estimated as high as 500 miles per hour.

Learn and follow these safety rules, says Mrs. Roe.

1. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris, and preferably equipped with pick and shovel.

2. If you are in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path, or if there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

3. If in a city or town, seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building, making sure you stay away from windows. The corner of a basement toward the tornado is safest. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

4. If in a school, and the school is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows. Remain near an inside wall on the lower floor, when possible. In schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch, if storm shelter is not available. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large poorly supported roofs.

Texas has its share of tornadoes, and all of us should remember the safety rules and be prepared to cope with the situation.

Copies of a leaflet, Tornado Precautions can be had by calling Mrs. Roe's office.

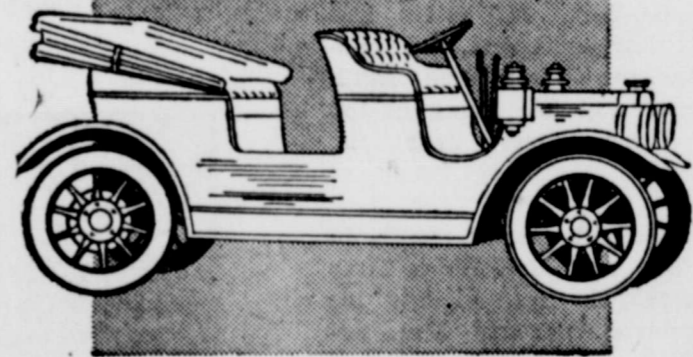
