The Farm Bureau sponsored two classes in rural fire fighting. In other classes and actual firefighting demonstrations, almost every conceivable type of fire was arranged, ignited, then put out by teams of firemen under expert instruction.

"Arsenic Acid receives tentative aproval today, July 21, the Federal Register carries the announcement by the Food and Drug Administration that they are tentativesly approving the use of arsenic acid as a desiccant for cotton with a four parts per million tolerance. This announcement is subject to a 30 day protest period before becoming official, therefore, August 21 should be the date for final aproval.



Friends and neighbors were very thoughtful then. Frank Percifull was one of the best men that ever






