

Amazing Swiftettes do it again!

Versatility on offense, consistent pressure defense, and composure under pressure—Nazareth utilized all three in Austin to win its third consecutive Class B state girls basketball crown.

Doretta Ramaekers (all-state tournament forward) led an outside shooting attack in the 52-43 semi-final win over D'Hanis. Lori Gerber was deadly inside in the 46-43 edge over Brock. And in both games, Nazareth displayed the intimidating defense and self-possession that has helped it win three straight titles in four straight appearances.

Nazareth is only the fourth team ever to win three straight UIL girls' basketball state titles. Claude, Sundown and North Hopkins are the other three.

The Swiftettes are the first team ever to win three in a row with three different coaches. Cathy Wilson guided Nazareth to its first championship in 1977, George Cox in '78, and Joe Lombard this season.

Nazareth entered the tournament with two injured starters, 5-9 forward Michelle Acker (out with a severe ankle sprain) and Doretta Ramaekers (suffering from a knee injury). Acker never saw action in Austin, but Ramaekers was the

action in the opening win over D'Hanis.

Nazareth was trailing 7-3 with 2:00 left in the first period when the 5-9 junior came off the bench to spark the Swiftettes' offense. She canned eight of nine field goals for 16 points.

Ramaekers wasn't the only one hitting, however, as playmaker Glenda Gerber hit 11 and sophomore Sharon Gerber added 9 to the total. 5-9 post forward Lori Gerber balanced the attack with nine rebounds and 16 points inside.

The Swiftettes were not able to contain D'Hanis' 5-9 Annette Nester, who grabbed 10 rebounds and hit 28 points from all over. But their defense contained the rest of the D'Hanis squad.

"She [Nester] is the best offensive player we've faced all year," said Coach Lombard. "She was tough. She could score inside or out."

"The difference in the game was our outside shooting against their zone defense in the second and third quarter," he added.

Nazareth outscored D'Hanis 18-10 in the second stanza and 18-12 in the third quarter. That, plus full-court pressure the entire game, enabled the Swiftettes to build a 25-19 halftime lead and they were

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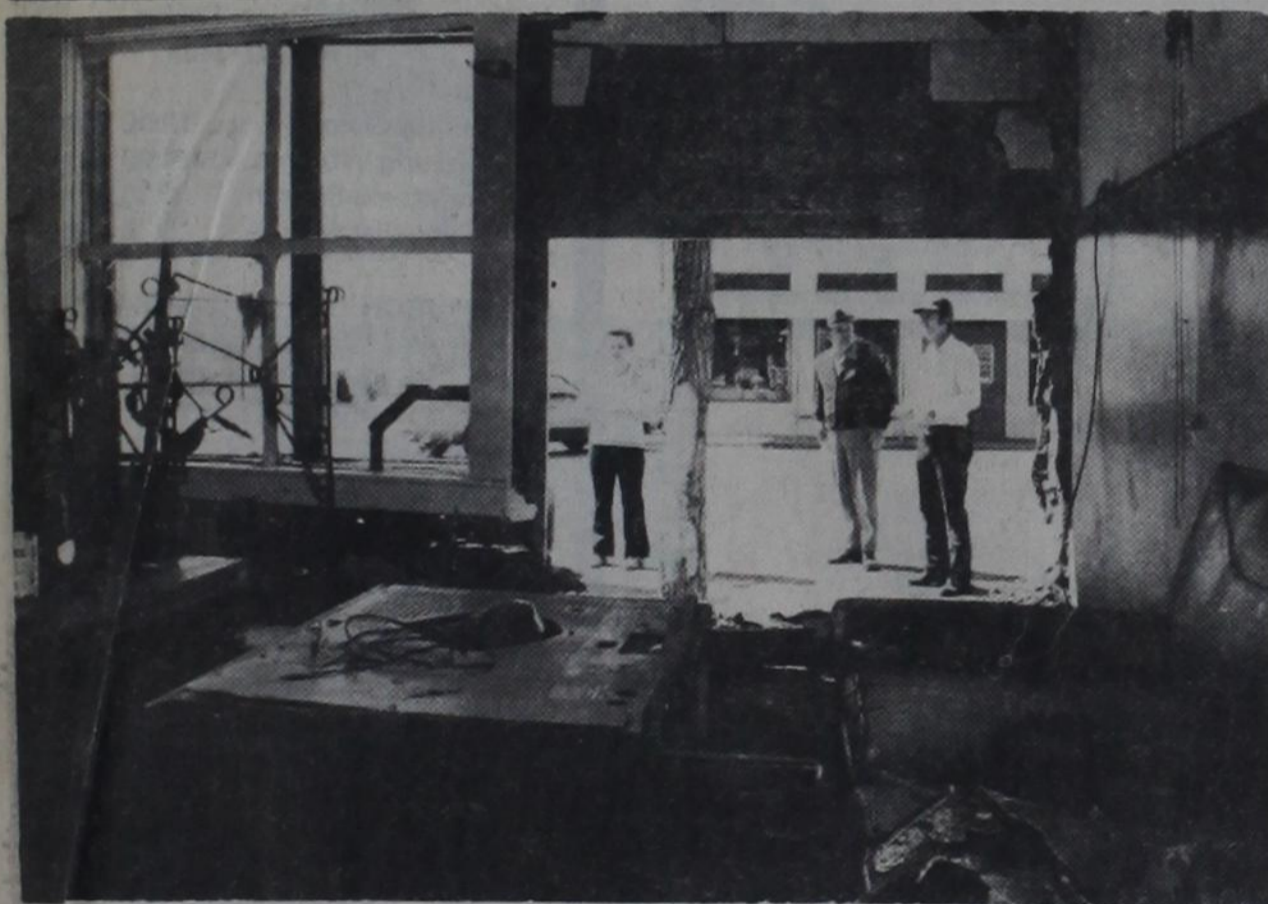

Pickup crashes into den

Mrs. Albert Gerber of Nazareth may never watch "Starsky and Hutch" again. That's the TV show she was viewing in her den Sunday night when a pickup came through the wall behind the TV set.

