Red award in Clothing — 1959 thru 1962 and blue award in 1964.

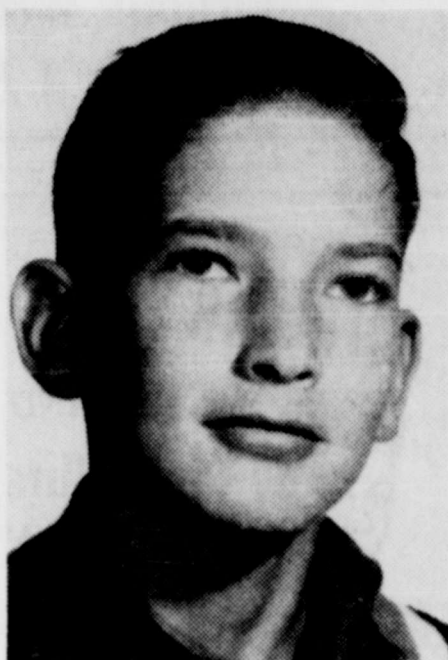
Won Home Economics award in 1961.

Darrel Pitcock, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Pitcock, of Sanco, and a member of the Future Leaders 4-H club, is Coke County's Gold Star Boy for 1964. The fourteen year old, eighth grader in the Robert Lee School will be honored at the District Gold Star banquet in San Angelo on December 2. A special noon luncheon will be held on that occasion to recognize the Gold Star Award winners and their leaders in the 22 counties of Extension District 7.

Darrel has completed five years of 4-H Club work, receiving numerous awards previously. His previous awards include five year pins, the County Beef, Agriculture and Achievement Awards and the District Beef Award, junior division, in 1962. He has been active in all 4-H Club functions and has been a member of the Junior Soil Judging team the past two years.

In his five years of 4-H Club work, Darrel has fed five steers, had two swine feeding demonstrations and has developed three registered Hereford heifers.

He exhibited the second place light weight steer in the Abilene Show in 1962, two third place steers in the County Show. In 1961, his steer was declared champion of the Coke County Fat Stock Show.

District 8-B Champions Go For Throckmorton

Coach Garland Davis and his Steers were polishing up their play this week for Throckmorton, the 7-B winners, at Hamlin, Thursday at 7:30. Following is Ronnis Baker's story of the final game in District 8-B with Bronte here Friday night of last week.

The Steers finished up their regular season with a win over the young, but impressive cross county rivals. The Steers scored in every quarter to sew up the game early.

The Bronte Longhorns rallied in the final quarter to keep the Steers from scoring a shut-out, and through the whole game they never gave up.

First Quarter

Robert Lee received the opening kick, with Hatch taking the short kick and returning 11 yards

to the Steer 46 yard line. On a sustained drive, with two short passes to Wink and line busting by Dodson and Gartman, QB Thetford moved the Steers 54 yards, with Dodson going the final three yards off the right side between Sparks and Askins for the TD.

Thetford kept through the same hole for the extras, and the Steers led 8-0. They consumed 9 minutes on this drive, and this left very little remainder of the quarter as Dodson kicked off to the 5 yard line, with a short return by Bronte. The Longhorns ran seven plays as the quarter ended, picking up two first downs.

Second Quarter

At near midfield, the Longhorns attempted a pass, and it was picked off by Wink, who returned

the ball 27 yards to put the Steers in good position again, but they couldn't move, and on the 4th down with 5 needed, Royce Lee of the Longhorns intercepted a pass on the 10 and was brought down there.

The Steers held and Bronte punted to Williams on the 40 yard line, return was 3 yards, with the Steers now in possession on the 37. Thetford called a fake to the right, rolled out to his left, and with good blocking at the line he hit the sideline, shook off the secondary for a 37 yard TD romp.

Try for points failed, and the Steers led 14 to 0.

Dodson kicked to the 20, with only a 5 yard return. The Longhorns went to the air and another pass was quickly picked off, this time by Williams with only a short return.

From the 45 the Steers moved down to the 28, when Dodson got the call and ripped up the middle, with a big hole at the right side again, and he went all the way for another TD, no extras and the score was 20-0.

Sparks kicked to the 30, and with a 10 yard return the Longhorns ran out the clock at half time.

