Modern firemen badly need h mets especially designed to protect the heads from heat, and gas masks when entering a burning structure.
Mr. Sawyer said that firemen from towns and cities near lakes said that the work of the fire department is greatly increased when near such a body of water. Not only the additional homes built around such a lake, but calls to rescue people from drowning and other emergencies greatly increase the duties of the firemen and use of the equipment.