The pickup, driven by Jack McKnight of Vega, had just

been involved in a two-vehicle collision at the intersection on the southwest corner of the Gerber home. After hitting another pickup, it careened across the intersection, glanced off of a tree and crashed into the Gerbers' west wall, which is 10-inch adobe faced with vinyl siding.

The pickup ripped out half of the den wall and knocked a large metal-frame window loose. It also threw Mrs. Gerber's TV set to the middle of the den.

"All of a sudden these lights were coming toward the window, and I thought, 'Gosh, there's nowhere else for him to go—he's got to come right in the window.'"

She doesn't remember quitting her den, "but there were pieces of adobe thrown past my chair and all the way into the dining room, so I must have gotten out pretty fast."

Before she realized it, she said, she was outside viewing the wreckage. Then she fainted.

"It's funny now, but it wasn't then," she said.

McKnight was not believed to be seriously hurt, although his pickup was demolished. Also narrowly escaping serious injury were five Nazareth youths in a pickup driven by Lester Backus, 17.

McKnight reportedly was driving north and Backus east when the two pickups collided in the intersection. The Backus pickup—which also received heavy damage—crashed into a utility pole on the other side of the intersection after the collision.

DHS hosts regional band meet

Region XVI North Zone Band Contest hosted by Dimmitt High School will be held tonight (Thursday) and Friday, bringing about 1,500 students here to compete.

"The contest performances are open to the public, and we invite everyone who wants to come and hear some good band music," Smith said.

"The three AA bands that will play Thursday night—Floydada, Lockney and Dimmitt—are eligible for Sweepstakes awards."

When going got toughest, they drew on poise, faith

An unshakable desire to win...

Champions have it and it was written on the faces of a determined Nazareth team last weekend in Austin.

The Swiftettes made their fourth consecutive state tournament appearance and won their third straight Class B basketball championship, and they attribute their success to a number of things.

TOGETHERNESS

"We're so close, said point guard Glenda Gerber (a member of all three championship teams). "Before games we get together and talk to each other, and we feel so close. A lot of teams are not as close as we."

"We knew if we worked as a team and played our kind of ball we could win," said Lori Gerber, who scored 41 points and grabbed 21 rebounds in Nazareth's two games. "It doesn't take just one to score," says Lori. "Everyone has to have confidence in themselves and in their shots."

POISE

"I can't say we want to win any more than other teams, we just know what it takes," said Glenda. "Each year we've

learned something, and it's the little things we've learned over the years that help us win."

"We know if someone comes in off the bench they'll do a good job," says Colleen Gerber (all-state guard last season). "We have a lot of confidence in each other."

"Poise," added Colleen (also a member of all three winning teams). "that's what it takes. Coach (Cathy) Wilson taught us that poise and playing our game is what's gonna win."

The Swiftettes have had three coaches in three years and won three state championships—that's a first in Texas basketball history.

Poise and closeness are two key factors in Nazareth's success story, but the girls draw an abundance of composure and strength from another source.

It's evident in all the players (all Catholic)—from the freshman on the bench with the Rosary, praying, to Colleen Gerber, who clinched the championship game by hitting two crucial free throws. Her lips were moving, but she wasn't talking to herself—she was praying.

The religious aspect seems to have a cohesive, calming effect

on Nazareth's team.

"The night before the finals we didn't have the confidence that we had in the first game at regional," said Colleen. "But the next morning we woke up and said our Rosary and it just did something to us."

"It calmed us down and made us feel together," said junior Doretta Ramaekers.

"It made us feel like we had one more on our team."

Gerber, Ramaekers make all-state list

Two more all-staters were added to Nazareth's long list when Lori Gerber 5-9 sophomore post forward, and Doretta Ramaekers, 5-9 junior wing forward, were named to the Class B all-state tournament girls' basketball team.

Gerber, who sank 41 points and grabbed 21 rebounds in the Swiftettes' two state tourney games, was a unanimous choice.

Joining them on the dream team Sherea Mathis, Avinger junior; Tina Procter, Brock junior; and Annette Nester, D'Hanis senior.

office in Dimmitt, subject to the annual city election which will be held April 7.

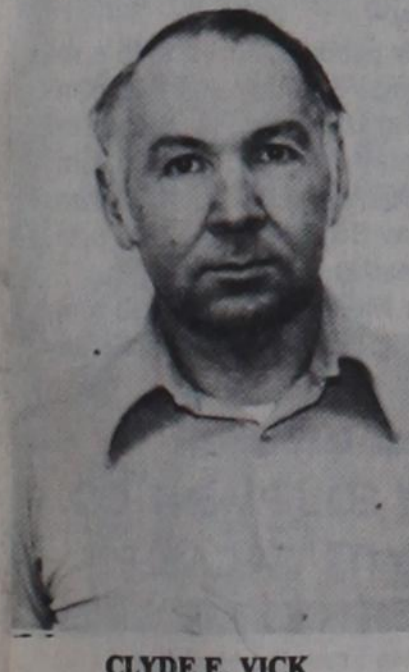
Making his announcement, Vick said, "I wish to announce my candidacy for the place of mayor of the city of Dimmitt."

Queen of Caribbean cruise ship is -- guess who?

We are home from a two-week cruise on the M.S. Nordic from the Caribbean Sea with stops and tours of eight islands. Going from Dimmitt here me, Myrtle, Ceal Carlile, Opal Bearden and Edith Graef. There were 31 countries represented on the cruise, many from Canada and the northern states of the US, because of the good weather there. People seated in the dining room near us were from Belgium, they call it Limburg Belgie Europa, last name is Adelina and Elza. Writers and the another couple Sushashi and Anna Wladyslaw and daughter Carine. I tried to talk to all 780 passengers. We stopped at San Juan, English speaking, many shops, either expensive or too cheap, the homes and some poor as is everywhere. On to St. Thomas, many shops. We took bus tours of all the Islands at Puerto Rico, went high in the mountains to see the Rain Forest, completely covered with green foliage, elephant ear ferns like trees, palm trees everything on one side of the mountains. They get 25 inches of rain a year, the other side 60 inches, fine beaches and fine hotels. The ship is there and El Conquistador Hotel.