Third Quarter

Bronte received Dodson's kick at the 5 yard line, and a good return to the 28 put the ball in play again with Bronte in possession. They moved to the 43, missed a pitchout, and Askins recover for the Steers.

Gartman quickly ate up 34 fast yards. Wink cut off tackle for the final 4 yards and the TD. Try for points failed, and now its 26 to 0 on the big scoreboard at the east end of the field.

After kickoff, the teams exchanged the ball two times apiece, with an interception by Hatch and a fumble for RL, then an interception and a punt by Bronte, neither team seeming to threaten as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Class of 33 and Class of 49 were represented by members in antique autos.

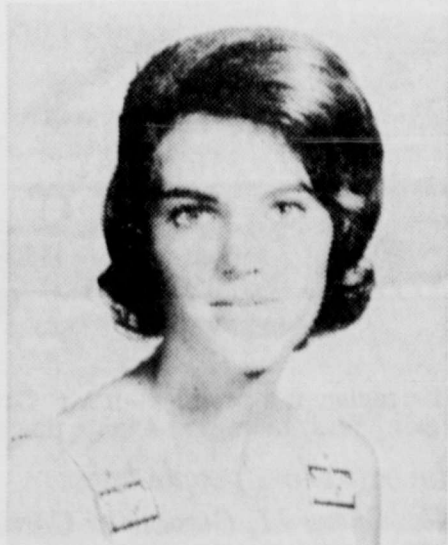

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COUNTRYSIDE

Whether you prepare your own tax return or have a consultant prepare it, the guide can be of service to you. A reference is always nice to have as one makes final preparation for filing his tax return.

Eighty-six different 4-H club members and leaders were honored with 132 awards at the Annual 4H Club Achievement program Saturday night.

Phosphorus, a mineral especially deficient in late summer, fall and winter in all areas of Texas, can be supplied to range cattle in drinking water or in mineral feeders. Supplementing phosphorus can mean heavier cows, heavier calves at weaning age and an increased calf crop by as much as 30 percent. Cows may also conceive earlier after calving.

Eradication workers are plotting their strategy for combatting screwworms this winter which they hope will eliminate the threat of reinfestation of the United States by the livestock pest in 1965.

Their plan is to release all available sterile screwworm flies up to 200 miles or more below the international border along both east and west coasts of Mexico where large numbers of native screwworms live throughout the winter. Sterile males mate with native females and prevent reproduction. This action is expected to weaken Mexican screwworm colonies which from the principal threat to the Southwest and slow the northward migration of the insects next spring.

Eradicators' ability to carry out this plan hinges on whether the number of screwworm cases in Texas can first be brought to an absolute minimum. If screwworms persist in Texas, it will require diverting the sterile flies, airplanes and manpower from the task of strengthening the barrier zone in Mexico to fighting

small, but costly, outbreaks in Texas.

Each infestation in Texas costs approximately \$750 to treat with sterile flies, field inspection and spray. For the same amount of money, one million sterile flies could be dispersed in Mexico where they would help protect against reinfestation from the south in 1965.

A mild winter, which would allow screwworms to survive and build up in numbers in much of the southern part of the state, would be particularly harmful to the program, authorities said. They fear stockmen may stop looking for screwworms because of the low number of cases experienced this year and the prospects of cold weather ahead.

Success of their strategy, therefore, will depend on farmers and ranchers detecting and reporting screwworm infestations before they can multiply, so that emergency treatment can be provided. Treatment of animal wounds with smears is also called for to ward off screwworm attack.

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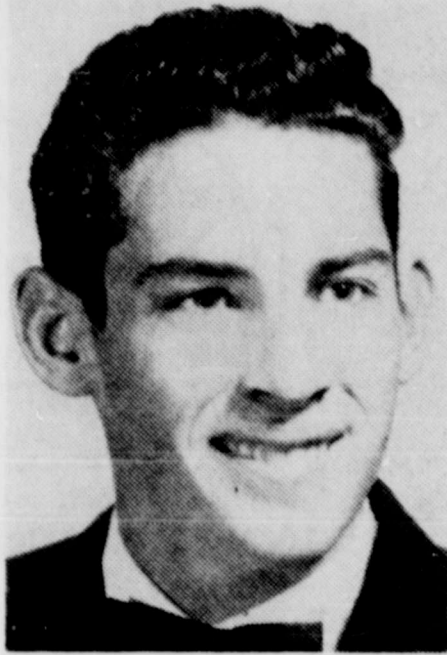

Our Home Circle

Although freezing game meat is a simple process, there are a few pointers that should be followed to produce a good quality product.

