

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GUEST EDITORIAL

Right here we insert an editorial from The Frontiersman, Palmer, Alaska. Readers may draw their own conclusions.

WHAT'S WRONG WITH SUCCESS

"Apparently there are some elements within the heirarchy of the Civil Aeronautics Board who cannot countenance the free enterprise system. There are those within the organization who would penalize, rather than compliment, a firm which is making its own way unsullied by dollars from a 'benevolent' Uncle Sam."

The words are those of the Ketchikan News. That paper is angry -apparently with plenty of justification-over a threat to the excellent existing commercial airline service to its state.

Briefly, the situation is this. Pan American World Airwayswhich, it is important to remember, is not a subsidized air carrierpioneered air service to Alaska and, over the years, has improved it in every particular. Indeed, The News thinks that ".... Pan Am has always given better service to us than we really deserved."

Yet there are forces within the CAB which would remove Pan Am from its Alaskan runs and give the service to two other airlines. And these lines are taxpayer subsidized.

The News has an argument based on principle-as well as practicality-here. To quote it again, "We believe in success ... We'll always feel that the free enterprise system is the only way-it's been demonstrated countless times here and even abroad when governments there have accepted our system. Then why in the world should we throw out the good and accept the lesser alternative?"

These are good questions, and the principle they represent directly affects every state. They go beyond the question of what airline will or will not be allowed to serve Alaska. And the way in which CAB will answer them will be a matter of great importance.

If people lose confidence in the government's credit, and quit buying those bonds, then the government won't be able to borrow the money to pay yours if you want to cash it.

When the government pays off any bonds now, they do it with money borrowed from somebody else, or borrow more money in its place. Is there any danger that people will begin to lose confidence in the government's credit if the debt continues to rise as it

has done for some years? Do you have a couple of one dollar bills and a five? Read what is on those bills. Probably on the five you will see Federal Reserve