We stop at Guadeloupe a French Island, with shops of the Vegetable Market and sidewalks blocked with materials and people. All I saw were light-colored French speaking colored folks, a friendly and proud people. We had to hurry to much, but everywhere that gorgeous Flamboyant tree covered with flame colored flowers. They have bananas and vegetables and every Island made Rum from sugar cane and some one said a good Rum from that green cocoonnut and pineapple juice on to Arub, a town Oranjestad, settled by the Dutch in 1499 and English, back to Dutch in 1954, much oil there, statues of Queen Wilhelmina, beautiful white marble statue and church, a fine Jewish synagogue; much French spoken. You must go to Caracas off the north coast of Venezuela the land is dry but much money from oil and gas, and sells there for 30 cents per gallon. Saw many Shell and so signs.

My favorite Island was Jamaica, a clean very green tree and flower place, also English spoken. Seems they are under the US Protection, many colored people and educated. Their capital is bigger than ours. They have a dictator type leader, the folks told me

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The papa died and his 54 year old son rules with a stiff hand but it seems to be prosperous. We made the eight mile ride on a raft made of 4-inch wide bamboo poles 14 foot long and a handsome colored young man used a pole to guide us. Young boys took the rafts back. We took a bus back to the ship. Our last stop was Haiti also French, some fine villages, French, some fine villas, many small houses. They have iron works and thousands sell those little mahogany carved statues. Their brag is that Christopher Columbus landed in that fine bay in 1492 and history says the Ciboney tribesmen came there from North America 450 years before Christ. You must take that trip some day.

Our ship the Nordic is a 6 level floating hotel a fine one too. All the services above the engine room are by young handsome men in fine tailored uniforms probably 30 or 40 in the huge dining rooms. The cruise directors were wonderful, Nick and Heather Allen of Scotland. They had something going all the time star entertainers singers and comedy, movies, dances. Music by two big bands always on board.

I was queen for a week, was crowned, also long red velvet train-could choose my King so I did. He was a young bride's groom (his little pretty girl pointed to him say choose, he was Don Stevenson. I received many gifts including crystal (or glass) glasses and a bottle of Champagne, gold bracelet necklace, 3 bottles of perfume and made many friends. Edith Graef says tell you she won two bingo games, Opal also won a wine that she can't drink. And Ceal found a nice looking young man that called her "Mamma Mia" she reminded him of his mama. I met the captain at the big formal, but the officers do not mingle like on "Love Boat." Don't ask me to tell you more or I will. We dressed up formal two nights each week, a wonderful trip and lovely friendly people. The Ned Bursons of Channing were on the tour. They recently bought the Clayton N.M. Ranch from Alice and Wes Anthony.

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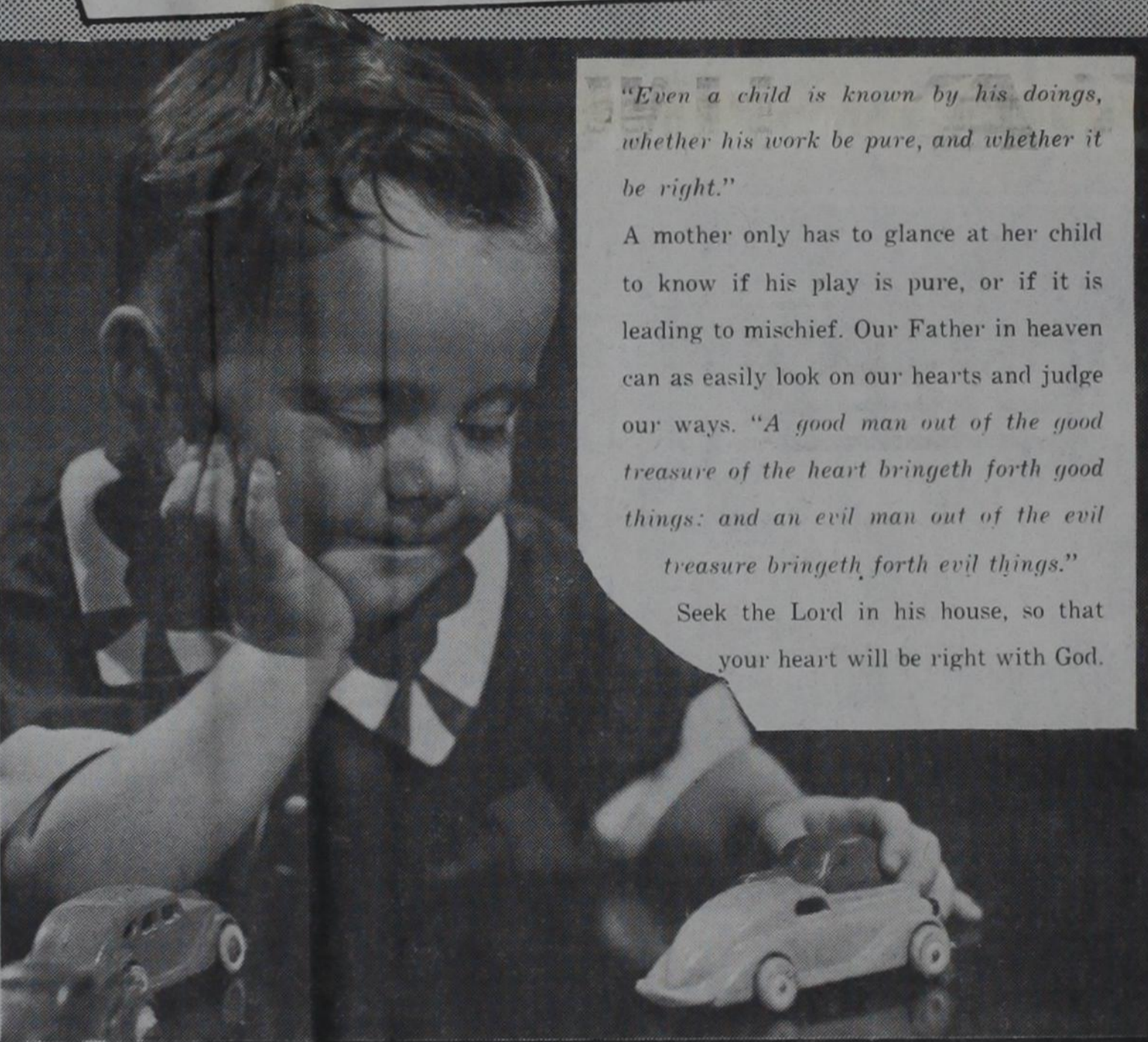