1. Start with a good quality animal that has been properly cared for and dressed.

2. Age big game one week or longer at 40 degrees F. to improve tenderness and flavor.

3. Cut the carcass the same as for beef. Boneless cuts save freezer space, although it is not advisable to bone steaks, chops and short ribs.

4. Store the size package required for a meal. Thawing and then refreezing lowers meat quality.

5. Divide steaks or chops with two pieces of freezer paper if more than one is to be frozen in a package. This permits meat to thaw uniformly and pieces are easier to separate.

6. Use only moisture-vapor-proof freezer paper for wrapping meat for freezing.

7. Label all packages as to the name of animal or cut of meat and the date.

8. Freeze wild game immediately after packaging, keeping the meat at 0 degrees F. or lower until it is used. Quality meat that is correctly wrapped will keep frozen at this temperature from six months to a year, except heart and liver which should be used within six months.

9. Do not freeze more than four pounds of meat per cubic foot of freezer space; take the remainder to a commercial concern.

10. Thaw meat before cooking to retain the greatest amount of moisture content. At room temperature meat usually thaws in about two hours per pound. If thawing is done in the refrigerator, allow five hours per pound.

11. Finally and foremost, do not refreeze thawed game.

Further information on dressing, freezing, and cooking wild game, including deer, is available free in the County Extension office. Call or write for a copy of the up to date bulletin.

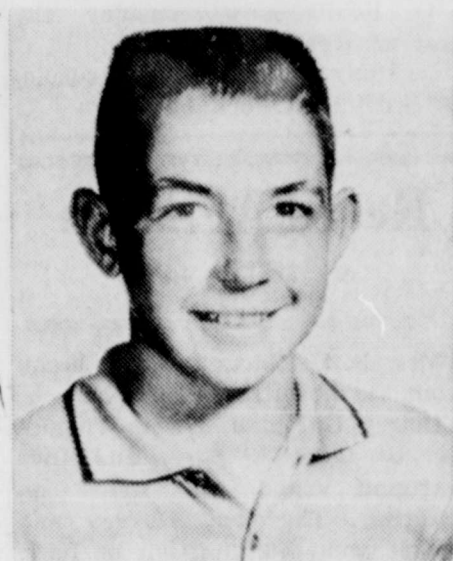

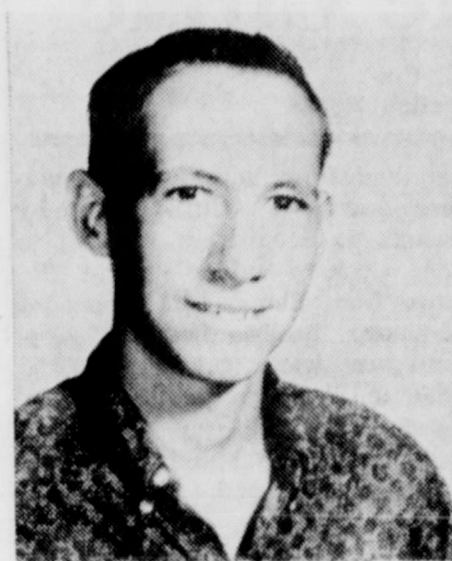

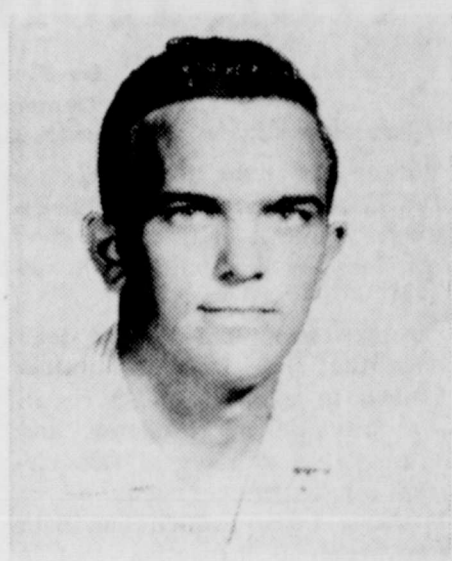

I admitted it. "I am Harless Puett," he said. And there we were.

