Full Lake, New Pump Put Water Ahead

CITY ADDS PUMP, AS WATER DEMAND GREATLY INCREASES

When rain on Mountain Creek watershed last week filled the city lake, it came as workmen were recoating the inside of the tower.

As a result, the water, pumped directly into the mains, creates a varying pressure — high when the pumps are going, low when the pressure has to be released to avoid over chlorination.

This variation causes sediment which naturally accumulates in the mains to be stirred up — hence muddy water from the taps at times, as explained by Mayor Robert Vaughan.

The city has ordered a 500 gallon per minute pump, which is to replace one of the pumps now in use, which will be placed on reserve.

PUMPS GET BEHIND

At peak loads, when everyone turns on the lawn sprinkler, leaves the hose running on trees and shrubbery, then goes in and takes a bath after work in the summer evening, the water use overreaches the present pump capacity, creating a hazard in fire protection.

The new pump is expected to relieve that, and at the same time to reduce the fire insurance key rate, which cannot be further reduced without the 500 gallon pump, powered by a 40 horse power electric motor.

The present operating two pumps include a 25 horse power 250 gallon per minute pump, and another with 30 horse power, 340 gallon per minute.

The two running together however, in the mechanics of the thing only get 400 gallons per minute.

WATER USE DOUBLING

Since the lake was replenished with rains last year, the consumption has considerably increased, and is expected to increase still more this summer.

City officials state that the increased sale of water is paying for the expenditures on the system, which include laying of considerable footage of mains last year.

Offhand estimates are that the city is delivering nearly twice the water as was delivered in 1959.

Rain Fills Lake, Insures Robert Lee Ample Supply

For the first time since 1957, water ran around the spillway of Robert Lee's Mountain Creek Reservoir, insuring a water supply for 2½ years on the basis of present usage, according to Mayor Robert Vaughan.

Rains prior to Thursday night had put some water in the lake, and a good rain measuring up to three inches filled the lake Thursday night and Friday morning.

The reservoir, built in 1950, had been dry from lack of rainfall one time — last year, when the city drilled two shallow wells and supplied users for a few days. Rain then brought the lake up to a comfortable supply, and it lacked some 7 feet of being full when the rains started in May.

Thursday nights rain added 2½ or 3 feet to put water around the spillway.

Water now is being pumped directly into the mains from the treating plant, as the lower tank is being given a cleaning and recoating on the inside, to prevent threatened leaking.

Water users are assured of ample supply for gardens, lawns and shrubbery.

Freezing Is Simple and Safe Method of Preserving Food

"Freezing is one of the simplest and fastest methods of preserving foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and food values of most fruits, vegetables and meats, however canning is still a good method of food preservation," said Mrs. Fay C. Roe, county home demonstration agent. Mrs. Roe demonstrated how to freeze and can vegetables and fruits to an audience of 37 persons last Wednesday afternoon in Bronte at the West Texas Utilities office.

She warned the group to beware of poor packaging for frozen foods, and showed several kinds of packaging materials that had the necessary qualities of "moisture-vapor proof or moisture-vapor resistant." In discussing canning, Mrs. Roe said, "If you do not have a home freezer, do not be discouraged as improved methods of canning make it more enjoyable and it preserves the natural goodness of foods."

MAYBE WE SHOULD BE PREPARED FOR ANY FUTURE TELEPHONE STRIKES

After many, many months of weary haggling and threatened strike, the General Telephone Company of the Southwest and the Communications Workers of America seem to have come to an agreement and averted a strike.

There have been two strikes by this Union since General came in here. For the first time ever, we saw pickets carrying placards—a thing we hadn't ever considered necessary in this area.

The head bargainer in this case this time came down from some other state. We do not know how much people local to this area had to do with any of it.

But we do know that after the last considerable raise given employees, General Telephone asked, and got a raise in rates. Eden opposed it, but lost their case in the courts. Bronte started to oppose it but decided they couldn't win.

The public has a stake in this matter. Whether or not we are confronted with another raise in telephone rates, we face the possibility of a general business paralysis brought on by a general telephone strike.

PUBLIC CAN BE PREPARED

It might be a good time to begin to prepare ourselves, just in case. Radio communication has proved itself to the point where this can be done. There is already a loosely rganized system of communication by radio which can be made very effective.

When CWA again considers a strike, it might be well to remember that the strike is not against the company, but against the public, for there are many of us who do not get any better pay than they get. The public will go along as far as they feel they should and then the public can strike just as effectively as CWA can.

We are all putting up with making less than we want to, and often less than we need.

He stopped his demands, too late. Their former customers are using oil. They are a poverty problem for the nation.