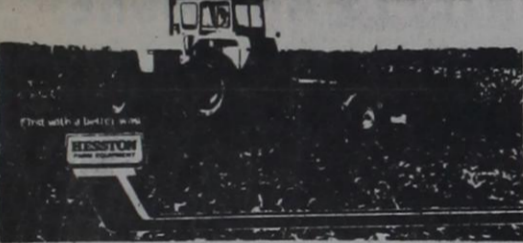

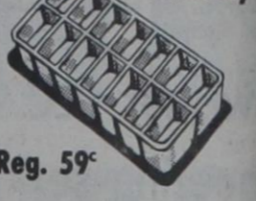

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On Wall Street By Bob Hill

President Carter's hopes of a renomination have been dealt a series of blows. There is no doubt that the President is in serious trouble. Nothing seems to go right for him. There is persistent inflation, the revolution in Iran, a highly questionable budget for fiscal 1980 and a sharp fall in popularity. Congress is as fractious as ever and will give Carter as many or more problems this year as it did in the previous two.

Mr. Carter can turn things around but it will require him to reestablish himself as a forceful, effective President. The only way to accomplish this is to deal effectively with a vast array of problems facing him between now and midsummer. His grip on both domestic and foreign affairs seems to be coming apart.

The number one domestic problem is inflation. The voluntary wage-price guidelines never held any real promise of results. Increasing prices are pushing the White House more and more toward tighter monetary policy. Here lie two dan-

gers: high interest rates are a red flag to liberal Democrats, and every notch that monetary policy is tightened increases the risk of a recession between now and the primaries. If Mr. Carter miscalculates, he could be looking at the worst of two worlds—surging unemployment with little or no decline in inflation to compensate.

Energy problems are almost as difficult a hurdle. Mr. Carter's response to the Iranian oil cutoff has been mostly to exhort the American people to conserve. If Iranian oil does not start flowing again soon and the US is forced into allocation (almost a certainty) and gasoline lines form in the summertime, Carter will be blamed for not acting soon enough. If an oil crunch comes, he will be charged with mishandling the Iranian crisis.

The only bright spot is the Israeli-Egyptian peace talks. But that's a long shot. Although talks have been held between the parties on the foreign ministers' level, there has been no sign of give from either side.

ASCS Notes

Signup for fall-seeded grain crops extended

Deadline Extended - The deadline for filing an application for SBA Assistance for 1978 losses has been extended to April 5 for physical damages and July 6 for economic injury.

Certify Fall-Seeded Acres - The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) is currently conducting signup for the 1979 feed grain and wheat programs. The signup period was lengthened recently from April 16 to April 30, to allow employees more time to process crop certifications.

This year, farmers, may report their fall-seeded crops at signup and not have to make a separate visit to the county office, Charley Hill, county director said. Some farmers will also have seeded spring crops which they can report.

The set-aside program offers farmers deficiency and disaster payments for barley, corn, grain sorghum and wheat on the participating farm: voluntary diversion payments for corn and grain sorghum; and price support loans for all eligible crops grown on the farm.

According to Hill, deficiency and disaster payments also apply to cotton, but payments and price support loans for this crop are lost if a set-aside crop is grown on a farm that does not participate in the program.

Farmers considering the program should be aware that the grain reserve is reaching its goal and they will need the

price protection offered through the set-aside program," the ASCS official said.

Producers may also wish to consider using a pre-measurement service before planting to guarantee their acreage.

Rep. Kent Hance has urged that everyone interested in the economic future of the area to attend the hearing at 10:15 a.m. in Lubbock Civic Center. Concerned persons are asked to bring prepared statements.

"This will be our opportunity to have our state and local officials present our side of the water story," he said. "Without participating in the hearing we could easily be overlooked in any major water programs developed in the future."

Information gathered in this hearing is designed to be used by the President in determining future water policy, Hance said.

Pioneer head testifies in gas hearing

K.B. Watson, president of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, said Friday in a statement presented at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission hearing in Amarillo that, "Strictly speaking, Pioneer and its agricultural customers are not critically affected by the least favorable implication in the commission's proposed rules."

In his presentation to the FERC hearing, Watson pointed out that the act does not apply to sales from an intrastate system such as Pioneer's.

Watson's testimony pointed out inconsistencies in the commission's proposed rules to implement Section 401 of the Natural Gas Policy Act, and indicated Pioneer's support for the initial intent.

Watson concluded his remarks, "The clearly expressed intent of congress in the NGPA was to afford maximum curtailment protection to essential agricultural users."

"We believe this protection was intended to cover the farmer's full present and future natural gas requirements except in specific instances where the dual tests of availability and practicability of alternate fuels are met.