I had come up through Germany with an anti-aircraft artillery battalion. He had been up ahead with an infantry division as a platoon sergeant, got a battlefield commission out there, and had come back from Czecho-Slovakia to see after some gear his outfit had left in Nurenborg.

Turkey and ham are being featured in most markets as Thanksgiving arrives. Both are good buys for the budget-wise homemaker.

Turkeys head the list of lean meats that are high in protein and low in calories. They're also a low cost meat choice, and are available in sizes to suit virtually all consumer needs.

Select a turkey which has both a government inspection and a Grade A stamp for a top quality bird. Thawing frozen turkeys at room temperature for about one hour per pound of weight is satisfactory. Remove the giblets from the chest and body cavity before cooking the turkey.

Good supplies of smoked ham are available, and there are several other ham styles from which to choose. Fresh pork cuts also are inviting this week.

Beef features both pot roasts and steaks, along with ground beef and liver.

Cranberries are plentiful and prices remain about the same as for the past several weeks. Apples, pears, bananas, and grapes are other good fruit choices. Tangerines are coming to market now and are selling at moderate to high price levels.

Peanuts and peanut products are in excellent supply. The 1964 crop is forecast as up to 16 million pounds over last year.

Vegetables choices of the week are mustard greens, turnips and greens, eggplant, cauliflower, squash, head lettuce, sweet potatoes, cabbage, broccoli, carrots and celery.

The recipe I give to you this week is an old fashioned Chocolate fudge. This recipe was the one I used in my freshman foods while in college. It is still my favorite!

Chocolate Fudge

- 2 cups sugar
- ¾ cup milk
- 2 T. (scant) Karo
- 3 T. butter
- 1¼ sq. chocolate or 4 Round T. cocoa
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 cup nuts if desired

Melt chocolate over a low flame being careful to keep it from burning. Add Karo and ½ butter and ½ milk and all the sugar, stirring until all the sugar is dissolved. Wash crystals down from

pan and from spoon. After mixture starts to boil, stir only enough to keep from sticking to pan. Cook to soft ball stage. Remove from flame, add remainder of butter, but do not stir. Cool until luke warm, add vanilla and beat until it begins to lose its gloss. Take into the hands and knead until soft and pliable. Add chopped nuts and knead until creamy.

Put into greased pan and pat into shape.

Omit chocolate and use same recipe for White Fudge.

Cranberries are becoming a standard menu item, not only at holiday time but throughout the year.

Nearly 60 per cent of the crop is processed, and consumers have a choice of whole berry and strained and jellied cranberry sauce as well as canned cranberry juice throughout the year. There'll be no shortage of cranberries during the Christmas season.

Fresh cranberries now on the market are sold mostly in one pound cellophane bags or boxes with a window. The fresh market season for cranberries extends from October through January in most areas, although this varies somewhat according to the locale.

Fresh cranberries may be stored in the container in which they are purchased. Keep them refrigerated, for warm temperatures cause them to "sweat" and will cause more rapid spoiling.

One pound of fresh cranberries makes 3 to 3½ cups of sauce.

I use cranberries in uncooked relish and Cranberry Bread. The recipe for the bread is often on the box of berries, but if you have a copy of "Christmas Time at Home," there is a good one in it. The recipe is on page 11 and is called "Cranberry Quick Bread."

Shopping calendars indicate that this is the season of the year to buy women's coats and dresses, blankets and fabrics.

I suggest a five-point check list for consumers in order to take full advantage of the sales.

1. Know store policies on sales. The first day offers the best selection, the last day price reduction. One needs to know the original price.
2. Know your wants and needs.

Aimless bargain hunting may result in useless buys.

3. Check size, color, style and fit carefully. Sale items are usually not returnable.

4. Realistically consider the cost of cleaning or repair.

5. Study guarantees and services provided before buying.

Mules were used to haul up guns and ammunition then, and the officers were assigned horses. They had these little English shell saddles, no horn, and snaffle bits. When one decided to an and really meant it, you just sat steady till he got through.

This horse took off in a dead run, hit some pavement, skidded and fell, throwing Arthur beneath him.

He was in San Antonio Armistice Day, and the soldiers fairly opened the town wide, parading with the Kaiser hung in effigy, and otherwise making their joy be known.