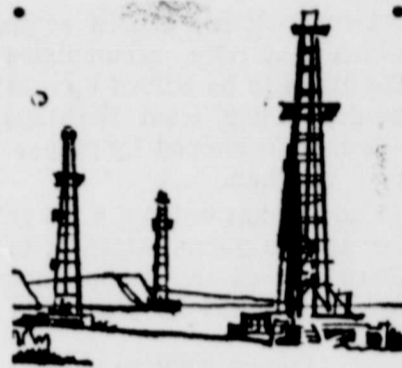

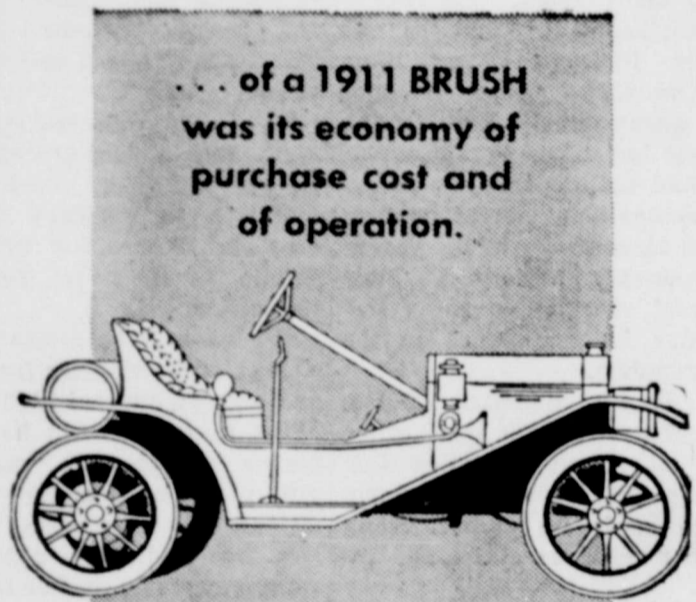

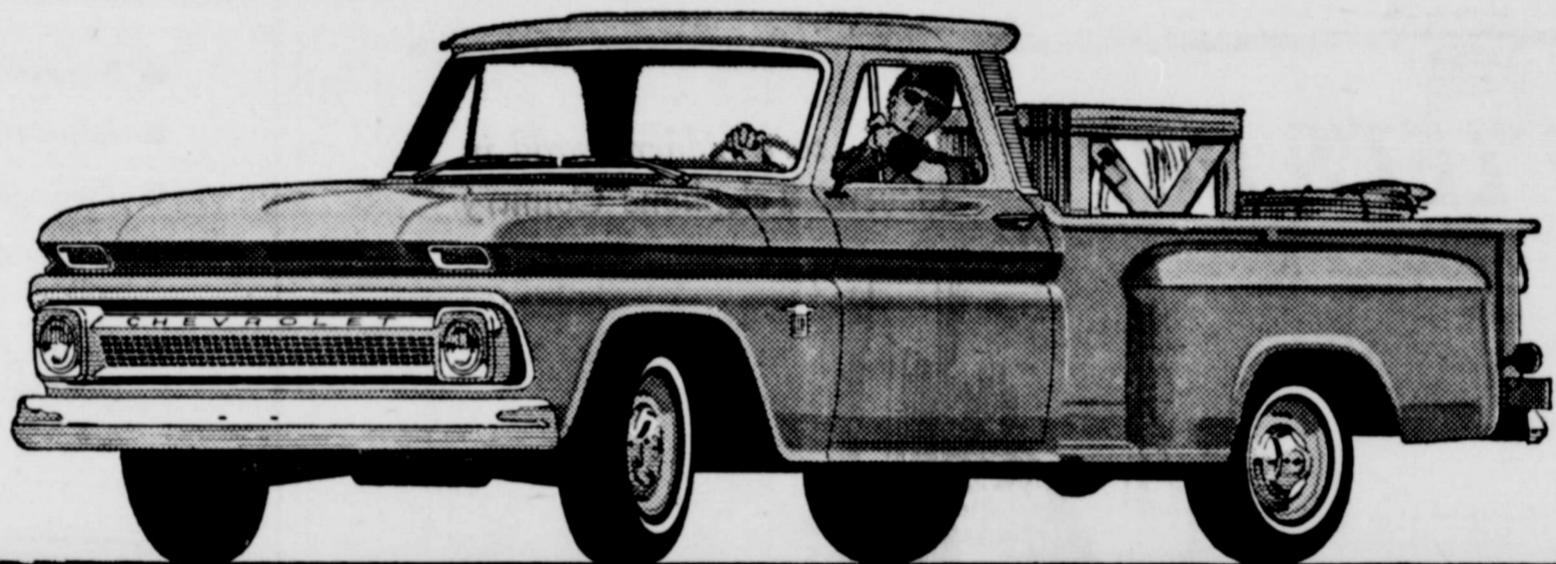