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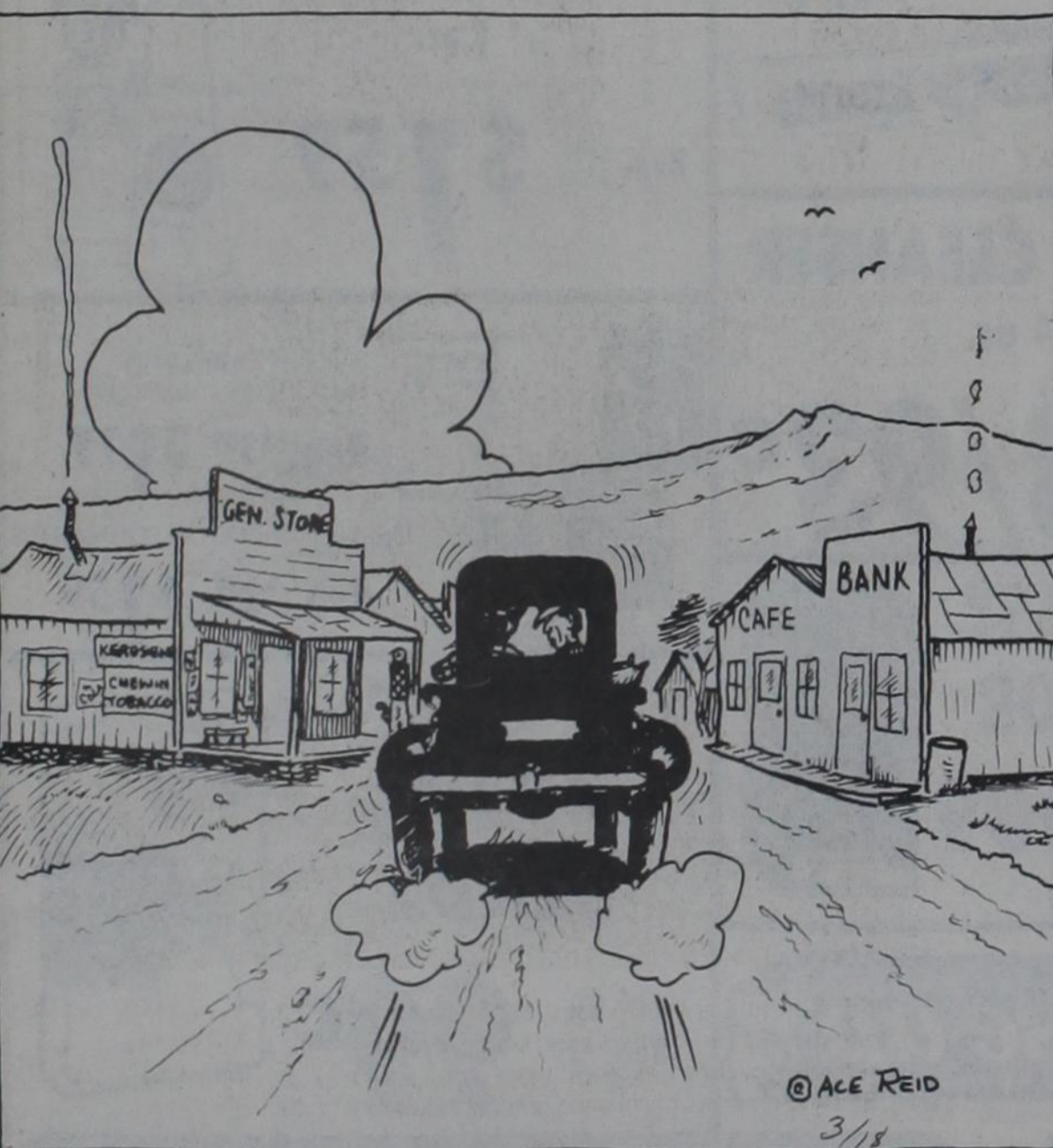

Bill to push gasohol production submitted

A bill relating to the manufacture of gasohol has been introduced in the Texas Senate by Bob Price of Pampa, who previously submitted three other bills to make up a comprehensive package which Sen. Price hopes will speed the move toward manufacture of the motor fuel in Texas.

The latest bill would authorize alcohol manufacturer permits to firms involved in the production of gasohol. At present, Texas law prohibits the manufacture of alcohol in the state.

If alcohol is to be made from grain in this area, as proposed by grain growers and others here, with the Dimmitt Amstar plant as the manufacturer, a change in state law will be necessary.

Carl King, president of Texas Corn Growers Association, has

named the law change as the first thing needed before the gasohol program could move.

Price's bill would allow the holder of a permit to manufacture, rectify, refine and denature alcohol; sell denatured alcohol produced under the permit; and blend alcohol produced under the permit with petroleum distillate and sell the resulting product as a motor fuel.

It would set the annual fee for an alcohol manufacturer permit at \$25.

"Corporations would also be able to hold an alcohol manufacturer's permit," Price said. "Also, wet or dry counties or precincts would not affect the eligibility of an applicant to hold a permit."

The state senator said he expects committee hearings to begin this month on the four bills he has introduced, all dealing with gasohol development and taxation.

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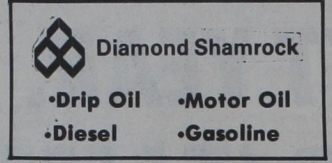


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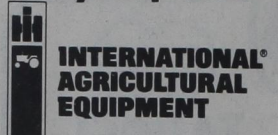


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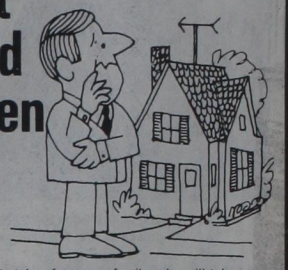

Total reports of area UW drives given

Dimmitt's 1978-79 United Way drive raised 86.3 percent of its goal, according to a report as of Jan. 31 which Texas United Community Services has just issued. Of the \$17,681 goal, \$15,267 was raised. This compares with Hereford, which raised 67.3 percent of a whopping \$199,315 goal; Littlefield, with 105.1 percent of its \$28,500 goal; Tulia, with 63.8 percent of a goal set at \$18,800, and Friona, which had a goal of only \$11,227 and reached 95 per cent of that figure.

Dimmitt Kiwanis Club marks 10th anniversary

The tenth anniversary of Dimmitt Kiwanis Club's chartering, March 14, was observed at its luncheon Monday with four charter members present. A congratulatory message from Kiwanis International was read by Gene King, president. The four present Monday who became members 10 years ago were Bob Crozier, Jack Patton, Walter Spinhirne and Carl Bruegel.

Bill Yokum gave the program, his observations on the recent American Ag Tractorcade to Washington, D.C. Yokum was one of the Castro County group which took part in the much-publicized trek by tractor across the nation.

The administration and Congress are not responsive to wishes of people in this nation, Yokum said, and as far as agriculture is concerned, "If

something's not done we're gonna lose the family farmers, and when we lose the farmers around here, we lose Dimmitt," referring to the area's dependence on agriculture as its main industry.

For the first time in history, the nation's veteran population has climbed above the 30 million mark.

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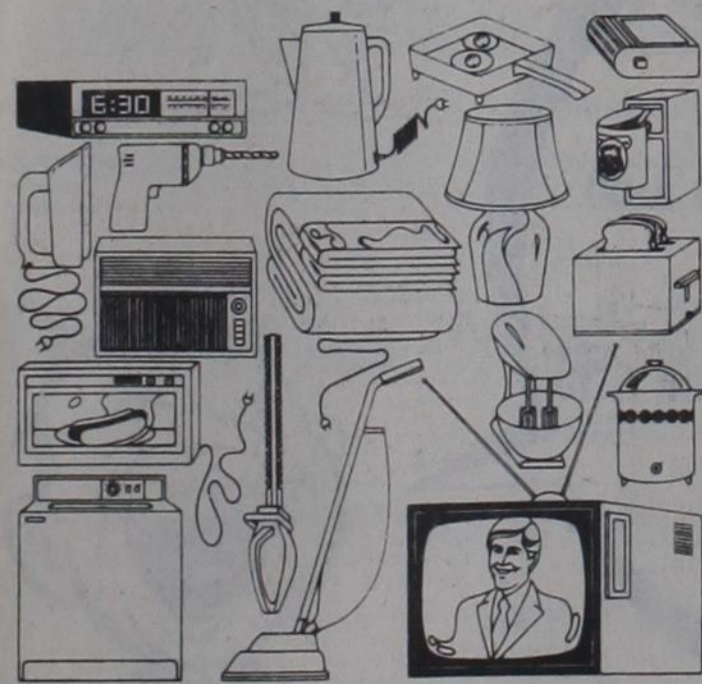

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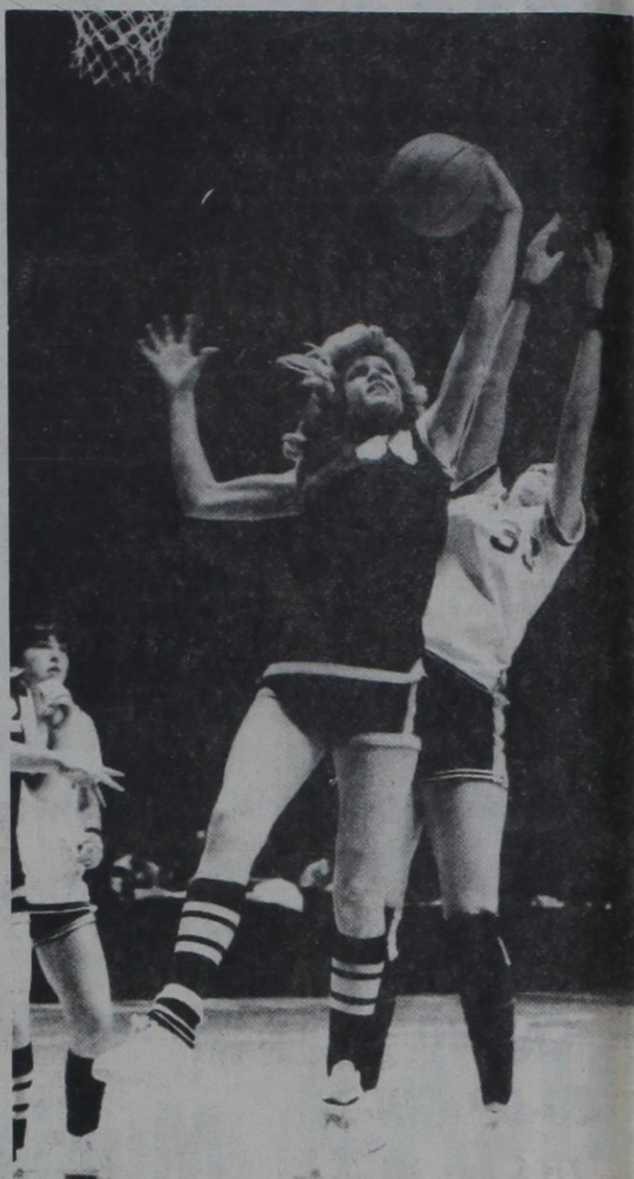

New regulations seen as bar to home loans

New regulations announced Friday by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board will further dry up funds for home loans in Texas, Durward Curlee, Executive vice-president of the Texas Savings and Loan League, said this week. The regulations remove the differential between interest rates paid by savings and loan associations on money market certificates and regular treasury bills. Currently, a saver can purchase a money market certificate with a savings and loan association at an effective interest rate of 9.665 percent while six-month treasury bills only yield 9.415 percent. "The announcement Friday means that S&Ls have lost an advantage to attract money which eventually is used for home loan mortgages," Curlee said.

(Continued from Page 1) from state agencies. Davis also suggested that each work crew of the company have a copy of the county permit showing where and for what period of time the permit was granted. David added that it was up in the air as to whether any benefits from possible discoveries would accrue to the county. The commission decided to spend \$3,617.35 for a year's coverage under professional liability insurance through the National Sheriff's Association to cover all county employees involved in any aspect of law enforcement. Bill Behrends is the agent handling the policy, and he stated that there are three levels of coverage: high hazard at a cost of \$188 per person, including the sheriff and his deputies, dispatchers and the jailer, the county medical officer, the county attorney, county commissioners and county judge, and the Justice of the Peace of Precinct 2; medium hazard for \$88 per person, which covers the probation officer; and low hazard for \$25 per person which will cover the county attorney's secretary and the county judge's secretary. The county as an entity is also covered for an additional 10 percent. There is also an administrative charge of \$142, or \$7.50 per person covered.

A survey on the feasibility of combining the county's insurance coverage policies was agreed on by the commission, with all interested insurance agents helping in the survey. The National Sheriff's Assoc. coverage, workmen's compensation, auto coverage, and office holders' bonds will not be included. The remaining areas of coverage will be combined and let for bids to agents in the county, if the survey shows it to be feasible. Sheriff Granville Martin requested two new cars for his department, with the specifications to be presented at the commission's next meeting and bids advertised for at that time. Martin also asked for permission to purchase new lights, ventilators and door stops for the jail, and to make needed improvements and repairs. The commission was also advised by County Attorney Jimmy Davis of a suit pending against Martin on behalf of Alfred Williams concerning an incident in 1976 in which Williams alleges he was shot by Martin and/or Martin's wife. Davis termed the case "completely frivolous" and told the commission that he hopes to get the suit dismissed without going into court. Representatives of the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. met with the court to request county funds for hoses and new tires needed for the county tanker. The hoses were estimated at a cost of \$475. No figures were available on the tires. Permission was granted for the purchases. The firemen also asked the commission to explain why the department's previous request for an increase in the number of its members was denied. The commission explained that the three additional places were being held open in case any firemen from Hart or Nazareth qualified for coverage on the pension plan. In other business, the commission: —Granted an easement to Jim Cleavinger for a gas line to cross a county road in the Dodd area, as long as the line meets county and gas company specifications. —Approved a \$3,439.20 expenditure for Precinct 4 to Plains Machinery for repairs on county machinery. —Gave County Judge M.L. Simpson authority to look into improvements and refurbishings for the district judge's chambers, as well as for County Surveyor John Alldredge's office. —Approved the paying of bills. —Discussed the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Conference which several of the commission planned to attend today (Thursday) and Friday.

Curlee said, "Once again the federal government has decided that the housing industry will be used as a whipping boy in the fight to halt inflation. This means there will be even less money to loan in Texas for housing." He continued, "We in Texas are already facing a severe money shortage for housing because of the 10 percent usury ceiling." "The average American who sees owning his home as the only viable way to hedge against inflation is going to find it even tougher now, particularly in Texas, to find money to buy that home," Curlee said. Slates are filled for April elections

Candidates who filed before the deadline last Wednesday filled slates for annual city, school board and hospital board elections of April 7. Four candidates were certified for Plains Memorial Hospital's board after mid-morning Wednesday. Mayors are to be elected in Dimmitt and Hart, with the Dimmitt incumbent, Elmer Youts, opposed by Clyde E. Vick who entered the race last Wednesday. Mayor Frank Barnes filed his candidacy for re-election and has no opponent. The only other city office to be filled in Dimmitt is that of city judge and incumbent L.G. Manning is the only candidate. At Hart, incumbent Bob Bowden and Bill Sanders filed in the race for city commissioner and Gilbert Guzman was already a candidate. W.T. King is the other incumbent whose term expires this year. Only one city commissioner is to be chosen at Nazareth, with Jerry Lange asking re-election without opposition. Five candidates have announced for two seats on the Nazareth Independent School District board. Candidates were certified for the hospital board election with presentation of required petitions Wednesday. Names of Charles Rickerd and Miguel Zuniga will appear on the ballot with those of incumbents James Welch and Frank Wise. Lombards are 'still on Cloud 9'

"We're still on Cloud 9, and we're just going to enjoy it as long as we can," a happy Joe Lombard said Monday. "We realize that something like this may never happen again."

Nothing like it had ever happened before. Lombard and his wife, Babs, made history last weekend when his Nazareth Swiftettes and her Hale Center Owlettes won side-by-side state basketball championships.

Babs, former student coach of the Wayland Queen Bees, already had tutored the Owlettes to three District 5-A championships before Joe decided this year to leave the sportsgoods business and go into coaching. The Lombards live in Hale Center.

Joe and Babs had met at Wayland College, where he lettered four years in basketball. They were married after he graduated in 1975; Babs was already coaching at Hale Center then.

How did they achieve this impossible dream? Did they put their heads together a lot? Did they use a "team coaching" concept?

"No, we tried not to interfere with each other," Babs said. "We did discuss mutual opponents a lot, and we ran a lot of the same offenses and defenses. But we had different teams with different girls."

"We talked a lot of basketball last summer, trying to get Babs ready for the five-player game," Joe said. "But we haven't talked about it much at home during the season—we kinda leave it at school, although it played a large part in our lives this year."

They continued their non-interference policy at the state

tourney. While one's team was playing, the other would be up in the stands with Babs's parents, Bonnie and Walker Tatum of Winter, and Joe's parents, Joe and Dorothy Lombard of Ft. Wayne, Ind.

"We scouted for each other in the state tournament," Babs said. "That way we didn't have to watch the other games and could concentrate on getting ready for our own games. But

we always stay away from each other's benches." "Yeah, I was up in the stands with our parents during Babs's state championship game," Joe said, "but I was the first one on the floor when they won."

Speaking on championship games, why was Joe wearing a tuxedo in the NHS colors during the Swiftettes' final game?

"Well, back during the season I told the kids that if we ever got to the state finals I'd wear a tux," he said. "Since we made it, I couldn't go back on my promise to them, so I went ahead and wore it—whether I wanted to or not."

That's just one of many memories the Lombards will have of their historic 1978-79

season. Another memorable event was the time their teams played each other in the Kress Tournament.

"He promised me he wouldn't stall, then he did," Babs said. Nazareth won the game by a point.

When Joe got home that night—a little later than Babs—he found a doghouse on the front lawn with a sign on it that said, "Happy sleeping, Joe." (It had been put there by a Hale Center school board member.) And Babs, going along with the joke, had locked the front door.

And there was the thrill of all the playoff games, climaxed by the trip to the state tournament. With Joe driving and Babs riding shotgun, the Swift-

ettes and Owlettes made the trip together in a Nazareth bus. "When we left Nazareth we had a pep rally that morning, then when we got to Hale Center they had another pep rally, and an Amarillo TV station televised it and interviewed our girls," Joe said. "The kids really got a kick out of that."

"When we got to Winters—where Babs was raised—they had a sign on the front of the city hall wishing both teams good luck. And newspapers everywhere picked up on the story."

Then there was the excitement of playing in UT-Austin's big "Super Drum"—and winning it all, with Nazareth's and Hale Center's fans cheering for each other's teams.

Sponsors at Nazareth were Mrs. Thurman and Sister Celestine.

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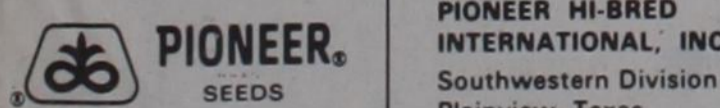

DISD board moves to update policies

The Dimmitt School Board approved Monday night the purchase of a Texas Association of School Boards policy manual and agreed to spend approximately \$1,600 for updating of the local policy handbook.

"TASB lawyers would look at what we now have, and advise us of any possible changes that might need to be made in order to maintain a clearly legal and consistent policy," Supt. Robert Ryan told the board, "but we would still retain final say on the matter."

Ryan also told the board that there is a yearly maintenance fee of \$350 on the agreement for the lawyers to keep the local system up-to-date and informed of any new laws or court decisions that may affect its operation.

"One court case because of inferior or incomplete policy would probably cost many times the amount of this system," Ryan told the board.

The board policy on unexcused absences was protested by Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Shottenkirk at Monday's meeting. Mrs. Shottenkirk stated in a letter to the board that her daughter was given an unexcused absence for participation in a church outing, which she considered a "valuable experience," and that her daughter had been "treated badly in one class while children who had been absent for a livestock show were making up their work."

When asked by a board member what she thought should be done about such situations, Mrs. Shottenkirk suggested that such absences be allowed if a student's school record was good.

The board discussed the matter thoroughly, but no action was taken other than to reaffirm the present policy.

The board voted to put in for one new school bus for the 1979-80 school year and to send another older bus to be reconditioned.

All the body and interior work will be done at the State Department of Corrections at Huntsville at an estimated cost of \$1,500, while all the mechanical work will be done locally at an estimated cost of \$2,000 to \$3,000.

The new bus will be a 53-passenger model, while the reconditioned one will be rated

as 54 passengers. "We hope to find that the reconditioned bus will be just like new and at a substantial savings over the nearly \$14,000 cost for a new bus of the same size," Ryan said, adding that if the reconditioned bus is satisfactory, more may be obtained that way in the future.

The board heard a departmental report from Joann Moore, counselor for grades kindergarten through eighth, and Alice Deger, Title I Magnet grant counselor for the same grades.

Both women see about 556 students per week through their program of classroom presentations, which include the use of songs, puppets, film strips and stories that stress "feelings and attitudes toward self and others."

"Beginning a counseling program in kindergarten is like a vaccine," Mrs. Moore said. "We feel it can help prevent problems in the future. Already we have noticed that more children are coming to us with their problems instead of waiting until the situation becomes so bad that we must approach them."

Mrs. Deger commented, "We have an excellent counseling program for a school our size, and we're the envy of many other schools."

In other business, the board approved the recommendations of the textbook selection committee.

Approved the tax addition-deletion report.

Went into executive session to accept resignations and re-employ classroom teachers for the 1979-80 school year.

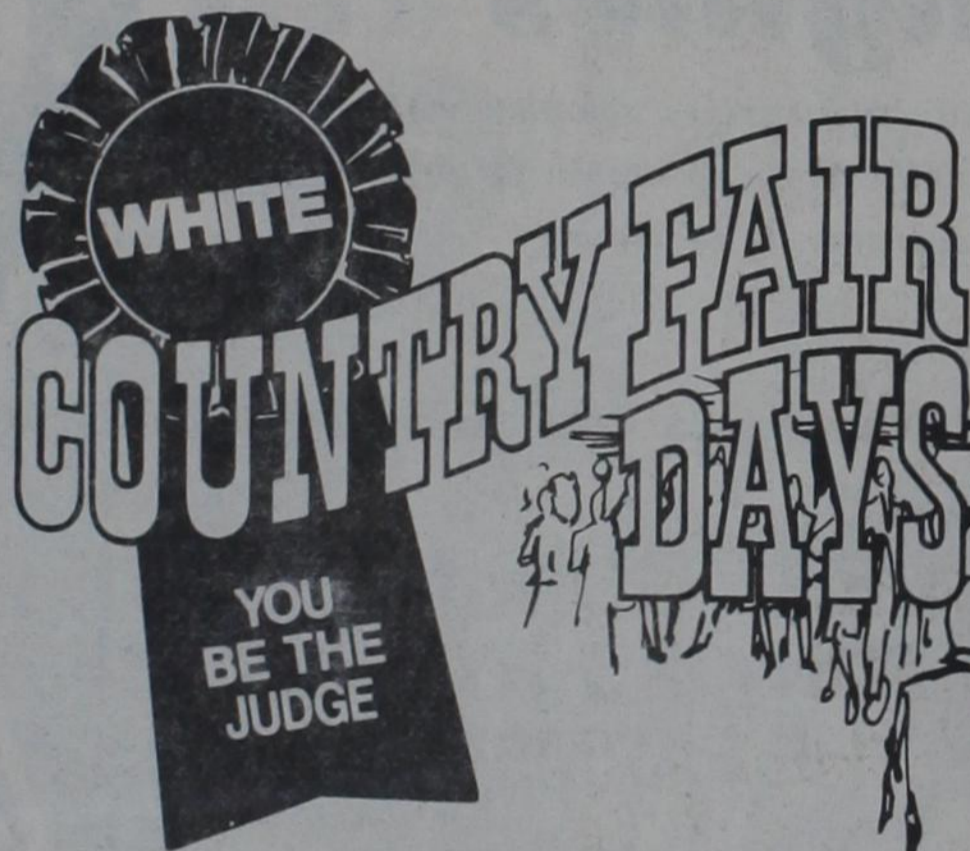

The deadline for filing agricultural disaster loan applications has been extended thirty days, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced today.

"Texas farmers and ranchers who suffered financial hardship due to drought losses on 1978 crops have until April 5, to apply for SBA's low-interest disaster loans," said Alicia Chacon, SBA Regional Director.

Last fall the Small Business Administration named 125 Texas counties as disaster areas because of extreme drought conditions. Producers in these and all adjacent counties may be eligible for a disaster loan if they lost crops in the 1978 growing season.
